## Report Satisfactory Progress On New High School, Sell Morse Lake School

Lowell Area Schools board of education, Monday night, heard a report of Donnelly Palmer, architect of the new high school which revealed that the new building in spite of the labor trouble was making satisfactory progress.

The board was told that a settlement has been reached between the contractors and the union, so that no more information signs are to be placed on jobs where union and non-union prime contractors are working. In the future, Architect Palmer declared, the owners may assign prime contractors as they wish but a union prime contractor may only take bids from sub-contractors who employ union laborers. Union plumbers were the only group to stay off the Lowell High School job and they now are approaching their original schedule by the use of more men on the job.

## Invitations Out For Library Meeting

Government officials and other civic leaders from Lowell, Ada and Cascade, with other county officials, will receive invitations this week to attend a regional Governor's Conference on Libraries December 4 at the Grace Episcopal church, Hall and Plymouth in Grand Rapids.

A dinner meeting at 6:30 p. m. will be followed by a public meeting at 7:30 p. m., according to Marion Vos, general chairman of the planning committee. The Kent county meeting is the sixteenth of 19 regional meetings being held in Michigan as follow-ups of the First Governor's Conference on Libraries held September 19 in Lansing, when 1,000 persons gathered in the Civic center there to launch a strong state-wide citizen's movement for better library service in Michigan.

The regional meetings include speakers and discussions on Michigan's library needs, study of a new proposed state aid formula, and a call for local action to reach the goal of good library service for all Michigan residents. Miss Genevieve Casey, State Librarian, has stated, "At present, Michigan has some one million residents without local service and thousands with inadequate service."

Mayor Robert W. Richardson of East Grand Rapids will welcome the group. Included in the program will be a film on the September 19 conference highlighting a new state aid formula for public libraries being proposed by the State Board of Libraries. Miss Casey will further explain this formula under the theme, "Patterns for Progress." Following the presentation, a general discussion on what the specific implications of the old formula would be for libraries in Kent county will be led by Mrs. Ruth Frame, State Library consultant for this area.

A reactor panel composed of Mrs. Lester Carpenter, East Grand Rapids, Miss Grace Hamilton, Sedar Springs, Mrs. Daniel N. Lipke, Grand Rapids and Robert VanderLaan, Paris township will question Mrs. Frame. Discussion by the entire group will follow.

Libraries in the county which are included in the discussion are Cedar Springs, Grand Rapids, Kent County, Rockford and Sparta.

## Summer Theatre To Open In 1963, Four Miles West of Cascade

Melody Circus of Grand Rapids, a professional summer tent theater being organized to produce musical comedies, Thursday signed a 10-year lease on an 11-acre site 4 miles south of Cascade, at M-37 and 28th Street. The theater plans to open its premiere, 2-week season on June 17, 1963.

The property is being leased from John D. Loeks, Grand Rapids theater owner, promoter and owner of the Cascade Motor Inn, which is on property adjacent to the Melody Circus site.

Ted Brink, vice president and producer of the new theater project, reported, "The experience of summer musical theater in other parts of the country indicates that our primary audience area will cover a 65-mile radius from Grand Rapids. For theater patrons from other cities, our new site is ideal."

He pointed out that the site is at the intersection and junction of M-37, US-131 by-pass and M-11, which connects I-96 and M-21. This means that it is easily reached by resident of Battle Creek, Kalamazoo, Lansing, Holland, Rockford, Greenville and Big Rapids. With freeway networks completed north of Grand Rapids, the site is also readily accessible to residents of Muskegon, Grand Haven and Haven and Spring Lake.

Access roads will be built into the property from M-37 and US-131 by-pass (28th Street, S. E.). A parking lot for 750 cars will be constructed.

A large tent, with a seating capacity of 2,100 persons, will be erected on the site, as will permanent buildings for rehearsal, dressing rooms, storage, set construction, concessions and box office.

Construction will begin in the spring of 1963. Included will be excavation at the tent site. Melody Circus productions will be presented arena style. The circular, 35-foot stage, will be in the center of the excavation, and only a few tiers of seats will be above ground level.

