Vote Monday for Con-Con

"Michigan needs the new constitution. It holds the promise of the future. It is the state's escape from the shackles of the past and our means of reversing the trend towards dependence upon Federal government for answers to purely state and local problems."

So said Gov. George Romney this week, just four days before next Monday's election when Michigan voters will go to the polls to pass judgment on the proposed new state constitution.

Bipartisan support for the new document has become increasingly evident as Election Day approaches. Not only have more than a score of nonpartisan organizations in the state endorsed the proposal, but in recent weeks leaders in both political parties have been outspoken in their support.

Early this month Prentiss M. Brown, Democratic elder statesman and former U. S. Senator, announced his intention to vote for the new constitution. Dr. Connor D. Smith, Democratic chairman of the Michigan State University board of trustees, had previously announced his support.

William Palmer, a Democratic appointee to Michigan's original Civil Service Commission, has also

announced his approval of the new Constitution. "It will keep the merit system and keep career people in state service," he said. "Some of the proposed changes, I believe, will also improve the relations of civil service with other branches of government."

At least 70 major changes from the 1908 state constitution are incorporated in the proposed document and 75 per cent of them received the unanimous or near-unanimous vote of the 114 delegates to the Constitutional Convention. No decisions at the convention were made on a strictly partisan basis and all sections of the document passed by the delegates had bipartisan support.

Among the significant improvements over the 1908 constitution are:

1. Abolition of Spring elections, saving an estimated \$1 million each two years.
2. Four-year terms for elected state administrative officials, permitting the time needed to establish a program.
3. Reorganization of Michigan's judge-judge of 128 boards, bureaus and commissions into not more than 20 departments.
4. Tools to help the legislature solve the problems of mushrooming urban areas.
5. Co-ordination of the state's educational system through an enlarged 8-member state board of education who would have authority to appoint the superintendent of public instruction.
6. Expanded provisions on civil rights, including a new anti-discrimination clause which is to be enforced by the nation's first constitutionally-established state civil rights commission.
7. Legislative apportionment formulas which will guarantee to Michigan citizens a truly "balanced" legislature.
8. Improved basic enactments on finance and taxation which will permit short-term borrowing of substantial amounts of money at periods during the year when the state traditionally experiences lower monthly revenues.

No significant changes are made in people's right to amend the new document. The process will be substantially the same as in the present constitution.

The question to be submitted to the voters at Monday's election is a simple one—"Shall the revised Constitution be adopted?"

If the proposal receives a favorable majority, the new document would become effective on January 1, 1964. The first election for four-year terms under the new constitution would be in November of 1966.

Funeral services have been set for this Friday afternoon at 2 p. m. in the Roth Funeral Home. The Rev. Glenn Miller will be the officiating clergyman, and interment will be made in Bowne Center cemetery.

Mr. Phillips was born in Boyne Township, October 7, 1884. In 1909, the Phillips' moved to Lowell where he began work at the Lowell Cutter Factory, and for the past 46 years, he was in the contracting business in Lowell and the vicinity.

He was a past member of Lowell Lodge No. 115 and the Rebecca Lodge.

Besides his wife, Harriet, Mr. Phillips is survived by two sons, Lewis and Clare; his daughter, Mrs. Marker; ten grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Modern Lighting For New School

John Troy, left, is hearing from Donn Palmer, right, architect for the new high school, about the planning and engineering that went into construction of the lighting for the school. As Mr. Palmer points out lighting intensity and type of fixtures were designed for each area of the building to give the best light possible. The new school is rapidly nearing completion.

The lighting throughout the school is engineered to provide an exact quantity of light, in fact, candles, upon room surfaces, papers, and desk tops. The light intensity in different rooms varies according to the recommended standard for the type of activity as reading, typing, sewing, basketball, etc.

Because fluorescent lights will produce 2 1/2 to 3 times the light of incandescent from the same power source, fluorescent lights are used wherever adaptable.

All wiring is in conduit, the largest being three and one-half inches at the service entrance. The service is 120-208 volt, three-phase, four-wire 60 cycle. The three 100-bilo-volt ampere transformers outside are furnished by the Lowell Light and Power Company.

In some rooms, the light intensity is variable, as in the gymnasium and auditorium. Fluorescent lights will blanket the gymnasium and gym balcony with general lighting. These lights are in place. By turning on the extra incandescent lamps grouped over the center of the gym floor, the main playing courts can be flooded with light for competition play.

Thus, the more economical fluorescent lights can be used for general lighting during classes, but a high intensity of light can be accomplished when needed.

3. In the event advancement of County general funds is at any time made, it shall be the duty of the County Treasurer to take all actions and proceedings and pursue all remedies permitting by law for the repayment of such sums so advanced.

4. \$35,000.00 July 1st of each year from 1975 to 1978, inclusive;

\$40,000.00 July 1st of each year from 1979 to 1981, inclusive;

\$45,000.00 July 1st of each year from 1982 to 1984, inclusive.

AND WHEREAS the growth and development of Kent County Airport for scheduled airline use is necessary and advisable in order to provide adequate and convenient air transportation facilities for the Kent County Area, and the issuance of the bonds provided for in said Ordinance for the said purpose will serve said public needs;

AND WHEREAS, it is to the best interest of the County of Kent that said bonds so authorized in said Ordinance be sold at the lowest and most favorable interest cost possible to obtain, which will result from a County of Kent guaranty as authorized by said Act 327, Public Acts of Michigan, 1945, as amended (section 131, thereof).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. Pursuant to the authorization of said Act 327, Public Acts of Michigan, 1945, as amended (Section 131) the Board of Supervisors of the County of Kent, the governing body thereof, does hereby irrevocably agree on behalf of the County of Kent, State of Michigan, the issuing political subdivision, that in the event the funds pledged for the payment of the COUNTY OF KENT AIRPORT REVENUE BONDS (TERMINAL BUILDING COMPLEX), are for any reason not sufficient for the payment of the principal and interest thereon as the same become due, the County of Kent shall advance sufficient moneys out of its general funds for the payment of such principal and interest, and it shall be the duty of, and the County Treasurer is hereby directed to promptly make such advancement upon written notification by the Kent County Aeronautics Board, the agency of the County duly authorized to manage and operate the airport, of the amount needed to make up

any deficiency.

2. The Kent County Aeronautics Board, as the managing and operating agency of the County, is authorized and directed to promptly notify the County Treasurer of the amount of any such deficiency of funds at least ten (10) days prior to the due date of any principal and/or interest on said designated bonds.

3. In the event advancement of County general funds is at any time made, it shall be the duty of the County Treasurer to take all actions and proceedings and pursue all remedies permitting by law for the repayment of such sums so advanced.

4. This resolution shall be considered adopted and effective contemporaneously with the adoption and effective date of the Ordinance specified in the preamble hereto, and shall remain effective and irrevocable until all the bonds specified, authorized and issued pursuant to the provisions of said Ordinance are paid in full. This resolution shall be considered as a part of the proceedings for the issuance of said bonds, and together with the laws, Ordinance and other legal proceedings relative to the issuance of said bonds, a contract with the holders of said bonds not subject to change or revocation unless with the consent of such bondholders.
