Hold Annual Meeting Of Federal Land Bank

The Federal Land Bank Association of Grand Rapids will hold its annual stockholders' meeting Thursday, November 1, 1962, at 10:45 a. m. in the Allendale Township Hall, Allendale, Michigan.

The Federal Land Bank Association, located at 468 Kinney Road N. W., Grand Rapids, is a member cooperative which makes first mortgages on rural property. The Association serves 1100 members in Kent, Allegan, Ottawa and Muskegon Counties. The present loan volume is six million outstanding. Manager Paulus Haller states this is an increase of \$500,000 over last year. The Association also paid out over \$13,000 in dividends to stockholders this year.

The main business of the meeting will be for the members to elect three directors for a three year term. Present directors whose terms expire this year are: Royal J. Klein, Kent County-Fruit Ridge area; Gordon K. Babbitt, western Allegan County area and Leroy A. Vogel, northern Ottawa-Muskegon Counties area. Other members of the Board of Directors are: David E. Hanson, Francis C. Campau, Kent County; Thomas M. Kelsey, Allegan County; and William Ponslein, Ottawa County.

STIFF LIP

He was a brittle old man, with eggshell-thin skin and a shock of unbelievably white hair. His face was remarkably unlined, and he always seemed to be nattily dressed, though I suppose some might have said that his lapels or ties were a trifle too wide, or his collar points too long.

In his last years he may have carried a cane—already I can't remember for sure—but his walk always seemed spry and evoked youthfulness. He may have seen you with fading eyesight, but he always looked right at you and he always smiled. And he was perceptive—in a kindly way; he may have "seen" through you, but he never "looked" through you. He listened—sometimes impatiently, to be sure, but always attentively—when you talked, but you soon learned that he was the one who should be doing the talking, and you were the one who should be listening.

But listening to him took time—more time, perhaps, than most of us had. I once visited with him on the front porch of his home, expecting in half an hour to take a picture and discover enough facts about him to be able to write a respectable news story on his 60th wedding anniversary.

Two and a half hours later, I was still there—and he was still going strong. The story? It was one of the longest I ever wrote—and perhaps one of the best.

In a way he reminded me of my grandfather, who loved to recall the Boston of his boyhood. Like Papa's recollections, his anecdotes were legion—and seemingly never-ending. He was garrulous; he stoke in parentheses, and in parentheses within parentheses, but, if you took the trouble to listen, you received a complete portrait of an earlier era—one with which no centennial book could compete. He was around, for example, when the Great Fire of nineteen-ought-something-or-other ravaged an entire block of business establishments in Lowell, and he recalled with justifiable pride that his was one of the first stores to re-open in the new building which rose from the ashes.

He could remember that day in 1898 when the news from Guantanamo Bay arrived—and he could remember it more vividly than I could remember first hearing of Auschwitz. He could remember the great floods which washed through town, and the inexplicable diseases which carried off friends despite his medicines, and the snow storms which kept all horses and cutters at home in the barn.

His name was Myron Norton Henry; he was "M. N." to some, "Nort" to others, "Old Snort Henry" to the disrespectful, "Mr. Henry" to few. He died a few weeks ago—fittingly enough at his rambling old home at the corner of Main and Jefferson where he had lived so many of his 88 years. He will be missed.

Judge John T. Lettys of Grand Rapids will be the speaker at the Laymen's Sunday services at the local Methodist Church next Sunday. He will speak at both services, 8:45 and 11:00 a. m. His subject will be, "Complacent Christians."

Judge Lettys is a native of Mecosta County, attended public school in Lansing, received his A.B. from Wilberforce University of Wilburforce, Ohio, attended Boston University Law School and graduated from Suffolk University Law School. He passed his state bar examinations in 1953. He served as counselor at Southern Michigan prison, as parole officer in Detroit and Grand Rapids, and as assistant Kent County prosecutor before being elected municipal judge of Grand Rapids.

Judge Lettys served as captain in the army in World War II and saw combat duty in Africa and Italy. He was awarded the purple heart in February 1945.