Loeks, representatives of Melody Circus and Paris Township officials will meet soon to work out details on traffic, safety and other matters involving township participation.

Brink added, "With the decision made on our site, we can now concentrate on play selection and casting. Starring and principal roles will be filled by Hollywood, Broadway and TV stars, and our singing and dancing chorus will be all professional."

## John Koewers Injured In Motorcycle Crash

John Koewers, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Koewers, 414 North Jefferson Street, Lowell, is in Butterworth Hospital seriously injured after he crashed into a car at the intersection of East Main Street and Broadway at 6:15 Monday evening.

The accident occurred, Lowell Police Officer Avery Block reported when Koewers who was riding his motor scooter east on Main St. crashed into a car driven by Franz Mayer, 51, who was making a left turn off Broadway onto Main Street.

Koewers told the officer that he attempted to swerve around the corner when Mayer appeared in front of him, but he skidded into the front fender of the Mayer car. Koewers suffered a broken lower leg, broken hip and severe cuts on the leg and foot his parents reported.

Mr. Mayer is an officer in the C. H. Runciman Sortex Division, with offices at 210 East Main St. Officer Block said on Wednesday that he has not completed his investigation of the accident.

## Cuban Crisis Awakens Civil Defense

Were you scared last week when you suddenly realized that a fallout shelter, jugs of water, canned goods and batteries for the portable radio could be the difference between life and death? You weren't alone! Many of us discovered we weren't very well equipped to stay alive.

As a nation, we've spent vast sums on civil defense and largely, because of public apathy it hasn't meant much. It was chilling to hear last week, when the heat was on, that self-survival was all the advice that came from civil defense officials.

Kent County and Grand Rapids are examples of what happens when public apathy takes over. Kent County cancelled civil defense funds and when former city manager Rypstra included civil defense funds in the budget, they were cut to the bone. Few people objected...few people seemed to care, one way or the other.

We suppose that civil defense can be likened to the fellow with the leaky roof. When the sun's shining he doesn't need to fix it, when it's raining, he can't. There's one difference. Rain on the roof, if you aren't prepared, can be uncomfortable...a bomb on the roof, if you aren't prepared can be fatal.

If last week had meant war, we'd have 15 minutes warning if the bombs came from Russia...no warning at all, if they came from Cuba.

Last week should prove, that when and if we need civil defense preparations, they'd better be ready and waiting.

One pertinent question keeps intruding...what is so unpopular about staying alive...and working a little to do it.

## George F. Johnson Services Here Tuesday

Funeral services for George F. Johnson, 74, former Grand Rapids educator and business executive who died Saturday of a heart attack at his home on Burroughs Drive, Lowell, were held Tuesday afternoon at the Roth Chapel in Lowell.

A native of Philadelphia, Mr. Johnson was a graduate of Wesleyan University in Middletown, Conn., and later received his masters degree from the University of Chicago.

He moved to Grand Rapids in 1923, teaching shop classes at South High School until the early 1930's when he became director of vocational guidance at the former Davis Technical High School. From 1941 until his retirement in 1948 he was personnel manager at Wolverine Brass Works.

Surviving are a son, Dr. Dana Johnson, assistant professor of chemistry at Kansas State University in Manhattan, Kansas, two daughters, Mrs. D. W. (Portia) Spriggs of Peoria, Illinois, and Mrs. Priscilla Lussmyer of Grandville; four brothers, two sisters and 10 grandchildren.

Burial was made in Restlawn Memorial Park.

## Lowell To Receive \$5,319 Road Money

The State Highway Department has been distributing third quarter Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections to Michigan counties and incorporated cities and villages. Lowell's share is \$5,319.00.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said net receipts of the Highway Fund during July, August and September of 1962, amounted to \$44,490,352, an increase of \$2,301,033 over the same period of 1961.

Gross collections during the third quarter amounted to \$46,267,158, from which collections costs of \$1,556,953 and the Waterways Commission's share amounting to \$219,853 were deducted. Kent County will receive \$649,593.00.

All state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes, license plate fees and a small amount of miscellaneous fees are deposited in the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund.

