## Secondary Boycott Holds Up New High School Job

Work has been held up this week by a secondary boycott by mechanical workers at the construction site of the new Lowell High School. An information picket appeared at the site last Friday for the second time, and members of the CIO-AFL mechanical trades union went off the job. Carpenters, masons and cement workers of the same union decided to stay at work in spite of threats of fines.

Architect Donn Palmer said Tuesday that a letter has gone out to the National Labor Board protesting this secondary boycott of a job by this union group and action should be forthcoming in a few days. The dispute is centered around the fact that the electrical workers belong to the Christian Labor Organization instead of the CIO-AFL construction workers. This group bid thousands of dollars on the electrical work for the new high school, and has refused to negotiate with other unions on both the Lowell elementary job and the Alto elementary job.

If the men continue to walk off the job, action will have to come through the National Labor Board, Mr. Palmer stated. The contractor is making every effort to inform his men that this walk-off is illegal and could cause many construction workers to be unemployed this winter.

## Ethel Graham Conolly Lowell Pioneer Passes

Mrs. Ethel Graham Conolly, aged 81, passed away in Battle Creek Monday morning, October 15, following a lingering illness at her home at 19 Enwood Street.

Services were held in Battle Creek and interment was made in Fairlains Cemetery.

Mrs. Conolly was born October 4, 1880, in Lowell Township, the daughter of Florence Jane Scribner and Thomas Robert Graham. She graduated from Lowell High School in 1902 and taught school for two years. After enrolling in a commercial banking course at Ferris Institute, she graduated in 1907 and accepted a position with a Grand Rapids Bank.

On January 17, 1904 she was united in marriage with George William Conolly, a conductor on the old Fruit Belt Railroad. They took up residence in Battle Creek in 1915, when Mr. Conolly joined the Grand Trunk Western Railroad.

Her father was an architect and constructed many of the buildings in Lowell and the Segwun Community. Her uncle, R. W. Graham donated the present Library and YMCA Building to the village fathers.

## Home Fires Cause Huge Property Damage

Pointing out that Michigan home fire last year caused 173 deaths and \$20 million in property damage, Det. Capt. Glenroy M. Walker, chief of the fire marshal division of the State Police, in a Fire Prevention Week appeal stressed the need for more common sense attention to fire hazards in dwellings.

The 19,245 home fires accounted for almost 30 per cent of all fires and the total dollar loss was the highest of all types of buildings burned, he said.

Of the fatalities occurring in home fires, 114 were adults and 59 were children.

Captain Walker cited the seven principal fire hazards in homes as follows: Carelessness in the use of matches and in smoking; defective heating apparatus; misuse of electricity; hot ashes and coals; defective chimneys; kitchen hazards, and mishandling of flammable liquids. Most fires are a result of human neglect and carelessness, he said.

He advised home owners to plan a course of action for members of the family in event of fire, especially because most occur at night. Local fire departments can assist in these home fire prevention and emergency evacuation plans, he said.

The school consists of 6 large classrooms, each with individual toilet rooms, work centers, and safety exits leading directly to the outside; one Kindergarten, complete with storage wall, creative work room, individual toilets, and coat room; wide corridors with convenient coat, boot and book racks along each side, School Office, Health room, All-Purpose room, Toilets for both public and team activities, Locker and Shower rooms, Kitchen, Storage areas and Boiler room.

The Architects designed the building so future additions could be constructed without interfering with a normal school year.

It was explained that this building was constructed at a total cost of approximately \$244,000, in-cludes \$230,000 building and \$14,000 for Kitchen Equipment.

The new Alto Area School incorporating many of the latest educational building features was patterned after the Runciman Elementary School. The building was divided into two parts, the Classroom area in the west portion and Activity area to the east, which includes the All-Purpose Room.

This spacious room with a large Stage on the east end will be used for the Gymnasium, Cafeteria, Auditorium and year-around after school and Community activities. A gleaming Kitchen adjoining the All-Purpose room to the north will serve hot lunches during the school year.

The school was constructed by TerHorst and Rinzema, general contractors, Kneese Heating, Holwerts-Huizenga Plumbing and Heating Co. and Feven and Windemuller Electric, all of Grand Rapids.

Since the school's opening the facilities of the building and the new all-purpose room have been used by the community for meetings, a square dance, a wedding reception, and other various activities.

The Alto Firemen will hold their annual pancake supper at the school on Thursday evening, October 25.



## SOIL and WATER Wessell-Mayou CONSERVATION Engagement Told

Our respects to the Henry Dreyer family, Tyrone Twp. As a West Kent District cooperator, Henry had made good use of his conservation plan. Muck drainage, tree planting and multiflora rose hedges were part of their plan. Henry was a conservation farmer. Soil and Water Conservation is for all landowners—rural, urban and suburban dwellers. The Soil Conservation Service offers assistance with erosion controls, reforestation, windbreaks and other land use problems which may affect any land owner.

We were pleased to assist Grace Bible College, Wyoming Twp., last week with what is known as a "rurban" conservation plan for their ten acre campus.

A 550 foot long three row windbreak on a steep slope has been planted. This area, 30 feet wide, was mulched to prevent further erosion. Three acres of white oak woodland on the north and east property lines will be conservation managed. An adjoining natural, wild-life area will be developed to become a fine wild-life sanctuary.

Two other serious erosion problems were found—damage from the September 13 storm to a natural waterway and steep slope erosion. Immediate controls are planned.

President and Mrs. Charles F. Baker, business manager Arthur Anderson and custodian John Oosterberger can feel justly proud of their new campus.

District director Ed Parmeter, Rockford, as usual, ranks high in Kents Soil Conservation Districts in winter cover crop planting. Ed broadcast three to four bushels of rye per acre on 230 acres early this month. No fertilizer was needed where potatoes had been harvested. Extra nitrogen was applied on other crop fields. Moisture has been ideal to produce a thick mat of cover for over winter.

Bernard Wolf, Byron Twp. is well satisfied with his 30 acres of field strips. "There is less erosion and my yields are improving," says Bernard.

We suggested Birdsfoot Trefolium for a trial on his steep, heavy land permanent pasture.

Our congratulations to Steve Carlson of Rockford, winner of the F.F.A. American Farmer degree, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Carlson, and to Fred Bertlett, F.F.A. advisor.

The Carlson's conservation plan was completed in 1960. They will see many instances of conservation "on the land" on their way to Kansas City.

We find an increasing number of young farmers conservation minded. James McIntyre, Courfloyd Twp., a former student of John Coady, (now principal) who taught "Ag" for many years at Cedar
