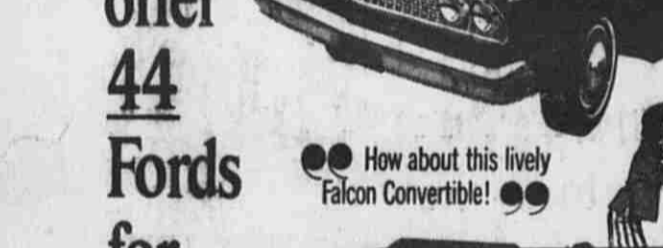

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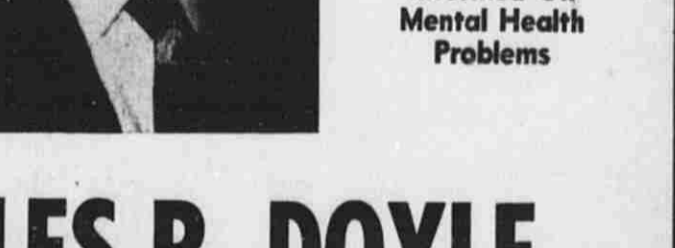

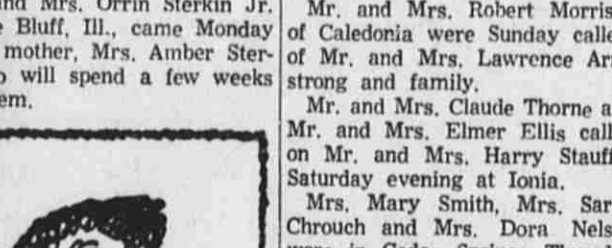

and review any order, requirement, decision or determination made by the Building Inspector charged with enforcement of any of the provisions of this Ordinance.

5. The Board of Appeals shall act upon all questions as they may arise in the administration of this Ordinance, including interpretation of the zoning maps.

6. Upon all appeals from any order, requirement, decision or determination of the Building Inspector, such appeal shall be taken and shall be determined by said Board of Appeals within such time as it is provided for by the rules and regulations of such Board. Upon such appeal, having been taken, the Building Inspector shall forthwith transmit to the Zoning Board of Appeals all the papers constituting the record which the action appealed from was taken.

7. Upon the hearing had, upon the appeal taken, as above stated, any interested party may in person or by agent or by attorney, and the Zoning Board of Appeals may reverse or affirm, wholly or partly, or may modify the order, requirement, decision or determination as in its opinion ought to be done, and to that end shall have all the powers of the Building Inspector from whom the appeal was taken.

CHAPTER 20 AMENDMENTS

Amendments and supplements to this Zoning Ordinance may be initiated by the Township Board upon its own motion, by the Township Zoning Board, or it may be proposed for consideration by the owner or owners of real estate within the Township; and all amendments to this Ordinance, with reference to the text thereof or the zoning of the land as appears on the zoning map shall be made in the same manner as provided in Act 184, Public Acts of 1943, as amended, for the enactment of this Ordinance.

Should any section, clause or provision of this Ordinance be declared by the Courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than the part declared to be invalid.

CHAPTER 22 VIOLATION AND PENALTY

1. Any building or structure which is erected, altered or moved into said Township or moved within the Township and maintained or used, and any use of land which is begun, maintained or changed in violation of any provisions of this Ordinance, is hereby declared to be a nuisance per se. Any person, firm, corporation or other organization which violates, disobeys, omits, neglects or refuses to comply with or resist the enforcement of any provision of this Ordinance, or any amendment thereof, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than One Dollar (\$1.00), nor more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, or shall be imprisoned in the County Jail for not more than ninety (90) days, or both, such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court before whom the conviction is had. Each and every day during which any illegal erection, construction, reconstruction, alteration, moving of buildings, or structures, maintenance or use shall continue, shall be deemed a separate offense.

2. The Township Board, by its duly constituted officers, the Building Inspector, the prosecuting attorney of the County of Kent, or the duly appointed attorney for the Township of Cascade, Kent County, Michigan, may cause complaint to be made for the violation of the provisions thereof.

