Four Candidates Seek School Board Posts

In the Lowell School Board election to be held on Monday, June 11, the four candidates pictured above will compete for the two positions on the seven man board.

The election will be held in the Runciman Elementary school and the voting place will be open from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m.

Edward L. Rankin, incumbent candidate was first elected to the board in 1959. He has been closely associated with the school and education field. He served as coach, teacher, principal and superintendent over a period of 14 years.

He has served as county superintendent of schools and been a

members of the tax equalization board. For the past 19 years, he has been with the O. C. Heath & Co., publishers of school books.

Dr. Robert Reagan, Lowell Dentist and community leader for many years is seeking a public office for the first time.

He has served as head of the Chamber of Commerce and the Lowell Lions Club.

Gould Rivette, is a life-long resident of the community and is a founding superintendent of the Attwood Corp. in Grand Rapids.

He has been active in community affairs and recently served as Master in the Masonic Lodge.

Dale Shade, operates a farm in Lowell Township and is active in his community. He was treasurer of the Sweet School district for 10 years before it became a part of the Lowell District, last year.

He has also been an officer in the Farm Bureau and an outstanding 4-H leader.

Ty Wessell Named School Board Pres.

To expedite the handling of the million dollar school bond issue sold on Tuesday evening, Gerald Rollins, president of the school board, whose term expired this year, and is not seeking re-election, resigned from the office of president, and Tyrus Wessell was elected by the board to serve until the reorganization in July.

Rollins in his letter of resignation expressed his disappointment in not being able to continue, but revealed that his health would not permit him to carry out the duties of the office. He further stated that he wants everyone to know that he is in complete agreement with policies of the board, and their actions over the past months. Rollins is presently a patient in Butterworth Hospital.

Ed Rankin was elected by the board to serve as vice president.

Take Action on Alto

Harold Metternick asked the board to keep the present Alto school for at least a year to see how the new school is able to handle the load. The board voted to take no action on the Alto building for at least a year. The board also acted to have the superintendent negotiate the sale of the Bowne Center school to the Bowne Center Methodist church who has expressed an interest in taking over this building.

The board also voted to investigate the possibility of creating another voting precinct in the southern area of the district. It was pointed out that this might create problems in unity of the school district but a survey is being undertaken by the board.

Lowell Boys Rate Well In Statewide Road-E-O

At the state wide Jaycee sponsored Road-E-O held Saturday in Belding, the two Lowell boys who won the local contest scored well in competition with boys from all over the state. There were 50 contestants in Belding Saturday, and Doug LaDue, son of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas LaDue, 36th Street, scored 461 points only 40 points less than the winner to win 10th place in the contest. Alex McPherson, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. A. McPherson, Parnell Road scored 375 points to claim 36th place.

The Lowell Jaycees are very proud of the showing the Lowell boys made in the first year of competition and are grateful for the fine cooperation from the community.

Test Program Reveals Strength

During the spring of 1962 most of the students in the 9th and 10th grade took the NEDT (National Educational Development Test). The test has four main purposes: to help students understand their academic strengths and weaknesses, to help teachers and counselors better understand the instructional and guidance needs of individual students, to help administrators of the high school understand the strengths and weaknesses of the school system's curriculum, and to help personnel identify students who should be encouraged to attend college. The scores indicate the level of the child's skills at the time of the test in comparison with pupils of the same grade across the nation. There are five main divisions of scholastic abilities tested: they are: English usage, mathematics usage, social studies, reading, natural sciences reading, and word usage.

Through this testing program certificates in recognition of outstanding performance were presented to students ranking in the top ten per cent of their class. The Lowell City Council on Monday voted to join with Wolverine Co-operative Electric Company, a part of the R. E. A., in an interchange agreement which would bring a hook-up with several municipal and R. E. A. power plants.

The agreement calls for Lowell building a sub-station along the river across from the plant and the Wolverine firm to bring a transmission line into the city from about 15 miles south of the town.

Authorize Assessment District

The City Council authorized the establishment of a special assessment district in the Lowell Development area to pay the city share of the cost of installing water and sewer mains.

