School Board Sets Tax Rate for 1962 Sell Bowne Center School to Church

At the meeting of the Lowell Board of Education on Monday evening the tax rate for this year was set at \$8.73 per thousand allocated operation; \$3 per thousand voted operation, and \$8 per thousand debt retirement for a total of \$19.73 per thousand of equalized valuation.

This is about \$8.00 more per thousand than the 1961 tax, but is 80 cents less a thousand than was projected to the taxpayers for debt retirement before the high school bond issue. This is due to the increased valuation and the favorable bond sale.

The present school evaluation is \$15,252,040; a growth of \$600,000 over last year. Almost half of this increase comes from the new Attwood factory and its contents.

Pollution Survey To Be Made of Thornapple River

W. L. Ettesvold, Chief Sanitarian of the Kent County Health Department in cooperation with Water Resources Commission; Loring F. Deming, Executive Secretary, has completed arrangements for a pollution survey by boat.

Representatives of the above mentioned agencies, accompanied by James Thomas, Chairman of the Pollution and Weed Control Committee of the Thornapple Association will embark on this project within the next few days.

Voluntary correction of any faulty drainage or disposal systems which may be a source of pollution will be appreciated by these agencies and will help to maintain the Thornapple Valley as a pleasant and healthful place to live.

Friday Crash Fatal To Belding Man

A 21-year-old father of three children from Belding, Dale Lee Collins, was fatally injured in a car-truck accident on M-21, west of Ada, around 6 o'clock Friday evening, September 7.

Kent County Sheriff's Deputies said Collins, lost control of his late-model car and the vehicle veered across the road and was struck broadside by a one-ton dump truck traveling in the opposite direction.

Edgar Niles, 55, of 6715 Grand River Drive, Ada, driver of the truck, escaped with minor injuries.

Collins was pinned in his vehicle, deputies reported, and a wrecker was required to free him from the demolished car. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids with a neck fracture and other multiple injuries.

Employed at the Bryant Elevator Company in Belding, Mr. Collins, a native of Oxford, had been a resident of Belding for the past 14 years.

Funeral services for the 46th traffic victim in Kent County in 1962, were held in Belding Monday afternoon. Interment was made in Hugh Cemetery, Almont.

Mr. Collins is survived by his wife, Priscilla; one daughter, Tammy Jo; two sons, Timothy and Nicholas; his father, Frank Collins of Oxford, and his mother, Mrs. Merritt Bryant of Belding.

Arrows Open Football Season At Ionia

Lowell High School football team will be primed Friday night to go for its first win of the season when they meet Ionia at the Bulldog field in the traditional battle for the V.F.W. Inter-city trophy.

Lowell squeaked through to a 6-0 win over Ionia last year for the first time in 4 years. This year the local team is given a fighting chance of making it two in a row.

The Red Arrow eleven in 1962 are missing the great running and pass catching ability of Don Dilley, but they do have a young but determined team with the greatest balance in all positions for several years. There are 34 members of the varsity squad and Coach Charles Pierce has more depth than he has had since coming to Lowell.

Pierce announced after the scrimmage with Hudsonville last Friday night that he will start Tex Ford at quarterback, Mike McMahon and Lloyd Slack at halfbacks and Terry Abel at fullback against Ionia.

Starting positions have remained in doubt and they can still change before the season is over. Phil Sanders is a strong contender for fullback and sophomore Paul Kropp is certain to be used generously as quarterback. At offensive end Lowell has a couple of outstanding boys, Tom Davis and Craig Walker. This combination should make Lowell's passing game dangerous.

Dick Hughes, who lettered at Otsego last year will be right in the running for a chance to take over an end position.