3. In addition to the above named, any member of the Zoning Board of Appeals, or any person owning real estate in the Township, may institute appropriate Court proceedings to enjoin, abate and remove any such nuisance per se, or to prevent the continued violation of such Ordinance by and through their duly appointed attorney.

CHAPTER 23

The Township of Cascade, Kent County, Michigan, does hereby repeal that certain Zoning Ordinance approved and adopted on the 4th day of March, 1957, as amended.

CHAPTER 24 WHEN EFFECTIVE

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to become fully effective on the first day of December, 1962.

The foregoing Zoning Ordinance was enacted at a Special Meeting of the Cascade Township Board held on Monday, October 22, 1962.

Ada Township Issue 'Fire Ordinance'

The Ada Township Fire Department wish to announce to the people of that area, the following "Fire Ordinance."

Section 1. Title
This ordinance shall be known, and may be cited as the "Fire Prevention Ordinance of Ada Township."

Section 2. Definitions
For the purpose of this ordinance the following terms, phrases, words and their derivations shall have the meaning given herein.

a. "Township" is the Township of Ada.
b. "Person" is any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind.
c. "Board" is the Township Board of Ada Township.

Section 3. Hazardous Practices
a. No person shall throw or place, or cause or permit to be thrown, or placed, hot or burning substances or objects in, upon, or in close proximity to any public or private premises, objects or structure or in any public street or place, where there is any material or condition which is combustible, or liable to damage by heat, fire or explosion.
b. "Trash Burners." Trash burners shall be of metal or stone, or similarly non-combustible material, with solid walls, or heavy wire screen, or mesh having smoke ventilation or other openings, covered by wire screen or mesh, with holes not exceeding three quarters (3/4) of an inch in diameter.
c. "Bon Fires." No person shall burn or cause, or permit to be burned, any trash, rubbish, brush, grass, weeds, or anything else, within the township, without specific authorization in writing, as to time and place by the chief, or delegated member of the Fire Department. No person in spite of authorization to burn, shall burn, or cause or permit such burning in a careless or negligent manner.
d. "False Alarm." No person shall intentionally make, turn in, or give a false alarm of fire, or aid or abet in the commission of such act.

Section 4. Penalties
Any person violating any of the provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any amount not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or be imprisoned in the County Jail for a period not exceeding ninety (90) days, or be both fined and imprisoned in the discretion of the court. Each day such violation is committed or permitted to continue shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such here-under.

Take Note
Article 143, Paragraph 320, Section 8, of Public Acts 1923, State of Michigan: Any person who shall kindle a fire in or near, forest or grass, and leave unattended, or shall be a party of thereto, shall be punished by fine, imprisonment or both.

Cascade Township Liquor Ordinance

The Township of Cascade, Kent County, Michigan, ordains:

Section 1.
Any Beer-garden, Tavern or Restaurant shall hereafter have its license to sell alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises in this Township approved by the Township Board, only upon compliance with the terms and conditions of this Ordinance, excepting only those establishments specifically described in Section 10 hereof and then only on the conditions set forth in said Section 10.

Section 2.
No places where alcoholic beverages are sold for consumption on the premises shall be permitted, excepting those places that have been in business for one year at the time this Ordinance becomes effective, if said premises are:
a) Within 500 feet of an improved and equipped school ground or playground.
b) Within 500 feet of a church measured along the line of the nearest travelled route from the nearest point of the building on the proposed location to the nearest point of the church.
c) In residential zones.
d) Within 500 feet of residential zones, unless the application is accompanied by the written consent of 75 percent of the owners; including the husbands and/or wives thereof, of all residential property within 500 feet of the proposed location, or unless the same be located on a recognized commercial street where 3/4 of the frontage within 50 feet on both sides of said street each way, is devoted to some commercial use or use providing accommodation for transients.

e) On a street where, by virtue of density of traffic or other conditions, the proposed use would, in the judgment of the Township Board, constitute a traffic hazard.
f) At any place where, by reason of insufficient lighting or lack of police patrol, or other conditions, the proposed use would constitute a nuisance or a moral hazard, in the judgment of the Township Board.
g) At any place where, in the judgment of the Township Board, by reason of insufficient parking facilities, traffic conditions, construction and condition of premises involved, sanitary conditions, or other conditions, the proposed use would or would be likely to constitute a traffic, safety or health hazard.

