## Buy Equipment For New School

The Lowell Area Board of Education worked from 7:30 to nearly 1 a. m. Monday night looking over samples and hearing sales discussions on new equipment for the high school.

Contracts were authorized for over \$60,000 in library, music, arts and crafts, homemaking, industrial arts furniture and equipment, and permanent seating for the 304 seat auditorium-classroom.

This is in addition to \$16,749 for kitchen equipment and \$18,042 for science classroom equipment authorized at a meeting on October 1.

All this equipment was selected after a careful study by the teachers, architect and administration officials of the school.

### Progress Report

Donn Palmer, new high school architect reported to the board that the school was on schedule. Steel frame work for the gymnasium is on the job and will be erected by the end of the week. They are still waiting for the steel for the auditorium.

Brick work is moving rapidly, but steel door casings are delayed and will hold up some interior work. It is expected to have the roof on the entire building by January 1.

Colors were selected for the exterior trimwork. The facade around the top of the brick walls will be an olive green. Beneath the windows, in all except the administration section, will be yellow steel porcelain. In the administration section in front of the building it will be a shade of orange.

In the wall area rising from the class room section a corrugated green material will be used.

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## Jaycees Sponsor Baby Clinic Here

The Lowell Jaycees are conducting a survey in the Lowell area to determine the need for such a Child Health clinic in this area.

Hundreds of Kent County children are not receiving the continuous medical health supervision that all children need. This may be due to economic causes, but too often it results from a lack of conviction on the part of families of the need for such supervision.

The Kent County Health Department has a responsibility to educate parents in better methods of child care and to stimulate or provide continuous health supervision for all children. Supervision by the family physician or pediatrician is preferable. Where that is not possible the Health Department is providing supervision by the clinic physician in Child Health Conferences.

Child Health Conferences or so called "Baby Clinics" are not new. They have been conducted in the city of Grand Rapids for more than 30 years. There have been none in rural Kent County until May 1956. Since then, four have been organized in the County at Roger School, Kent City, Burr Oak District, and Harvard. A valuable service has been rendered to the families in these areas.

Continuous health supervision for the child is provided by giving monthly physical examinations of infants until they are six months old, then every two months until one year of age, then every six months to school age.

The services of the child health conference are available to parents without cost for their infants and preschool children if they cannot afford regular health supervision by a private physician. Its function is to keep the well child well, and to promote his best possible state of health.

## Lowell Area Benefits From United Fund

County co-chairmen for the 1963 United Fund Crusade, Donald E. Wieringa and James N. Hines, today released figures taken from the annual Beneficiary Study of the United Community Service which show that 2,066 local residents of Lowell, Ada, Caledonia, Bowne, Vergennes, and Cascade were served by 17 of the 26 local agencies of the United Fund Crusade. In addition \$1,616.13 was spent in hospital free work for Lowell residents and \$718.90 for residents of Caledonia.

A more detailed breakdown for Lowell shows: D. A. Blodgett Homes for Children assisted 8 families; Boy Scouts, 99; Camp Fire Girls, 134; Family Service Association, 4; Association for the Blind, 5; Hearing and speech Center, 5; Central Volunteer Service, 2; Legal Aid Society, 6; Girl Scouts, 47; Salvation Army, 2; YMCA, 542; and YWCA, 11; for a total of 865 families.

338 was the total for Ada with D. A. Blodgett Homes for Children, 8; Blodgett Camp, 5; Boy Scouts, 134; Catholic Service Bureau, 2; Family Service Assoc., 4; Association for the Blind, 8; Child Guidance, 2; Hearing and Speech Center, 2; Central Volunteer Service, 1; Legal Aid Society, 2; Girl Scouts, 93; Salvation Army, 6; and YWCA, 72.

In Caledonia: D. A. Blodgett Homes for Children, 3; Blodgett Camp, 2; Boy Scouts, 135; Catholic Service Bureau, 1; Family Service Assoc., 5; Association for the Blind, 7; Child Guidance, 5; Hearing and Speech Center, 1; Lincoln School, 1; Girl Scouts, 85; Salvation Army, 2; and YWCA, 50; for a total of 297.

In addition the County co-chairmen noted all residents are served in some manner by the 28 state and national UCS agencies which cover the fields of health, research, family and children, character-building and social welfare.

This year's drive kicked off on October 8, and will continue through November 2, working toward a goal of \$1,602,129.00 which includes a county goal of \$38,900.00. Both figures represent a 4 percent increase over last year.

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Thinking About Fall Plowing?

Thinking about fall plowing soon? Kent's Soil Conservation Directors suggest that you consider the damage that will occur by next spring. This close-up of a fall plowed clay loam field, May 12, shows what happens. The soil becomes packed and puddled. Loss of topsoil and run-off can be serious. Fall plowed soils really take a beating. Wind erosion blackens the snow when bare knolls are exposed. Farmers have found they can't get seed beds ready some years as early as when plowed at the right time in the spring. The drainage may be the answer for early spring plowing and planting. Also, there just isn't any grass or crop residue to further protect valuable top soil from getting away.