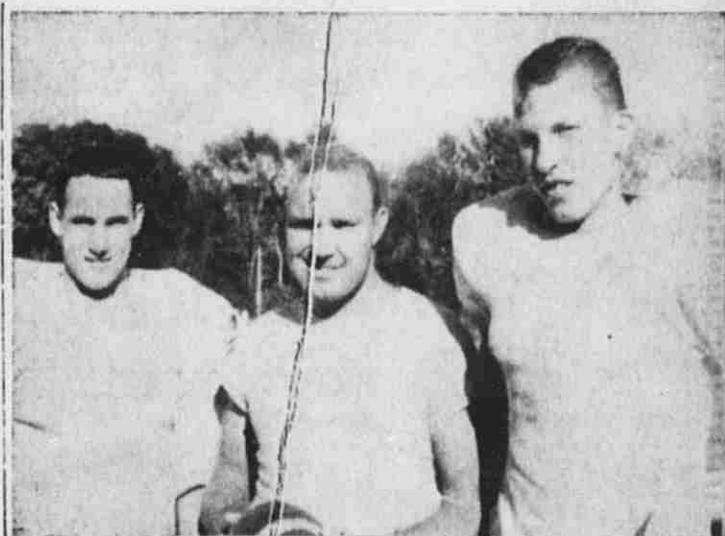
At offensive tackle will be Bob Meyers and Ty Wessell. Guards on the starting line are Ron Hostetler and Barry Hunt, 6-ft., 210-lb. Chaz Kiehl is center.

Defensive Team

Only three of the squad are expected to go both ways, Bob Meyers at center linebacker, and Tom Davis and Lloyd Slack at halfback. Doug Olin and Phil Sanders will play defensive end. 230-lb. Karon Ford and 181-lb. Mike Serne will hold down the tackle spots.

At defensive guard Lowell will have two heavyweights, Ron Bieri at 270-lbs., and 235-lb. Jim Justifer. The other two linebackers with Meyers are Craig Walker and Paul Kropp.

The Red Arrow offensive backfield has plenty of speed, but is short on experience which will be the determining factor at Ionia on Friday. The line is heavier and the blocking at guard is improved. Lowell's 1962 team will have to depend on their overall balance instead of the brilliance of one man to carry them to a successful season, Coach Pierce predicted.

Charles R. Doyle, 523 Lincoln Lake Rd., Lowell, Democratic nominee for State Representative from the 2nd District will visit the Coldwater State Home and Training School Friday, September 14th, along with other Democratic candidates in the 26 county area served by the Coldwater institution.

The Coldwater Home is a state institution for mentally retarded children. The tour is one of a series of visits to State mental health facilities being made by Democratic Legislative candidates to learn about Michigan's mental health needs.

"I am anxious to see for myself the present conditions and standards of care and treatment at our state institutions," Doyle said.

Doyle, who majored in Sociology at Hillsdale College, stated, "Having a first hand knowledge of this problem when I was attending school, I am further aware that we must act promptly to meet the pressing and tragic needs of the 1700 mentally retarded and 900 mentally ill persons who have been committed by Probate Courts, who are on institutional waiting lists. These people have no place to go for help, because the Republican majority in the Legislature has not only refused to provide institutional facilities but this year rescinded a pending program of expanding cooperative community based out-patient treatment centers."

Later this month Doyle will visit a state hospital for the mentally ill.

