ment of \$7,405.95 for blacktopping streets. Police and fire departments op-

erated within their budgets at approximately the same cost as last year. Sanitation service was well handled at a cost slightly less than the last fiscal period. General officers of the city cost approximately 4 per cent more than the previous year. Professional services were much less then the last year, when \$6,600 was spent for a professional re-appraisal of the town.

Capital Expenditures

Improvements to the city included \$1,700 in new sidewalks that were put in on a cost sharing plan with home owners. The total of capital expenditures was \$20,264.91 and included a new garbage truck, sewer bucketing machine, equipping a new street truck, building a retaining wall and fence along the river, and a master plan for storm sewer and street construction.

Light Plant Report

Included in the city report is the annual operating statement which revealed that the Light and Power Board are running a real tight operation with a fine earning record. A statement from the board will be found in the financial statement.
