Red Arrows Settle For Second Place

The Lowell Red Arrows had to settle for 2nd place in the Tri-River Conference Friday night, when a strong running Rockford team defeated them 25-14.

Lowell suffered an early blow when senior halfback Lloyd Slack suffered a shoulder separation on the first defensive play of the game for the Arrows.

The first half was dominated by Lowell, who took advantage of Rockford fumbles and intercepted passes. McMahon scored Lowell's first touchdown with 2:37 to go in the first quarter after the Arrows had taken the ball on a sustained drive from their own 47 to the Rockford 2 where he plunged over. Abel smashed over for the point.

Rockford evened the score to 7-7 just 30 seconds before the first half ended on a pass play covering 55 yards from quarterback West to Fisher. Nicol ran for the point. In the first half Lowell led in first downs 7 to 3. Junior fullback Dan Cook, 190 lbs. of dynamite broke the game wide open on the fourth play after the half, when he took the ball down the sidelines 40 yards to score behind good interference. Later in the 3rd period Cook took the ball 35 yards into score, leading 19-7.

In the final period Rockford blocked a Lowell punt taking over on the Arrows 30. Cook stormed to the Lowell 8; two plays later Nicol took the ball in from the 4. Lowell made its final touchdown with only 28 seconds left in the game against the Rockford bench warmers on a pass from Kropf to McMahon on a 33-yard pass play.

Kropf plunged over for the extra point, making the final score 25-14.

Ann Mullen Trains For Peace Corps Work

Ann S. Mullen, 203 N. Jefferson, Lowell, is among 32 Peace Corps volunteers who have arrived at the University of Kansas to train for a project in Costa Rican secondary and higher education.

Miss Mullen's work will be as a teaching assistant in English.

The volunteers will receive 8 weeks of intensive preparation in technical subjects, world affairs and communism, Latin American area and American civilization studies, and health, medical and physical training.

They will be taught by a staff of more than 60 K. U. faculty members, plus special off-campus speakers.

Their arrival on campus marked the beginning of Peace Corps Week, planned entirely by K. U. students. The activity-filled observance ended November 2, with an all-University convocation featuring Warren W. Wiggins, associate director of the Peace Corps.

Local Men Bowlers Take Tourney in Grand Rapids

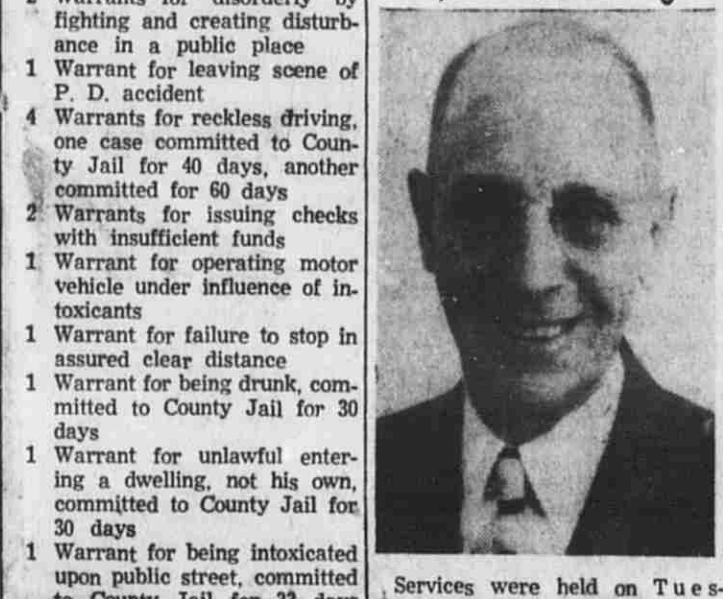
On October 6th, ten bowlers from Lowell bowled in the President-Secretary Doubles Tournament held at the Miracle Lanes in Grand Rapids.
