Lowell and Ionia Back Off On Consolidation With Saranac School System

Saranac public school's \$395,000 bond issue approval by the state municipal finance commission this week climaxed more than a month of discussion with state officials.

The approval was delayed by the Michigan state department of public instruction in order to conduct an investigation and to discuss the issue with school officials from Saranac, Lowell and Ionia.

Department officials in Lansing had told Saranac school district officials the approval was being delayed pending discussion of the issue with them. The state department said it was questioning all such school bond issues in Michigan with district valuations of under \$10 million. They told Saranac school officials tax burdens in districts of Saranac's size, \$6 million, are difficult to carry and the state department is attempting to discourage passage of this type of issue. It has been recommending consolidation in districts where the cost of public school education becomes too costly because of low district valuation.

At the request of the state department Saranac, Lowell and Ionia city school officials met in Lansing to discuss the problem. State officials said neither Lowell nor Ionia schools said they were in position at this time to take portions of the Saranac district into their systems. As a result of the discussion the state department said it would approve this issue.

The bond issue in question was approved by voters of the Saranac district after a previous turn down. It is for construction of new facilities.

Had state approval not been given to the voter approved Saranac issue, bonds would have to be sold at a much higher interest rate.

The Redskins of Saranac high school showed surprising track and field strength Friday afternoon by barely missing victory over class B Lowell on the Red Arrows' home field.

Both squads had won six events with Saranac showing slightly greater second place strength prior to the final event, the 880 relay, when Lowell spurred to a narrow 56-53 win.

Compiling 27½ points of the winning Red Arrow margin were Beimers and Slack.

"Top In Hardies"

Beimers had first in the low and high hurdles and a second in the broad jump, while Lloyd Slack won the high jump, 100-yard dash and placed second in the lows which Beimers won in 21.5 seconds.

Both boys were also members of the 880 team which gave Lowell the squeaker victory.

For Saranac, Ron Sage won the pole with a nine-foot mark while Mike Yaw took the broad jump with a 19 feet, four-inch measure.

Curt Chadwick gave the Redskins a second in the shot with a throw which missed 44 feet by only a half inch. Al Cummings won the 440 yard dash in 59.6 seconds and Doug Pennington, followed by teammate Mike Yaw, capped the 220 to 24.8 to give the Redskins two more five pointers.

Taking second in the highs and third in the lows was Steve Koss. Walker of Lowell won the mile in 4:59.5 with the Skins' Jeff Miller second.

Foursome Win

A relay foursome composed of Mike Maxwell, Wilbert Roberts, Ron Sage and Gary Reinhardt gave the downriver school another first with a 4:00.6 mile.

Also gaining points for Saranac were Virgil Biggs and Mike Maxwell, who won thirds in respective events of broad jump and 440 dash.

Lowell tracksters will compete in Tri-River competition on April 26, against Comstock Park. All conference meets are held at Recreation Park.

At the time of "Main Street's" beginning, other columns were gracing the front page—remember "Ledger Entries; Being a Collection of Various Topics of Local & General Interest" and "Odds and Ends Here and There; Pithy Points Picked Up and Patly Put by our Peripatetic Pencil Pusher?"

"Along Main Street" was discontinued in 1958 for a 5-year period until it was revived this year by the present staff.