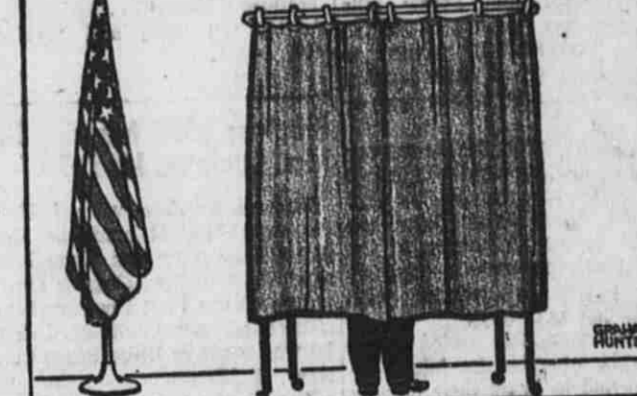

Restoring Old Cars Big Business Says Henry Ford Museum Curator Antique cars are a big hobby and a big business, with thousands of fans all over the nation and individual collections of up to 800 vintage autos. More than 300 vehicles manufactured between 1899 and 1925 will turn out for the Festival, being put through their paces by colorfully-costumed drivers. The Detroit area-naturally-is center of the beat end of the antique car hobby. Airport Ordinance As Adopted October 29, 1962

Lessor shall deduct its reasonable costs of performance thereof from any rentals, fees or charges as aforesaid.
ARTICLE X UTILITY SERVICES
Lessor shall with arrangement with appropriate utility companies or suppliers, supply Lessee with electrical current and gas, and shall charge Lessee for such utility services at rates not exceeding those which Lessee would have to pay if it established the same demand and took the same quantity directly from such utility companies or suppliers, and shall direct supply Lessee with water and sewerage facilities and shall charge Lessee for such facilities at rates established by Lessor to be charged generally to all users to whom such facilities are furnished by Lessor.
Lessor, without expense to Lessee, shall provide any necessary license or easement necessary for telephone service to be brought to the take-off points upon the premises hereunder leased to Lessee.
Lessor, without expense to Lessee, shall construct, or cause to be constructed, adequate roadways and taxways connecting the leased premises with the other roadways, taxways and runways on the Airport.
ARTICLE XI RULES AND REGULATIONS

This Article is inserted by reason of the provisions of Section 4 of Act No. 251, Public Act 1957, of the State of Michigan, 1957, and the same is to be considered a part of this agreement to the extent that such law applies to this agreement.
ARTICLE XIII INSURANCE
Lessor shall, during the term of this lease, insure and keep insured to the extent of the insurable value thereof, all buildings and structures constructed by it upon the Building Site referred to in Article I hereof, against loss or damage by fire and such hazards and risks as are normally covered by endorsements for extended coverage. All such policies of insurance and renews thereof shall insure the Lessor and the Lessee as their interests may appear. However, interests of the persons whose interests are insured, proceeds of all such policies shall be applied as provided in Article XVI hereof. Lessor shall furnish Lessee with certificates showing such insurance to be in effect with premiums paid.
Lessor shall, during the term of this lease, carry liability insurance in an amount not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) for any one accident covering both personal injury and property damage, which insurance will protect both Lessor and Lessee. Lessor shall furnish Lessee with certificates showing such insurance to be in effect with premiums paid.
ARTICLE XIV DAMAGE OR DESTRUCTION OF PREMISES ON BUILDING SITE
Notwithstanding the provisions of Article VII as to maintenance, repair and operation of the premises by Lessee, if any building or other capital improvement constructed pursuant to Article III of this agreement upon the Building Site leased by Lessee for its exclusive use hereunder shall be partially damaged or totally destroyed by fire, the elements, the pub-

