

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

In fact, foresters at Michigan State University estimate that millions of maple trees are literally tery. one of the state's greatest "untapped resources," to coin a play on words.

Why? It simply costs too much to get the sap out and buy the equipment for a jet-age sugar bush operation. The investment may be several thousand dollars. There are two trends that may step up production. First, farmers may get together and form a cooperative to cut the costs for needed sap gathering and evaporation equipment. Secondly, a number of commercial processors now buy maple sap from farmers and process it in a central plant.

So, while the colorful sugar camp may go the way of the covered bridge, there still will be maple syrup. The development of a paraformaldehyde pellet by MSU researchers can increase sap flow as much as 50 per cent and promises to be a big aid to the industry.
