LOWELL NATIVES ... people across the street are lower than we are, and they had 22 inches in their livingroom and no second floor to go to. It was so bad here in Kooaling that some Americans had six feet of water in their houses.

"I used to think that we got rainfall in Michigan and Florida, but you just can't believe how much rain we got here. We received a total of 23 inches in 18 hours, of which 20 inches fell in one 8-hour period.

"Our car got flooded, too. It was sitting in our driveway with water up to the top of the tires. The inside got all wet, and I am just now getting the floor mats dry after putting them out in the sun for almost a week."

Typhoon Causes Flood

Purchase wrote his parents that the typhoon struck Taiwan at 2 a. m. on Monday, July 23.

"Wind and rain and the water were pouring in our upstairs' windows and the two doors leading out onto the balcony," the Lowell soldier said. "We battled the water for about an hour and a half and then went back to bed.

"We woke again at 4:00 and battled water until 6:00 in the morning when it finally let up. About 6:30 I called my boss to see if we were going to work—he said "no" so we all went back to bed again.

"I woke up again about 8:30, took one look out the window, and saw at least 2 feet of water in the street in front of our house.

"By nine the water had risen to a point where it was coming into the house. I had moved all the furniture that we were worried about upstairs, so we didn't get any damage. The water, however, kept rising until it hit a peak at 10 a. m. At this time we had 5 inches on the downstairs floor.

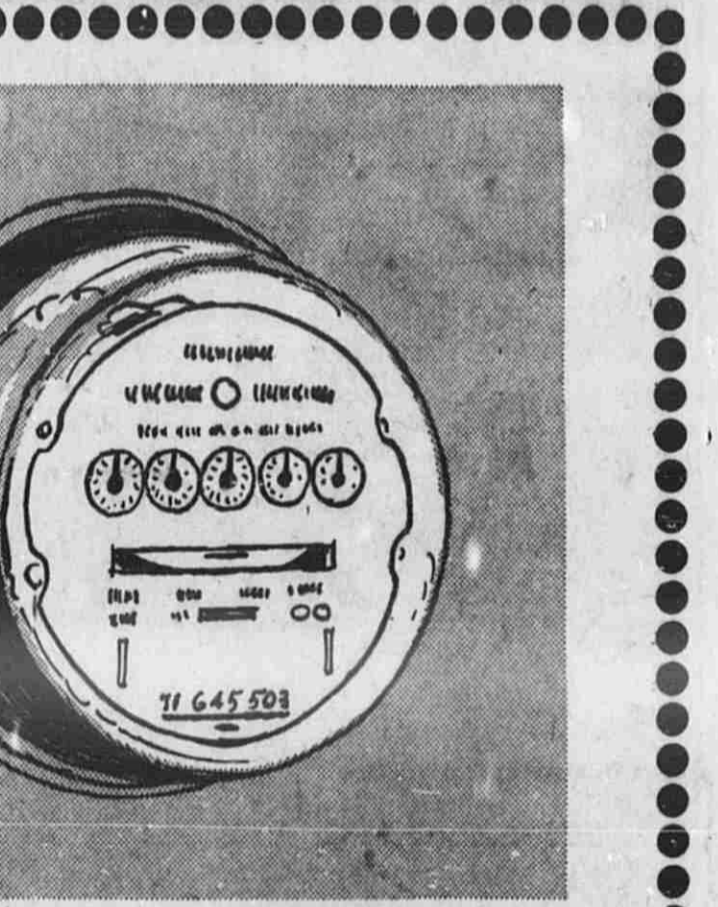
