Memorial Day Parade

To Honor Dead Thursday . . .
The annual Memorial Day parade and tribute to the servicemen of all wars, of the area who died for their country will be held in Lowell on Thursday, May 30. The parade will assemble at Richards Park at 9 a. m. and will leave at 9:30 sharp, according to Ed Burras, Marshall of this year's parade.

Every serviceman is asked to participate in the parade. Uniforms are not necessary, but would add more color to the parade. Both the American Legion and VFW are making special efforts to have their members take part.

The parade will halt at the west bridge over the Flat River where the Blue Star Mothers will cast a floral tribute on the water and the firing squad will salute the boys who lost their lives at sea. The march will then continue to Oakwood Cemetery.

Cemetery Ceremonies
The Reverend Keith M. McIver of the First Baptist Church of Lowell, will give the invocation, and members of the VFW Auxiliary, the American Legion Auxiliary and the Women's Relief Corps will then make the presentation of floral baskets.

The main speaker for the ceremonies will be the Reverend Chas. C. Davis, pastor of the First Congregational Church of Lowell. The high school band will then render the "Star Spangled Banner," followed by three volleys from the firing squad, taps and echos, and the dismissal of those present.

Health Department Stops Sewer Work Dangerous Sanitation Problem Exists

The Michigan Department of Health is holding up the construction of two blocks of sewer extensions on West and Beach Streets, which are badly needed because the voters of Lowell did not approve a bond issue to build a new sewer treatment plant last year.

An appeal has been made to the Health Department to review their action and re-negotiate the agreement with the city to begin construction of a sewer treatment plant. A new vote could be called for next spring at the next city election, if the council takes action.

Residents of the areas which have appealed for sewer extensions to prevent a dangerous sanitation problem were at the Monday Council meeting. They were told that unless the Health Department gives permission, no new construction can be started.

Receive Water Supply Warning

In a letter from T. L. Vander Velde, chief of the Water Supply Division of Engineering of the Michigan Department of Health, the city was warned that the water supply was of poor quality and quantity. Residents who have been complaining of rusty water for several years are well aware of this problem.

The letter gave the city permission to install polyphosphate feeders in east wells No. 1 and No. 2. This chemical will not eliminate the rust, but keep it in suspension so it does not turn the water yellow and cause rust spots on clothing.

Vander Velde said, "Much has been said here about the iron problem, but we do not want to overlook some other problems Lowell currently faces with respect to its water supply. There is the matter of excessive hardness and high chlorides, which together with the iron constitute a total problem of water quality. In addition to the quality problems, Lowell also has a problem of water quantity, and this, too, can be related to terms of economics. Many industries consider an adequate supply of water to be essential to their operation, and will not locate in a community where such supply is not available."

Named to Planning Commission

John Troy, 321 High Street, was named by the City Council to a three-year term on the City Planning Commission. The council also appointed John Abraham as city auditor for the coming year.

An application by W. A. Roth for city participation in new sidewalk in front of his building on Main Street was approved. The city will pay 25 percent of the cost of the new sidewalk on not to exceed 45 cents per square foot total cost.

Alto Man Injured In Cycle Accident Sunday

A Sunday morning accident on Pratt Lake Rd. west of the Kenton County line saw Hugh A. Ritter of Route 2, Alto, sent to the Ionia County Memorial Hospital with multiple injuries.

Ritter, 22, of 6525 Pratt Lake Road, told Ionia County Troopers he was making a turn when the accelerator stuck on the motorcycle he was driving, and went out of control.

Troopers said that despite the fact that Ritter suffered a leg fracture as well as cuts, bumps and bruises, the bike was only slightly damaged.

Ritter, cited for not having a registration plate, is still in the Ionia Hospital.

Two School Districts Vote To Join Lowell

In a special election on Monday the voters of Farrell School District in Ada Township and the voters of Bennett-Bailey District, Vergennes Township balloted to join Lowell Area Schools.

The Bennett-Bailey District with \$589,462 valuation voted 37-5 to become a part of the Lowell Area Schools; they have 29 pupils, Kindergarten through the 8th grade. At Farrell, with \$220,830 valuation and 12 pupils in Kindergarten through 8th grade the vote was also unanimous in joining with Lowell. All these children will be brought into Runciman Elementary School.