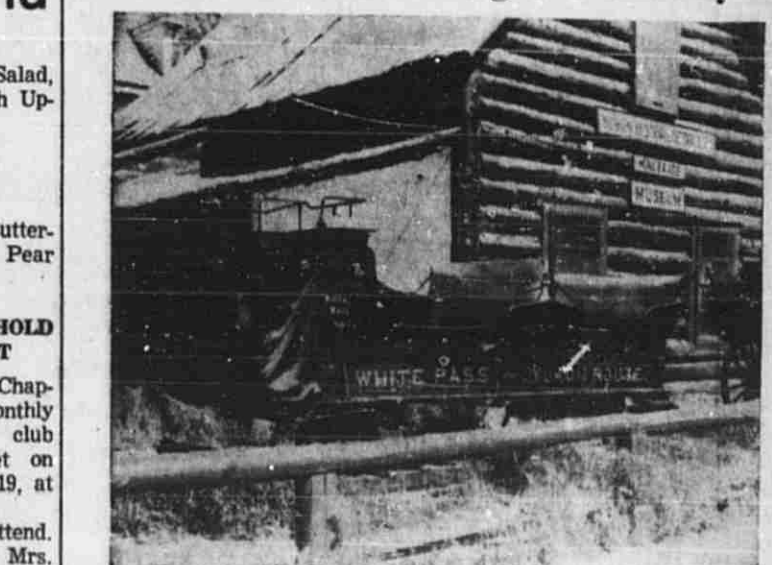
Eleven six-week-old pigs belonging to O. E. Bieri, Route 1, Lowell, were killed on Monday morning by the C & O switch engine.

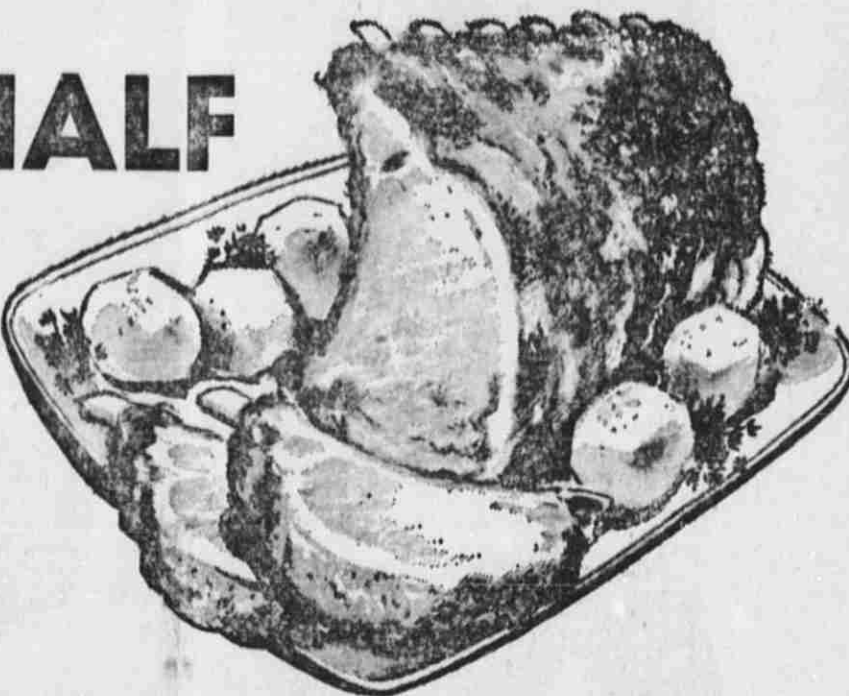

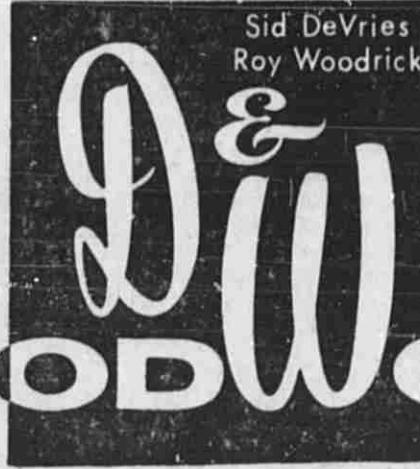