lic enemy or other casualty covered by the fire and extended coverage to be maintained by Lessee as provided in Article XIII hereof, the premises shall be repaired or replaced with due diligence by Lessor.
In the making of the repair and replacement herein contemplated, the proceeds of insurance coverage, if any, shall be used by Lessor to the extent of the obligation to repair or restore shall be limited to the amount of such proceeds made available to it.
If any such building or other capital improvement is completely destroyed by fire or other hazard or risk normally covered by endorsements for extended coverage, or so damaged that a material part of the same will or does remain untenable for more than thirty (30) days, the ground rent payable under the provisions of Article I hereof for the Building Site upon which the said destroyed or damaged premises are erected, shall be proportionately paid up to the time of such damage or destruction and shall thereupon cease until such time as the said building or other capital improvement shall be fully restored.
ARTICLE XV TAXES
Lessor covenants and agrees that it will pay, when due, all taxes which may be assessed pursuant to law against any of its property located on the leased premises or on any business conducted by it, and will annually within thirty (30) days after the end of each calendar year furnish to Lessee certain copies of the schedule of taxes which might be a lien against the lease or against the personal property of Lessee have been paid in full.
ARTICLE XVI RATES AND CHARGES OF LESSEE, ARBITRATION
Lessee will, on the date of the commencement of the term of this lease, file with the Lessor its schedule of rates and charges, covering hangar rental fees, charges for tie-downs and charges for fuel. Any charges, revisions, or additions to the original schedule so filed shall immediately be filed with the Lessor. In the event Lessee determines any such rates or charges are unreasonable, and no agreement in relation thereto is reached between Lessor and Lessee, either party may, by notice in writing to the other, submit the controversy or claim to arbitration. The party desiring such arbitration shall give written notice to that effect to the other party, specifying in said notice the name and address of the person designated to act as arbitrator, and the other party shall give written notice to that effect to the person designated to act as arbitrator, or on its behalf. The arbitrators thus appointed shall appoint a third disinterested person of recognized competence in this field, and such three arbitrators shall as promptly as possible determine the controversy or claim.
If the two arbitrators appointed by the parties shall be unable to agree upon the appointment of a third arbitrator within fifteen (15) days after the appointment of the second arbitrator, then within fifteen (15) days thereafter either of the parties upon written notice to the other party, on behalf of both, shall request the appointment of a disinterested person of recognized competence in the field involved as the third arbitrator by the Presiding Judge of the Circuit Court (17th Judicial Circuit) of the State of Michigan, County of Kent, and the other party shall not raise any question as to the Court's full power and jurisdiction to entertain the application and make the appointment.
The decision in which any two of the three arbitrators so appointed and acting hereunder, concur shall in all cases be binding and conclusive upon the parties. Each party shall pay the fees and expense of the arbitrator appointed by such party and one-half of the other expenses of the arbitration properly incurred hereunder.
Each of the parties hereto agree that if, in the opinion of the other party, any separate agreement is required by law in order to enforce or facilitate the arbitration provisions hereinabove contained, it will execute such separate agreement, provided that the same is not inconsistent with the terms and provisions of this agreement.
ARTICLE XVII CANCELLATION BY LESSOR
Lessor may cancel this agreement by giving Lessee sixty (60) days' advance written notice to be served as hereinafter provided, upon or after the happening of any one of the following events:
(a) the filing by Lessee of a voluntary petition in bankruptcy;

joint negligence of Lessor and any person other than Lessee; and provided further, that each of the parties shall give to the other party prompt and timely notice of any claim made or suit instituted which in any way directly or indirectly, contingently or otherwise, affects or might affect either party.
ARTICLE XXI QUIET ENJOYMENT
Lessor agrees that, on payment of the rentals, fees and charges as herein provided and performance of the covenants and agreements on the part of Lessee to be performed hereunder, Lessee shall peacefully have and enjoy the leased premises and all the rights and privileges of the Airport, its appurtenances and facilities granted hereunder.
ARTICLE XXII TITLE TO EQUIPMENT, IMPROVEMENTS AND FACILITIES ERECTED BY LESSEE
It is agreed that title to any equipment, improvements and facilities, and any additions thereto, irrespective of whether the same would otherwise become a fixture under Michigan law (including without limitation all buildings, hangars, structures, storage tanks, pipes, pumps, wires, poles, machinery, air conditioning equipment, constructed or installed by Lessee upon the premises leased hereunder to Lessee for its exclusive use, shall remain the property of Lessee, unless it has at any time during the term of this agreement been written notice to Lessor, to the effect that the same are to be conveyed to Lessor, in which case title to the same shall vest in Lessor.
Notwithstanding the provisions of Article XIV and XVIII hereof, if the provisions of this Article XIX, there shall be no abatement of capital improvement rentals if the capital improvements for which the Lessee pays such rentals become untenable by reason of fire or other casualty or the use thereof restricted as hereinabove provided. However, the lease term for such capital improvement made so untenable or with respect to which the Lessee's use has been restricted shall be extended for a period equal to the period such capital improvement was so untenable or the use thereof restricted as hereinabove provided. No waiver of default by Lessor of any of the terms, covenants or conditions hereof to be performed, kept and observed by Lessee, shall be construed to be a waiver of any subsequent default of any of the terms, covenants and conditions hereof to be performed, kept and observed by Lessee.
ARTICLE XXIII SURRENDER OF POSSESSION
Upon the expiration or earlier termination of this agreement or any renewal hereof, Lessee shall forthwith surrender possession of the premises in as good condition as when received, reasonable wear and tear, damage by flood, fire, earthquake, other casualty, Acts of God or the public enemy, excepted.
ARTICLE XXIV MINERAL RIGHTS
It is agreed and understood that