With the acute crowding in the Lowell schools no other districts are expected to be allowed to join the Lowell district this year. It is reported that the high school is already going to have an enrollment of nearly a hundred more pupils than this year.

Paul Kropf (2-3) went all the way on the mound in the second game. Dennis Sisson and Karon Ford each picked up two hits.

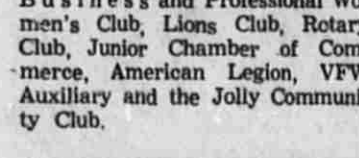
Child Study Club Plan Safety Patrol Picnic

Special Holiday Highway Patrols

Special State Police traffic patrols will be in effect for the four and a half day Memorial holiday weekend of May 24-26, 27, 28 and 29, 1963.

Commissioner Joseph A. Childs reports that the heavy increase in deaths, injuries and accidents this year is especially important that motorists observe the special responsibilities on the holiday.

"Maximum State Police patrol coverage will be provided on each day, with a heavy concentration of patrol cars on each day when traffic is expected to be the heaviest. Extra attention will be given to sections with high accident records.

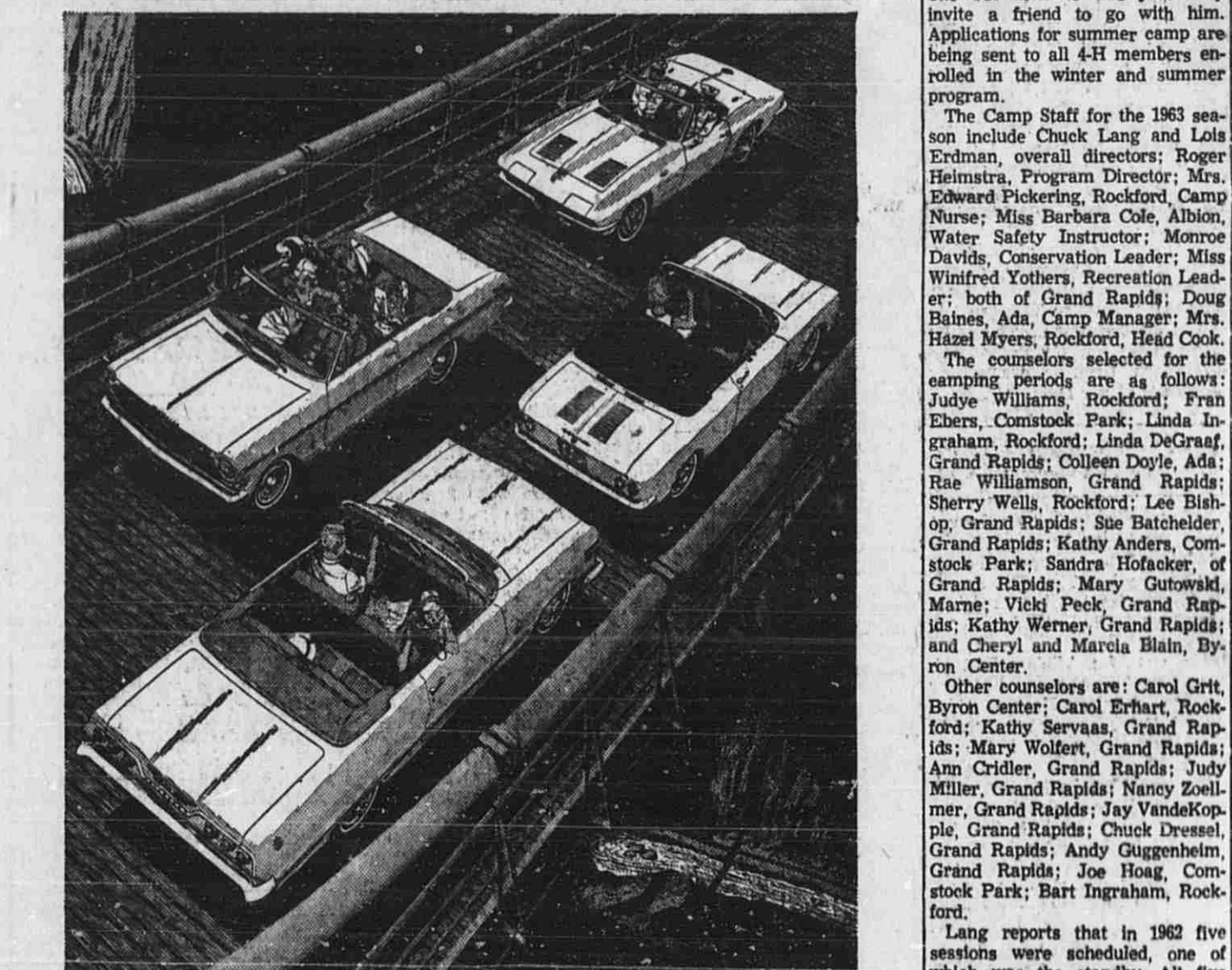

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Heart Disease Leads Kent Deaths

Diseases of the heart remain the leading cause of death in Kent County last year according to provisional figures compiled by Miss Gloria St. Pierre, statistician, of Grand Rapids-Kent County Health Department.

The total number of Kent County deaths from all causes decreased from 3,269 in 1961 to 3,225 last year with heart disease accounting for 1,245 of the total.

The first eight causes of death for the County remain the same as in 1961. Tuberculosis dropped from ninth to tenth place and postnatal asphyxia dropped out of the ten leading causes.

The number of reported infant and fetal deaths from all causes together showed a decline of 12 in 1962 for Kent County and infant deaths dropped from 1 to 2.

The ten leading causes of death in Kent County in 1962 are as follows: 1. Disease of the Heart 1,245 2. Cancer 531 3. Strokes 415 4. Accidents 369 5. Arteriosclerosis 90 6. Diabetes 82 7. Pneumonia and Influenza 69 8. Congenital Malformations 53 9. Hypertension without Heart 35 10. Immaturity 34

The total number of deaths from all causes in Michigan increased from 67,118 in 1961 to 69,743 last year with heart disease accounting for 1,722 (or approximately two-thirds) of the increased number of deaths.

Soil & Water Conservation Students Visit Ada Conservation Project

