## Council Authorizes Planning For New Sewage Treatment Plant; To Vote In Fall

The City Council on Monday night authorized hiring the engineering firm of Williams and Works of Grand Rapids, to make a study and complete planning for a new sewage treatment plant and trunk line extensions.

This action was taken after a delegation from the council met with State Health Department officials on Monday to discuss Lowell's course of action. Only last month the request of the city to build two blocks of sewer extensions had been turned down by the Health Department.

The council agreed to go ahead with the planning to make the city eligible for this federal assistance and put the proposition of a bond issue up to the citizens in the fall, after the federal grant has materialized.

**Blacktop Streets**

The 1963 budget of \$12,000 for blacktopping streets in the city, calls for a seal coat on all street surfaced in 1957 and '58 to preserve them. In addition to this, there will be new blacktop on Grindle Drive around the curve Hunt St., Sibley St., Pleasant St., and a block on North Division.

**Request Re-Zoning for Garage**

Wendell Berman, developer of land on West Main Street appeared before the city council requesting a change in the zoning in the south-west corner near the drainage ditch to build a garage, and auto sales building for a local dealer.

He said the plot would contain about 3 acres, extending from M-21 back to Bowers Rd. with 200 feet of frontage. The Council agreed to submit this to city planner Scot Bagby, to see how this fits into his zoning for the city.

In further action the council appointed Phil Schneider to serve on the Showboat Board, Herbert Elzinga and Edward Kiel were re-appointed to the Zoning Board of Appeals.

## Lowell Airport Receives License

Lowell Airport, located a mile north of the city limits, received its license from the State Aeronautics Board last week after over a year of work by the Lowell Airport Association.

This civic minded group of interested citizens from both the city and the community around Lowell have worked to raise money to make improvements along with many donations from citizens of the community. They have installed an administration building with rest rooms, telephone, lights. It has first aid supplies, fire fighting equipment. Gas pumps have been installed, the runways have been marked and the field fenced off.

All these activities have led to qualifying the field for its license which will put in on airport maps and fliers guides. Several planes are now kept at the local field and several others are expected to make Lowell their home field.

An Ionia man was injured and his 1963 hardtop sedan was called a near-total loss last Wednesday evening following a collision with a truck, west of Lowell on M-21.

## Vote June 18 For County Building Need Clear For New County Courthouse

The need for a new county building is self evident to every citizen of this area who has been in the county courthouse in the last several years. This building constructed 74 years ago has outlived its usefulness, some of the county offices are scattered in other downtown buildings. A further bother to citizens in getting to the county building is in the lack of parking in the vicinity. Offices are scattered and crowded into every balcony and corner of the building. SO WE KNOW WE NEED A NEW BUILDING!

Why vote for extra millage now for a new building? Because the county has saved millions of dollars by financing on a pay-as-you-go basis. In the case of a new county building it is estimated that financing under a 30 revenue bond plan would cost \$30 million compared to \$15 million under the plan proposed by the board of supervisors.

Three structures are planned in the new city-county complex: a Justice Building to house City and County courts and include offices for the county prosecutor, The City-County building for all city and county offices now spread in various buildings. Parking facilities for over 1000 cars on two levels of a underground ramp and 100-150 spaces on the surface.

The design consultants of the new building point out the following benefits:

1. Permit economies of construction by the joint sharing of public area and vertical transportation while at the same time retaining the official identity of each governmental unit.

2. Permit the most desirable utilization of the site, maintaining adequate areas for offstreet parking and community open spaces.

3. Express the Kent County and Grand Rapids character in that they are dignified without being extravagant, functional without being austere.

4. Maintain quality for many decades while still resulting in a conservative construction cost per square foot compared with recent public construction in other comparable communities.

5. Will enhance the prestige and community spirit of the entire County.

The tax levy to be voted upon June 18 would be for 1 mill for 5 years on all property within the county. In the City of Grand Rapids there would be an additional levy of 1 1/4 mills for 10 years.

The average tax payer in the City of Lowell would pay \$4.26 a year or a total cost over the five years of \$21.30. The townships share of the cost would be in proportion.

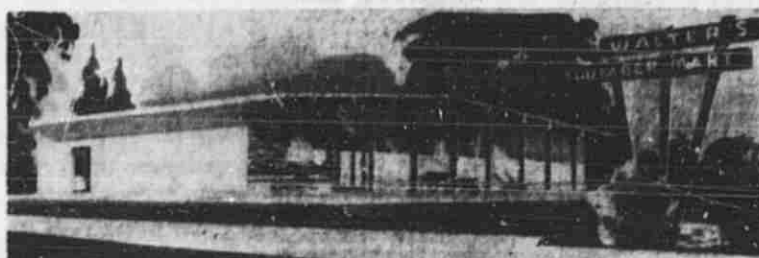
