## Planning, Zoning Boards Compromise; Limit Commercial Area On West Main St.

At a joint meeting of the Lowell Planning Commission, Zoning Board and City Council on Monday evening a compromise solution was apparently reached with James Hainer, attorney for Lowell Development Company, to allow a limited area on West Main Street to be zoned commercial.

The entire dispute started last July when the council voted to change the zoning in the area from residential to commercial, from city limit to city limit, on Main Street. Soon after this action was taken they employed Scott Bagby as planning consultant, who immediately pointed out that this violated all zoning principals. They have been in process of changing

back to residential in part of this area since early fall.

**Bagby Supports Stand**

Scott Bagby, Lowell planning and zoning consultant, led off the discussion on Monday night giving a brief summary of his views on strip development in communities such as Lowell. In the long run, he revealed zoning of the entire length of Main Street would destroy the present business district as it now exists and injure the entire city. Business establishments built beyond the present business district add valuation to the city, but takes away far more than it adds in the old business district.

Bagby pointed out that a shopping community of a certain size will only support so many business places. When the area is encouraged to build outside the present boundaries the old section of the city suffers and depreciates the entire business district. Proper zoning will encourage a compact business district and strengthen the city.

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## Student Council To Hold 'Bundle Days'

In response to Save the Children Federation's report that "Devastating spring floods in the Southern Appalachian Mountain region resulting from the hardest winter in 76 years have nearly depleted our clothing supply," the Student Council of Lowell area schools will launch its annual Bundle Days Used Clothing Collection on March 4-8 in behalf of the needy children and adults of the American Southern Mountain area and elsewhere.

States Student Council Advisor, Richard Bezie, "Clothing will be contributed in communities throughout the country in cooperation with Save the Children Federation, leading U. S. educators and more than six million students. Both summer and winter shoes and garments are needed—coats, dresses, suits, underwear. We strongly urge our citizens to respond generously to the call and to contribute good wearable clothing that is outgrown but not worn out. The clothing should be taken or sent to the Lowell Area schools. Student Council members will pick it up daily.

Save the Children Federation, the 30-year-old, non-sectarian, international welfare organization, is registered with the U. S. State Department Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid. Children are aided by the Federation through sponsorships, family, school and community self-help projects and the annual collection of used clothing. The Federation helps American Indian children, children in the Southern Appalachian Mountains and in many countries overseas.

**Health Nurse Addresses Mothers' Club; 35 Present**

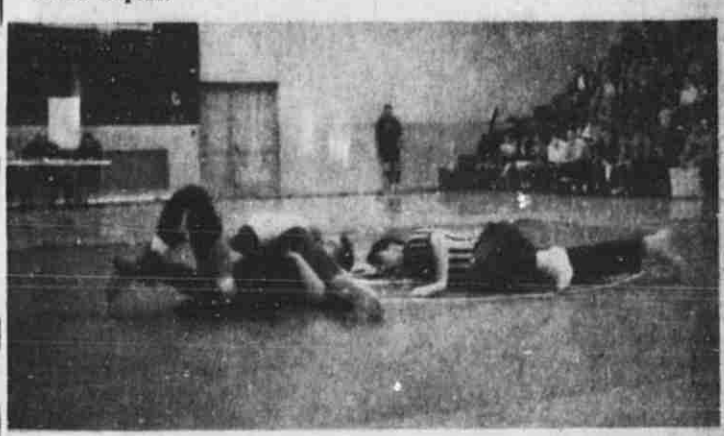
The Alto Area Mothers' Club held their meeting February 19, with 35 members present, in the Alto Area School All-Purpose Room.

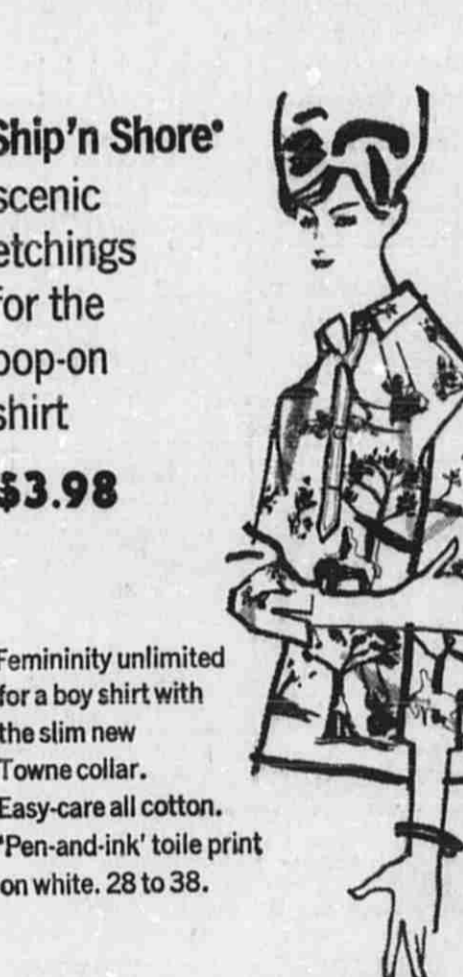

## Will Hold Saturday Immunization Clinic

The opening of two special Saturday immunization clinics to be conducted by the Kent County Health Department at monthly intervals beginning in March over the next three months for Kent County residents was announced by Dr. W. B. Prothro, City-County Health Officer.