Section 3.
In addition to the requirements of Section 2 of this Ordinance, all places where alcoholic beverages are sold for consumption on the premises, excepting those places that have been in business for one year at the time this Ordinance becomes effective, shall comply with the following requirements:
a) The consumption of alcoholic spirits on the premises in Cascade Township shall be limited to

those places and establishments where such alcoholic spirits are sold in conjunction with the operation of a bonafide, full time restaurant business, on the same premises meeting the following minimum requirements:
Such restaurant shall have a minimum seating capacity at tables for 100 patrons, and
Such restaurant shall have immediately adjacent thereto parking facilities shall be on a public street or right of way. Such parking facilities shall, in addition, provide sufficient clear area for the manipulation of automobiles that no automobile shall have to travel in reverse at the time of entering a public street or right of way when leaving said parking facilities.

Therefore, the Township Board shall not approve the application for any license for consumption of alcoholic beverages on the premises unless the conditions of this Section are also satisfied.

Section 4.
The owner, or owners, as well as the agents and servants of the owner or owners, actually engaged in the operation of a place of business, licensed to sell alcoholic beverages on the premises, shall at all times be responsible for the conduct of occupants and patrons. No disorderly, loud or boisterous conduct shall be permitted nor shall any entertainment be given or permitted which is offensive or indecent in its nature. A substantial portion of the front windows shall at all times be clear of curtains, screens or objects which would tend to obstruct vision into the establishment from the front and outside of the premises. No booths shall be permitted which are completely enclosed or capable of being either permanently or temporarily completely enclosed, or locked or with partitions higher than 4 feet from the floor. All places must have separate toilet facilities for men and women.

Section 5.
All applications for licenses to

sell alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises, or renewals thereof, shall be upon forms provided by the Michigan Liquor Control Commission, and shall be filed with the Township Clerk. If the application is for a place of business in a district mentioned in Section 2(d), it shall be accompanied by the written consent required by Section 2(d) before it shall be transmitted to the Township Board, and before any action shall be taken thereon. The Township Clerk shall transmit all applications to the Kent County Sheriff, and recommendations regarding the same shall be made in writing by that officer before action is taken. The Township Board shall also have the power to appoint a special committee to consider and report back to it concerning such application. Applications may be refused for any reason which the Township Board shall deem adequate; provided, however, that no application shall be approved if the applicant, any associate, or partner of the applicant has been previously convicted of an offense relating to the manner in which the establishment has been conducted or has been convicted of an offense involving the sale, possession, or use of intoxicating liquor or has been found guilty of any offense involving moral turpitude.

Section 6.
No applicant for a liquor license for sale of alcoholic beverages on the premises shall be approved by the Township Board while a such person or his predecessor or transferee shall be in default to the Township or Kent County in connection with any obligation for taxes or otherwise.

Section 7.
No alcoholic beverages shall be sold or served on the premises of any place licensed under this Ordinance on any City or State primary or general election day, and also on Christmas Day and Sunday, and prior to 2 a. m. of the following day. In all other respects the sale or service of alcoholic beverages shall be as provided by State statute.

Section 8.
Should any portion of this Ordinance be declared illegal or unconstitutional, the remaining portions hereof shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 9.
Any person violating any provisions of this Ordinance upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, and cost of prosecution, or by imprisonment in the Kent County Jail for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

Section 10.
Nothing in this Ordinance shall be considered to change the requirements for the renewal of any license to sell beer and wine in any establishment in Cascade Township which has been licensed to sell beer and wine for twelve (12) consecutive months preceding the effective date of this Ordinance, provided the application for renewal is (1) limited to the premises previously licensed, and (2) the premises are not enlarged and (3) the sale of alcoholic beverages is limited to beer and wine.

Section 11.
This Ordinance is declared to become effective on the 1st day of December, 1962.

