## Methodists To Hold Hour of Sharing

Along with most of the Protestant churches of the country the local Methodist Church will take its annual "One Great Hour of Sharing" offering next Sunday.

Each of the denominations participating in the offering make their own designations regarding the funds collected. Methodist funds are allocated as follows: the first \$75,000 will go to the Division of National Missions for capital funds for emergency needs. A fixed \$30,000 will go to the Ministry for Servicemen Overseas, an inter-denominational program for men at military bases in Japan, Okinawa, Korea and other countries. All the rest of the funds collected will be divided between the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief and the Crusade Scholarship Fund. The Overseas Relief is carried out in cooperation with other Protestant groups.

Some 1200 Methodist Nationals have had specialized training resulting from Crusade Scholarships. This year 76 students from 28 countries are studying in 29 colleges, universities, seminaries and hospitals in the United States and Puerto Rico. Twenty-four others, making a total of 100, are studying in other countries. All this is made possible by the One Great Hour of Sharing offering.

## Crash Fatal To Clyde Francisco

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Huffman Funeral Home in Belding for Clyde G. Francisco, aged 27, who was fatally injured Friday morning when his truck and that of George L. Peters, 27, collided at the intersection of Lincoln Lake Avenue and M-44. Burial was made in Rest Haven Memory Gardens.

Francisco, driving an oil truck, was southbound on Lincoln Lake Avenue, and Peters was westbound on M-44. The intersection is in Kent County, 2 miles west of the Montcalm County line.

State police reported that Peters is suffering from possible back injuries, and is in Blodgett Memorial Hospital. The oil truck caught on fire at the impact and fire fighters from Grettan and Belding were rushed to the scene.

Clyde was employed by the Smyrna Oil Company, which is owned by his father-in-law, Howard Inley. He was a 1955 graduate of Lowell High School.

Surviving are his wife, Helen Lorane; one daughter, Dixie; three sons, Clyde, Shane and Gordon, all at home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Francisco; two sisters, Mrs. Edward Gahan and Miss Diane Francisco; and three brothers, Duane, Richard and Robert, all of Route 1, Lowell.

## Council Approves New Beer Outlet

Lowell City Council on Monday night approved a take-out beer and wine license for Ray Barber who operates a grocery store at 209 West Main Street. This brings the number of outlets for take-out licenses back up to two besides the local taverns who also have this type of license. Lawrence Precious and his attorney were present at the meeting to protest issuing a license to Barber; the council last year turned down Precious' request.

**Seek Flood Control Project**  
A report by City Manager Olson from the Army Corp of Engineers revealed that funds may be available to clean-out Flat River, if it can be tied into the flood control project in the Grand River Valley. It was indicated that if the pond above Lowell was enlarged as a retention reservoir to hold up waters going into the Grand, the corps of Engineers might consider its development. A levee would have to be erected north from Main Street along Lafayette Street where the banks are low, the Army Engineers revealed. The manager was instructed to continue with his work with the government unit.

**Refuse Tavern Relicence**  
The council voted to refuse to license any local tavern that had not paid its personal property taxes. Two tavern owners who have failed to pay their personal property tax will be given a last chance to pay up or lose their license. Manager Olson was instructed to issue this notice to the delinquents.

The council again recommended that the offer of the Lowell Moose Lodge to tear down the old grandstand at Recreation Park. The Moose Civics Affairs Committee have offered to build a section of bleachers if the Park Board will furnish the materials.

**Spend \$5,301.00 Removing Trees**  
The total cost of removing dead trees on city property last year was revealed by the city manager to have cost \$5,301.00 and a total of 199 trees were removed.

S. J. Ayres in a written request to the council asked to have a sanitary sewer extended up Beech Street to eliminate septic tanks in the area. Manager Olson was instructed to take steps to set up a special assessment district for the area. The city has participated in the past on a 25-75 basis of the cost of sewer and water extensions.

The State Health Department has approved the treatment of city water with polyphosphates to help clear up the rusty water condition in the city.

### Lowell Bank Named To Service F. H. A. Loans

Harold J. Englehardt announced this week that the State Savings Bank of Lowell has been appointed by the Federal Housing Administration to service loans insured by this group. Both, the president, vice-president Dan A. Wingeier, and cashier Herbert Elzinga, have all been named by the bank to service these loans.

Available in Lowell for the first time through the local bank will be Title I Home Improvement loans, which are unsecured loans of up to \$3,500 that may be paid off in a 5 year period; Title II Home Improvement loans which are secured by a second mortgage for as much as \$10,000 and can be paid off in a 20 year period. They will of course also service conventional 5% per cent mortgage loans.

Federal Housing Administration loans being available through the local bank will be a real service to the community; allowing individuals with small down payments to buy old homes or build new. C. W. Starr, Field Commissioner of the Federal Housing Administration in his letter appointing the local bank as the Lowell servicing office, said that this will be an outstanding community service.