whenever the terms "person" and "persons" are used in this agreement, they shall be construed as including individuals, firms, corporations and other legal entities.
ARTICLE XXV CONDEMNATION
Upon the acquisition by condemnation or the exercise of the power of eminent domain under any Federal or State statute by the Federal Government, the State of Michigan, or any Federal or State agency or other person vested with such power, or any part or permanent interest in all or any part of the Airport, including without limitation, the premises leased hereunder, the Lessor and the Lessee shall have the right to appear and file a claim for damages, to the extent of its respective interest, in the condemnation or eminent domain proceeding, to participate in and appear at, and to receive and accept therefrom, such amount as may lawfully be entitled to receive as damages or payment as a result of such acquisition.
ARTICLE XXVI ASSIGNMENT AND SUBLETTING
Lessee shall not at any time assign this agreement to any other person without the consent in writing of Lessor.
Provided, that the foregoing shall not prevent the assignment of this agreement to the United States Government or any agency thereof, nor shall it prevent Lessee from subletting T-hanger space to any person, firm or corporation. No such subletting, however, shall release Lessee from its obligation to pay any and all of the rentals, charges and fees provided hereunder.
ARTICLE XXVII NOTICES
Notices to Lessor provided herein shall be sufficient if sent by registered mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the Kent County Board of Aeronautics, 2300 Madison Avenue, S. E., Grand Rapids, Michigan, and notices to Lessee, if sent by registered mail, postage prepaid, addressed to Northern Air Service, 3200 Madison Avenue, S. E., Grand Rapids, Michigan, or to such other respective address as the parties may designate to each other in writing from time to time, or to such other mailing address as may be adopted by either Lessor or Lessee.
ARTICLE XXVIII DEFINITION OF TERMS
Whenever the term "Federal Aviation Agency" is used in this agreement, it shall be construed as referring to the Federal Aviation Agency created by the Civil Aeronautics Act of 1958, or to such other Federal Government authority as may be the successor thereto or be vested with the same or similar authority.
Whenever the terms "aircraft or other equipment of Lessee" and "Lessee's aircraft and other equipment" are used in this agreement, they shall be construed as including airplanes, helicopters and every other conveyance now or hereafter used for the navigation of aircraft in air and other equipment owned, operated or used by Lessee.
ARTICLE XXIX OPTION TO LEASE ADDITIONAL LAND
Lessor grants to Lessee the right, exercisable during the first five years of the term hereof, to lease additional land adjoining on the west the premises described in Article I for the construction and operation of two groups of ten each T-hangers, and service taxways to the terminal of each aircraft apron, at a rental of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) per year per acre, which rental shall be payable monthly in advance in accordance with the following:

ARTICLE XXX PARAGRAPH HEADINGS
The paragraph headings contained herein are for convenience in reference and are not intended to define or limit the scope of any provision of this agreement.
ARTICLE XXXI INVALID PROVISIONS
In the event any covenant, condition or provision herein contained is held to be invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, the invalidity of any such covenant, condition or provision shall not affect any other covenant, condition or provision herein contained, or provision hereof, including but not limited to Section 113 of Public Act 327 of 1945 as amended (Michigan Statutes Annotated, Section 113.23). Lessor agrees that Lessee shall at the end of the term of this lease, and provided that this lease does not sooner terminate as herein provided, have the right to lease said premises for a further term thereafter at such rates and for such term and on such conditions as Lessee would at such time be willing to lease said premises to any other person, firm or corporation, it being the intention of Lessor to grant to Lessee what is commonly called a right of first refusal. Provided, however, that the provisions hereof shall not apply if Lessor determines that the leased premises should be used for other than the same or substantially similar purposes as provided for in Article II hereof.