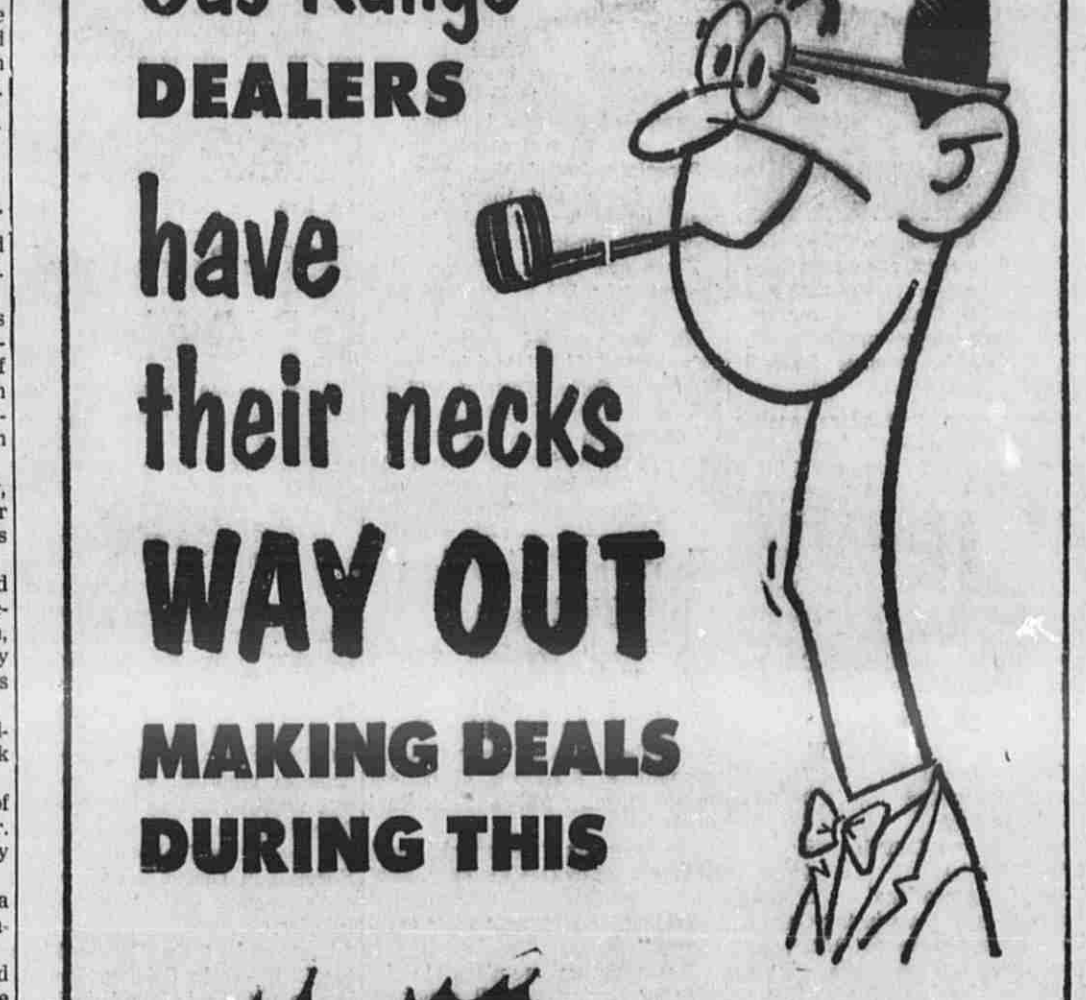

Farmers Urged To Protect With Receipts

Persons delivering grain or beans to storages should obtain warehouse receipts on delivery, advised G. S. McIntyre, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture, whose men check on near-

ly 400 licensed warehouses in the state.

Three representatives of the Department's foods and standards division are currently auditing warehouses. The division is responsible for enforcement of the farm produce storage warehouse act, which was designed to protect per-

sons who store any such farm produce.

Within the past month 47 warehouse units were checked in the state, and 18 were in violation. Fifteen of the 18 violations concerned the issuance of proper warehouse receipts. Two involved proper licensing, and one storage was short of sufficient produce to cover obligations.

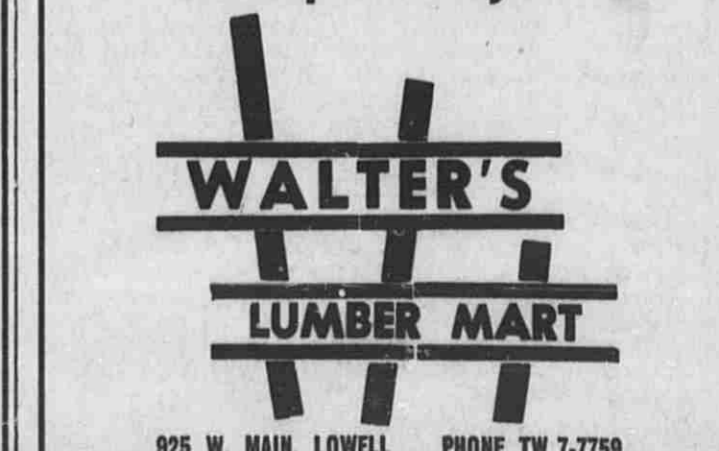
