15,000 Turkeys Destroyed By Fire

An estimated 15,000 turkey poulters were destroyed in a fire Thursday, May 24, at 3:30 a. m. on the Cleo C. Thompson farm on Kissing Rock Rd. Lowell firemen managed to keep the fire from spreading from the five floor barn housing the young turkeys. Frank Baker, fire chief, estimated the damage at \$34,000, which Thompson said was partially covered by insurance.

Baker said that the barn was in flames before the Lowell firemen arrived and they were lucky in the high wind to save the house. Besides the barn and turkeys the fire destroyed a truck, feed and tools.

Thompson, who has been a turkey farmer since 1957, lost all but 7,000 to 8,000 turkeys in the fire. These few were on range and escaped.

YM.C.A. News

The 1962 YMCA summer activities will get underway June 9 with the opening of the Frank Twining King Memorial Pool. All swim classes will begin Monday, June 11.

The Junior and Senior High Teen Canteens will begin the week of June 18 and run for 10 weeks. Open Swims will be held daily from 1:30-2:30 p. m. and from 4 to 5 p. m. Open swim fees are as follows: Jr. High and below, 10 cents; High School, 25 cents; and adults, 40 cents.

Seven local classes for beginners through Junior High will be held twice a week for five weeks beginning the week of June 18. Instructors will be Robert White and Terry Abel. Program fee will be \$1.50 for "Y" members or \$2.50 for non-members. Classes are open to all boys and girls of fourth thru 9th grades.

Supervised Playgrounds
Four weeks of supervised recreation activities will be held at Recreation Park for boys and girls of 4 years of age thru 6th grade, daily Monday through Friday from 9 a. m. to 12 noon.

Give Board Go Sign

At a special meeting of the city council on Thursday evening, May 24, the city council heard John Keen, General Manager of Wolverine Electric Co-op and then authorized the Light & Power Board to proceed with a contract with the government sponsored co-op electric company to furnish the city with power.

Keen told the council and power board that his group of five co-op electric groups and four other municipal light plants stand ready to work with Lowell to offer all the power we need for many years to come.

The Wolverine Co-op will set up an inner-change agreement with Lowell to furnish power at 8 mills at any time with no demand or other charges that would make a variance in costs. This 8 mill cost is at least 4 mills less than Lowell can produce power with their own diesel engines.

Wolverine Co-op has inner change agreements with Portland, Hart, Grand Haven and Zeeland Municipal plants and have their own plants at Hersey, Burns, Portland, Vestaburg and Scotville. Lowell's plant would be tied into this network by a transmission line that Wolverine would build into the city.

Here with Mr. Keen to explain the engineering problems of a hook up with Wolverine were James DeWinter and Al Hodges, engineers with J & G Davenport Co. of Grand Rapids.

Lowell Takes 2nd In Tri-River Conference Track Meet In An Exciting Season Ending

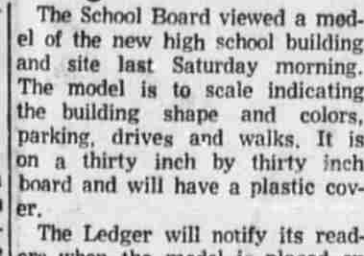
Lowell High School track team came from behind in the Tri-River Conference Track Meet held here last Thursday to take second place in this final meet of the season and wind-up the season with a tie for 2nd with Rockford.

Sparta won the meet before a crowd of some 800 fans from the six schools in the league with 45 1/2 points. Lowell had 35, and Rockford 34 1/2, Cedar Springs 32, and Belding and Comstock tied with 24 each.

Lowell Sets Three Records
Lowell track men set three records in the conference meet; Ron Wilson won the mile with a record breaking 4:43.8; Roger Odell broke his own record with a new mark of 2:04.8 in the half-mile and Lloyd Slack set a record of 22:2 in the preliminaries of the low hurdles.

Lowell had a season record of 8 wins and 5 losses in dual meets. The Arrows have promise of a good season next year, losing only five seniors who have scored points. These seniors are Ron Wilson, Jerry Hale, John Sawka, Tom Serne, and Duane Mayou.

The most advanced and versatile planetarium instrument ever built is expected to be in operation by next spring at Michigan State University.

The MSU Planetarium, a \$400,000 teaching facility for the space age, is being financed by alumni and friends of the University through contributions to the MSU Development Fund, Mr. and Mrs. Talbert Abrams of Lansing made a \$25,000 gift for the project.

The planetarium will be utilized in such courses as physics and astronomy, introductory science courses, navigation, engineering, military science projects and programs for the Science and Mathematics Teaching Center. Programs for school children of the area and special scientific presentations of a popular nature will also be scheduled.

Dog Licenses

Due June 1st The Kent County Animal Shelter would like to remind all dog kennel licensees that the 1962 licenses are due June 1, 1962.

Any person, group of persons, or corporation owning and operating any establishment, where or where dogs are kept for the purpose of breeding, boarding, sale or sporting purposes, must be licensed. Three or more dogs are considered a kennel. Kennel licenses are not issued inside the city limits of Grand Rapids.

Anyone wishing to obtain a license in the county must first obtain written consent from their township office, on forms available at the County Treasurer's office.

The fees for anyone having 10 dogs or less is \$7.50, and \$15.00 for more than 10 dogs. A penalty of an additional \$5.00 is charged for each kennel license applied for after the first day of June of each year.

Kennel licenses can only be obtained at the County Treasurer's office. With each kennel license the county treasurer shall issue a number of metal tags equal to the number of dogs authorized to be kept in the kennel. All such tags shall bear the name of the county issuing it, the number of the kennel license, and shall be readily distinguishable from the individual license tags for the same year.

Local LP Gas Manager Describes History of Fuel

A Pennsylvania farm family made history 50 years ago when they began using liquefied petroleum gas for cooking and home lighting, according to Don Dunlap, District Manager, Michigan Bottled Gas, Lowell, Michigan.

The first house in the world to use newly-discovered LP gas was the home of John W. Gahring in northwestern Pennsylvania. Today (May 17, 1962) a historical marker, commemorating the birth of the LP-gas industry, is being dedicated at Waterford, Mr. Dunlap said.

Dr. Walter O. Snelling of Allentown, Pennsylvania, 81 year-old inventor and scientist who discovered L-P Gas a half century ago, is being honored at Waterford as part of the LP-gas industry's nationwide 50th anniversary celebration. Dr. Snelling installed LP-gas at the Gahring home on May 17, 1912.

While the historic past is being reviewed in colorful ceremonies near the site of the first LP-gas installation, leaders of the National LP Gas Council are meeting in Tulsa, Oklahoma. This group, meeting in the heart of the nation's major oil and gas producing region, is "looking ahead" to anticipated progress during the next half century.

Fifty years ago, LP-gas—sometimes known as butane, propane or bottled gas—got its start as a convenient fuel for home use. Now it is the primary fuel in millions of suburban, small town and rural homes and serves the farmer in many ways.
