
Runciman Co. Expands; Hosts Common Market Industrialists



Further Runciman Co. expansion started to take shape this week with foundations being laid for new storage facilities near the railroad spurs that service the local bean processing plant, Company president C. H. Runciman announced Wednesday morning that three steel storage tanks, measuring 36 feet in diameter and 40 fect in height, are being built to both store bagged beans and enable workers to unload railroad cars in a matter of minutes. A conveyor belt will also be built from the storage bins across the tracks to the main Runciman plant, Mr. Runciman stated that the new facilities, expected to be completed by September 1, will contain modern ventilation and heat-control equipment, Also under construction by the Runciman Co. are 44,000 sq. ft. of additional space at the Thomas Elevator.