The clinics will be held at Caledonia Elementary School in Caledonia and at Grove School in Alpine Township.

Dr. Prothro said that the two clinics were established at the request of local community groups for the purpose of raising the immunization level of children. The clinic will also be open to older children and adults. All regular immunizations will be available without charge.

The Caledonia clinic, which is sponsored by the Caledonia Extension groups and Paddy's College will be held at 10 a. m., March 2, April 6, and May 13.

The clinic at Beech Grove School is sponsored by the Alpine-Walker Health Council and will be held at 10 a. m. on March 23, April 27, and May 25.

To receive the complete series of immunizations for diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, poliomyelitis and smallpox, it is necessary to attend each of the three monthly dates.

Both clinics will be open to any resident of Kent County.

Complete protection against diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis and smallpox depends upon a constant ratio of more than 80 per cent of the population of a community being fully immunized according to Dr. Prothro.

Two age groups in Grand Rapids and Kent County fall below this 80 per cent safety point according to a survey made here last year ago by the U. S. Public Health Service. The groups might be called the "backsliders" and the "breadwinners." The one group includes children under five and the other is their young parents aged 20 to 40.

All re-lax immunizations will be available without charge.

**Rev. Lee Dalrymple Attends Ministers Week In Chicago**

The Rev. Lee A. Dalrymple, of Ada Congregational Church was among 219 in attendance Feb. 11-13 at Ministers Week sponsored by the Chicago Theological Seminary. Among the reports presented was that of the Rev. Dr. Douglas Horton of Randolph, New Hampshire who represented protestant churches at the session of the Vatican Ecumenical Council in Rome.

"It must be said that the theological differences between us are so great that no ordinary human vision is sufficient to see a way to overcome them," Dr. Horton said.

However, he cited three areas in which the "ecclesiastical iron curtain" is being penetrated: in prayer, in Biblical scholarship, and in contact with individual human beings.

He found "a certain incandescence for the future" both in Rome's invitation to other churches to send observers to the Council and in the acceptance of the invitations.

The Council proceedings are carried on in Latin. Dr. Horton, himself a Latin scholar, was dean of Harvard Divinity School from 1955 to 1959. Earlier he served for 17 years as minister and executive secretary of the General Council of the Congregational Christian Churches which merged with the Evangelical and Reformed Church to form the United Church of Christ.

Other lecturers at the Ministers Week of the Chicago Theological Seminary included Canon Ian T. Ramsey, Nolloth Professor of the Philosophy of the Christian Religion at Oxford University, who presented the Alden-Tuthill Lectures on "Theological Literacy." Ramsey has been at the forefront of the discussion of the relevance of linguistic analysis to the problems of theology.

Another issue of the program was that of "Christianity and Race." James A. Jones, Director of Research of Harlem Youth Opportunities, Unltd., Inc., spoke on "The Culture of Urban Negro Youth." "The Role of the Church in the Racially Changing City" was discussed by the Reverend David W. Barry, Executive Director of the New York Mission Society.

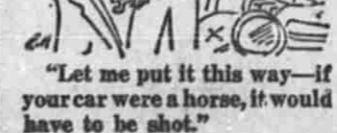

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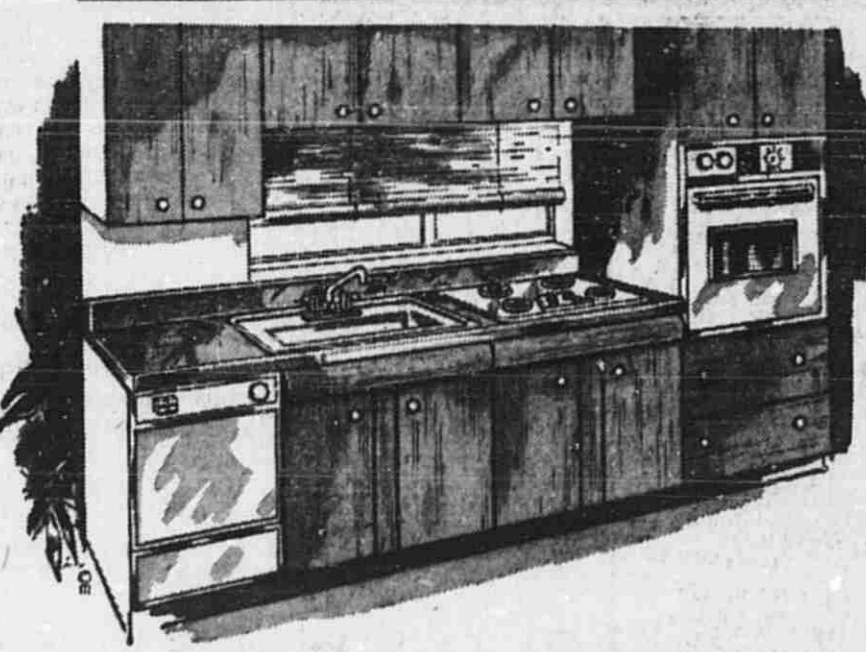
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
