



b. "Trash Burners." c, "Bon Fires." No person shall burn or cause, or permit to be burned, any trash, rubbish, brush, grass, weeds, or anything else, within the township, without specific authorization in writing, as to time and place by the chief, or delegated member of the Fire Department. No person in spite of authorization to burn, shall burn, or cause or permit such burning