Two hundred and seventy Godwin High School eighth grade science students made their annual Soil and Water Conservation tour, May 15.

The group, again in charge of Russell Koons, Godwin science instructor, drove a total of 75 miles through Plainfield, Courtland, Oakland, Combs and Ada Townships.

Mr. and Mrs. Earl Hovings took the students on a tour of the high overgrown nursery. Each student observed two pine transplants to take home.

Land once in farm land but now used for highways, golf courses, cemeteries, schools, university subdivisions and for reforestation was observed.

Conservation farming on the Robert Norman farm at 13 Mile Rd. and Stout Ave. was seen at the second stop. Jim Emery and Jim Spaur of the Soil Conservation Service pointed out the use of contour strips, a grassed waterway, an erosion control bank and tile drainage.

Merle Baber, Michigan Conservation Dept. Game Biologist, explained wild life plantings in an area area not suited for cropland.

On the way to Townsend Farm for the noon stop, they saw Christmas and reforestation plantings, windbreaks, wetland impoundment for wildlife and 10 picture and farm ponds.

Ray Foley, Ada Twp., showed and explained his conservation projects—wild life ponds, wild life areas, alarbs and tree planting and reforestation.

Each student will write a report on what they learned about conservation during the tour and about changing land use patterns. The two writing essays will be announced.

Harold Piccard, Alpine Twp. cooperative pointed out farm acreage changes in his neighborhood as we assisted him with his conservation plan. Nearby fields he once rented for crop production are now planted or not farmed for other reasons.

"Surpluses of some crops and milk and meat will disappear in the next ten to twenty years," remarked Harold.

Harold's brothers, Henry Jr. and James, recently purchased a 75 acre farm about a mile away from their home farms to make an efficient, large enough farm business. They hope to continue an dairy and cow farms.

They too are conscious of better cropland now being used for new homes and other developments.

Elmer Coran, Paris Twp. district cooperative told us that there are six dairy farmers left in that township.

We have noted many examples of good level plowing on Kent farms this spring. The old saying was, "A field well plowed is half-fitted." Now with a good job of plowing done a farmer can get either minimum tillage—one or two