The foregoing ordinance was enacted at a Special meeting of the Cascade Township Board held on Monday, October 22, 1962.

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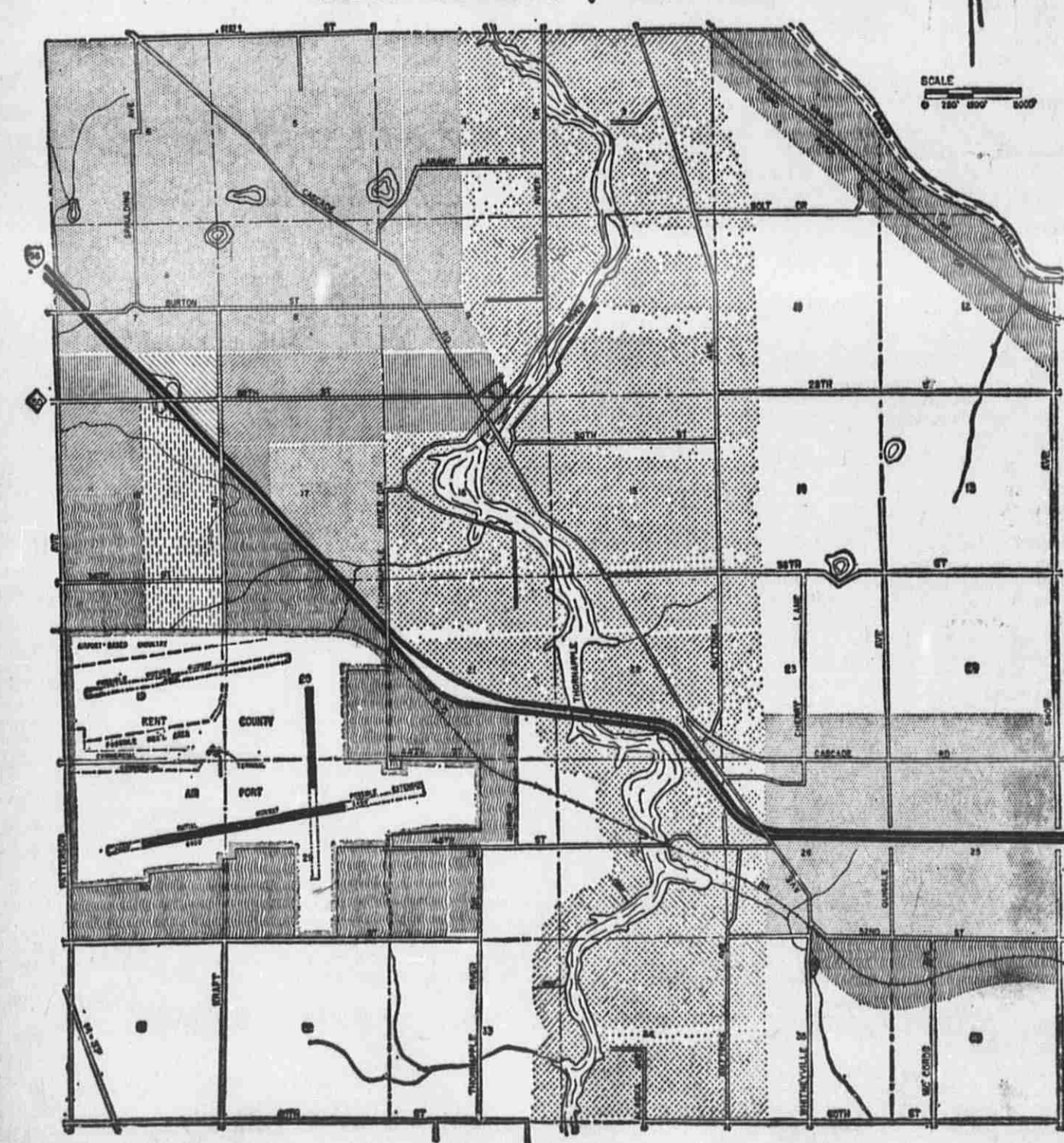
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