FHA does not make loans. It insured mortgage loans made by the bank and approved by FHA. This insurance makes it possible for home buyers to finance homes on more liberal terms than would otherwise be available. The chief requirements for borrowers are a good credit rating, the cash required for down payment and closing costs and a steady income. Conventional loans can be made for as little as 3 per cent down over a period of as long as 30 years.

A picnic at the Boy Scout cabin turned into a tragedy Sunday when Steven Rittenger, 9, drowned after falling into the frigid Flat River, north of Lowell, while attempting to cross the stream hand-over-hand along an overhead wire cable. Lowell Police Chief Avery Block is shown pointing to the cable where the incident occurred. The arrow at the left designates where the youth started across the cable, and the (X) at the bottom of the picture is the approximate spot where he fell, six feet from shore, into the swift swirling current of the river.

The life of Steven Rittenger, 9, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Rittenger of Foreman Street, was claimed by Flat River Sunday afternoon when he fell from a cable across the river near the Scout cabin. Steven was accompanied by two other Cub Scout friends, David Alexander, 9, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Alexander and Craig Peterson, 8, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Peterson.

The boys had planned a cook-out on Saturday at the Scout cabin, but had to postpone it because of the rain. They left home about noon with the parents believing they were making the trip through Main Street on the bridge. Instead, they went north along M-91 to a point opposite the cabin and the Rittenger boy attempted to cross the 35 foot wire cable between the west bank of the river and a portion of the old Lowell dam which extended out into the river.

Rittenger had gotten nearly across his friends reported, when he dropped into the river without a sound and was carried down stream by the fast moving river. David stayed by the river to fol-

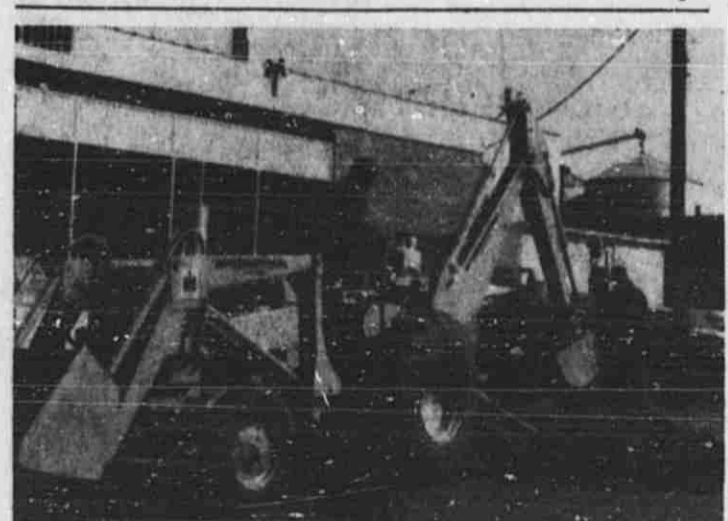

Lowell firemen were summoned to help search for the boy who was out of sight from the cable crossing. Firemen Clair Phillips and Lester Link, accompanied by Garry McWhinney, in a boat from the Lyle Cove home on Flat River, about 150 yards from where the boy fell in, spotted the body, and Garry jumped from the boat, to recover the body which was held against a rock by the fast moving current.

He was taken from the river and members of the fire department and police department attempted to revive him with mouth-to-mouth breathing, but failed to start the near frozen boy's breathing again.

Besides his parents, Steven, is survived by one sister, Denise Ann; his maternal grandfather, Paul Snyder of Lake Odessa; and his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Frieda Rittenger of Kalamazoo.

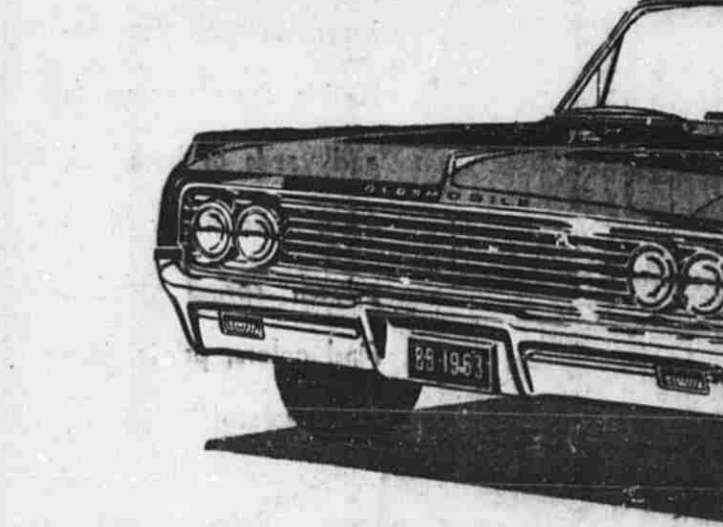

Proceedings Lowell Council

Regular session, Monday evening, March 4, 1963, in the council room of the city hall.
Council was called to order by His Honor Mayor G. Ralph Townsend, at 8:00 p. m. and the roll was called by the clerk.