General obligation bonds will be issued to pay for the project with repayment expected on hook-in charges. The development corporation has agreed to purchase the bonds with interest at only 2 percent.

In other action, the Council voted for a 2 hour parking limit in the parking lot behind the library building.

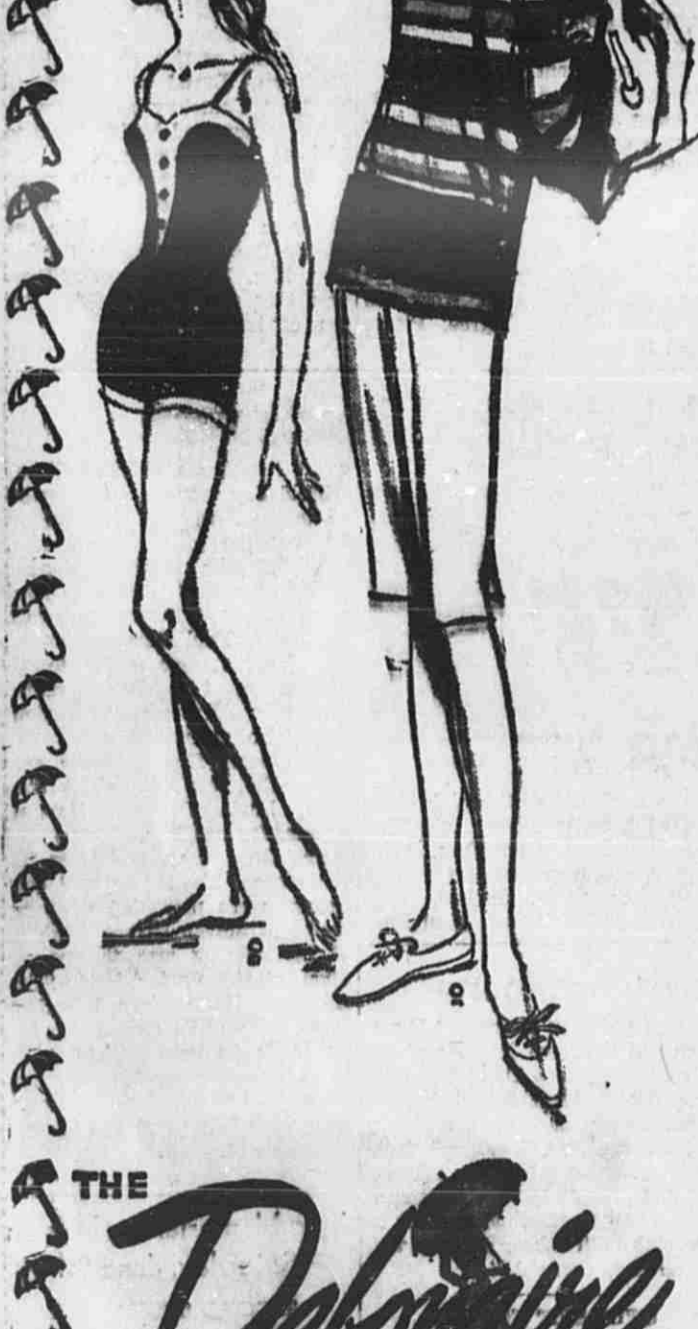

Regular session Monday evening May 21, 1962, in the council room of the city hall. Council was called to order by Mayor pro tem Richard Schlemm, supported by Myers, that the minutes of the regular session of May 15, 1962 be approved and the reading of same waived.

1. Letter from Kent County Library Association, expressing appreciation for the support rendered in allocating funds for the coming year. \$12,785.98.
2. Letter announcing Wednesday, June 24, 1962, has been postponed at United Nations Day by President John F. Kennedy.

3. Michigan Municipal Clerks Association was presented by Chairman of the Light and Power Board King Doyle. He explained briefly the circumstances which led to the development of the Wolverine Electric Cooperative and its nature as a privately owned corporation which the users are the stockholders. He further stated that this corporation is subject to all other corporate laws. Several questions were asked about the nature of the Electric Cooperative operation, including the development of adequate energy. He assured Council that the supply would be more than adequate for the number of years involved in the contract.

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Stay Away From Mother and Cubs

Mama bear and her cubs now are getting thinned out of the long winter sleep and the whole family is plenty hungry, says Prof. Lawrence Chase, chairman of The University of Michigan Department of Wildlife Management. "They won't have an easy time either because food is scarce this year. Fortunately, they make use of all kinds of food, including animal remains from the deer hunting season, highway kills, and carrion of any kind," says Chase. "The greater number of dead deer due to starvation will not do it because they are in late Nov. and gives birth in January in alternate years, to one or two (rarely three) cubs. These usually weigh from one to 12 ounces each. The mother bear will stay with her cubs until they are weaned in August. The cubs may, and often do, stay with her when she is in hibernation the following winter."

"Bears once roamed all over Michigan. Now they are found only in those parts of Michigan where we have forests. They keep to rough terrain and poor soil regions away from human population. From past experience, the bear has learned not to trust people and his well-placed standoffishness is one of the first lessons Mama Bear cubs learn in their early years."

"So, if you're wise, you won't approach the cubs even to get a harmless photo for your album. Mama Bruin, in spite of a usually mild and soft temperament, won't tolerate meddling with her young."

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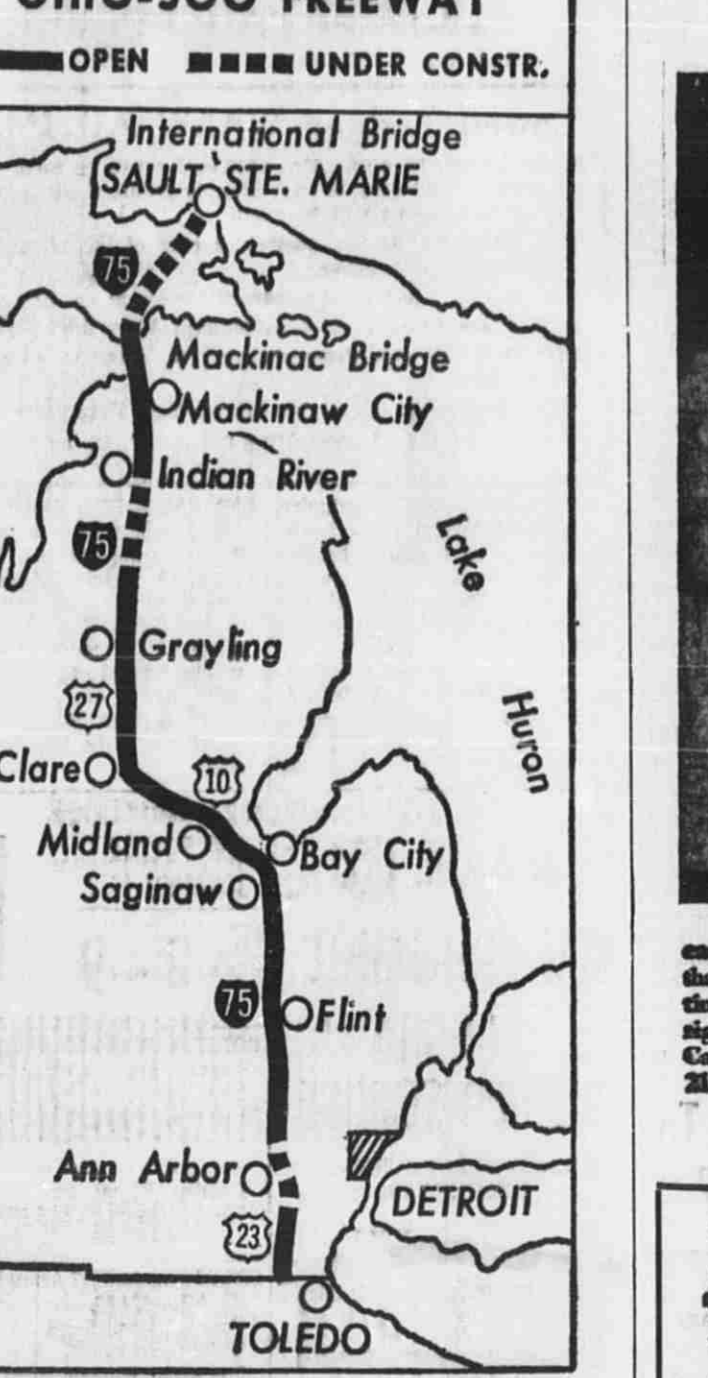