Present: Mayor Townsend, Councilmen Marsh, Schlemm, Wittenbach.
Absent: Councilman Myers.
IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Marsh, supported by Wittenbach, that the minutes of the February 18, 1963, meeting be approved as presented and the reading waived.

Yea: Townsend, Marsh, Wittenbach, Schlemm, Myers.
Nay: None.
Bills payable since last council meeting:
5,341.58
Water & Sewer 1,007.25
Deposits since February 18, 1963, meeting:
General Fund 3,728.81
Water & Sewer Fund 71.47

COMMUNICATIONS
1. Request from Clement Grindle for quit claim deed. (See MOTIONS)
2. Report from Williams & Works submitting a program of water supply investigation and development. City Manager Olson was directed to secure information from one other source. (Councilman Myers entered meeting 8:20)

3. Request from Kent County, Michigan, for the purchase of a Laboratory Board that Lowell is being assessed \$1,507.50 for 1963, as compared with \$1,292.00 for 1962.
4. Request from Michigan Municipal League requesting that the City adopt a resolution endorsing the proposed constitution. (See MOTIONS)

5. Bills were opened on a "Warning Device" and read by City Manager Olson. The low bid did not state whether it furnished a technician for the installation of the device. (See MOTIONS)
City Attorney Vander Veer stated that this is the time and place for the hearing on proposed Ordinances 15, 16, and 17, and on an ordinance which would rescind Ordinance No. 11. Mr. Olson was asked to give a history of the zoning on M-21, both in the newly annexed area, and in the East Side of the City of Lowell.
Mr. Olson reviewed the joint meeting of the Planning Commission, the Zoning Board of Appeals, and the Council held on February 24 on the question of rezoning on M-21. It was brought to the attention of the three groups that Ordinance No. 11 was legally enacted and is a valid ordinance. The hearings are on whether the rezoning should be as it was made by Ordinance No. 11-ninety, Commercial from one and a half to two and a half acres, and whether the land which is not improved commercially at present would be rezoned to its original A-1 classification; and the land which has been built up (from the East boundary line of Roth's Skelgas and from Michigan Bottled Gas) to the West city limits would be made commercial.

Further, the area to the East of Horatio Street to the East City limits, presently zoned Commercial, should it be made residential?
Mr. Olson stated that also discussed at the joint meeting was the possibility of the merits of rezoning everything now zoned Commercial by Ordinance No. 11, to Residential A-1. After considerable discussion, the Planning Co-

uncil claim deed to the City of Lowell.
Mr. Berman of the Lowell Development Company was in favor of making some new zoning districts, which were referred to by the Planning Consultant as Commercial Reserve, and Transitional. In the former, certain types of commercial buildings could be built, but each permit would be acted on separately by the City Council. He urged an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance which would establish such zoning areas, Attorney Vander Veer stated that Mr. Berman's request was entirely proper, or whether the Council has had time to consider it was another question.

Councilman Marsh stated that he was in favor of adopting an ordinance to rescind Ordinance No. 11 and presented an ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 2 to create a Commercial B-2 District.
Commercial B-2 District
Transitional District, and Light Industrial & Manufacturing District.
He urged its adoption. (See MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS)
Mr. Donald L. Dunham (Michigan Bottled Gas Company) and Mr. Kohlsch (Root Beer Stand) were present in the interests of keeping Main Street Commercial from East end to West end.

Ordinance No. 15, as originally proposed, was not adopted. Instead an ordinance which in turn rescinded Ordinance No. 15, upon which a public hearing was held at this meeting as scheduled in its introduction by Councilman Schlemm, was adopted, which merely rescinded Ordinance No. 15, thereby returning the zoning to that shown on the zoning map, effective July 28, 1963.
Ordinance Nos. 16 and 17 were adopted which added a new zoning district, entitled Residential A-1, and set the boundaries thereof, respectively. (See MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS)

Messrs. Carl Munroe and John Troy were present to seek a solution to the violation of one-way traffic on High Street between Monroe and Washington Streets; they were directed to seek a solution, which City Manager Olson stated would only be another sign, and that "Do not enter" and "One Way" signs mark the street adequately. He did suggest contacting the Automobile Club, who had adopted a similar traffic survey, for further suggestions and was requested to do so.

Gordon Hill urged a rezoning of properties in the downtown commercial area, stating that in his opinion land values had changed and are not realistic with the Doane appraisal made two years ago. Manager Olson offered to contact the Doane people to arrange a discussion.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS
IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Marsh, supported by Wittenbach, that the following resolution be returned to the Mayor and Clerk, that the following resolution be returned to the Mayor and Clerk be authorized to execute a quit claim deed to the City of Lowell.

BY CHANGING DISTRICT BOUNDARIES FROM THOSE ESTABLISHED BY SECTION 22 AS SHOWN ON A MAP ENTITLED "CITY OF LOWELL, MICHIGAN ZONING MAP, EFFECTIVE DATE JULY 28, 1963"