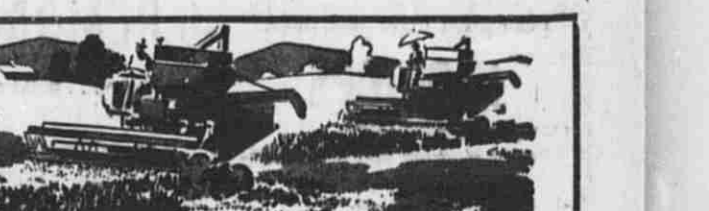

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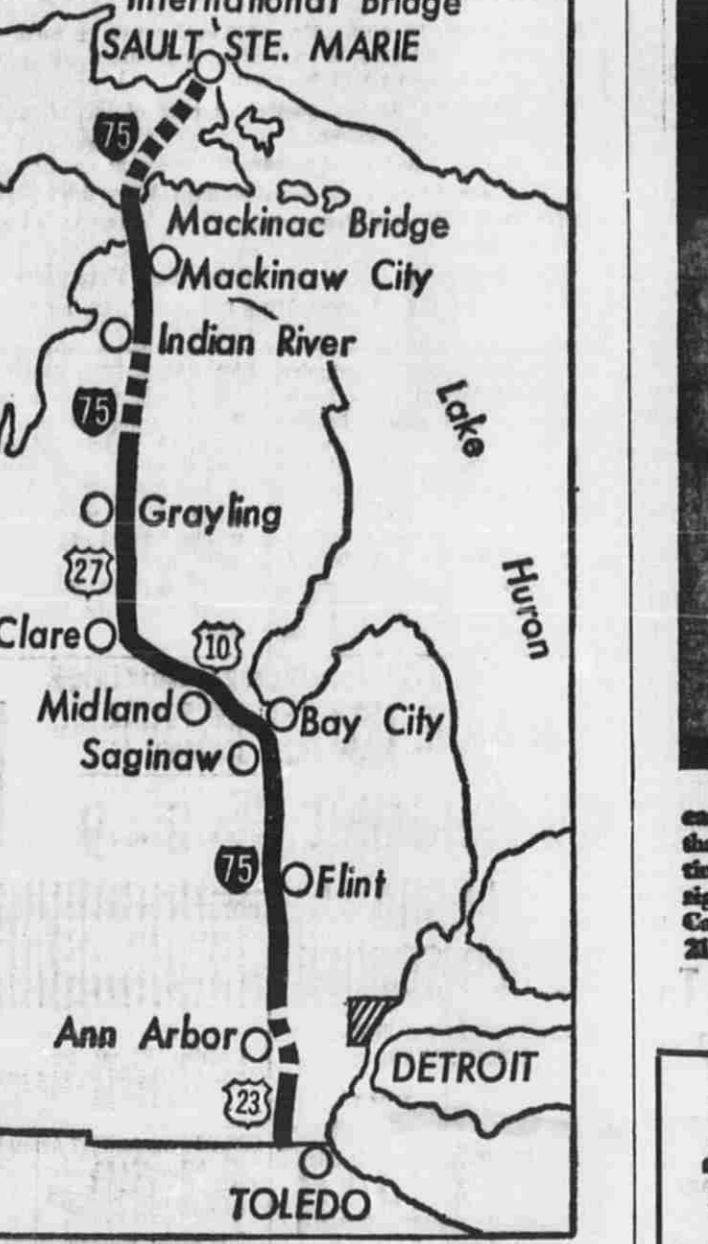
