## Students From Closed Districts Banned In New Lowell School Board Policy

Lowell Board of Education under the pressure of crowded school rooms and irate members of newly admitted districts set a new policy of the board which will ban admission of students from closed districts. Several of the board members reported that members of closed districts were bragging to newly annexed citizens of their foolish action in paying the high Lowell School tax when they could

just close their school and not join the Lowell district. To prevent this type of action from spreading to other districts the board ordered the administration to notify closed school districts that no students would be admitted to the Lowell School for the coming year.

An "open house" honoring retired librarian, Mrs. John Abraham will be held at the Lowell library, on Wednesday, June 19, from 3 to 5 p. m.

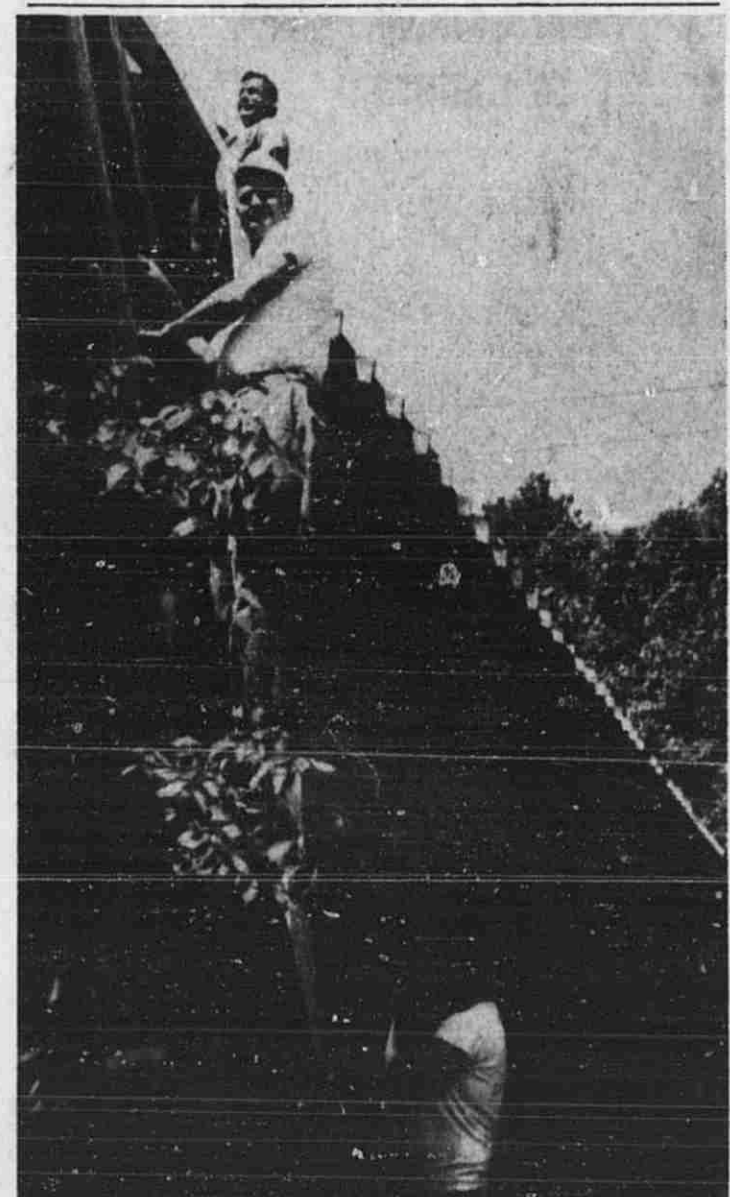

## Boys Named To Attend Boys State

Boys' State Chairman Stephen Nisbet, Clark-Ellis Post Number 152, of Lowell announces that three outstanding Lowell high school juniors have been selected to attend The American Legion-sponsored 26th Annual Wolverine Boys' State.

The School is held annually in mid-June (June 13-20) on the Michigan State University campus at East Lansing. Enrollment this year is limited to 1141 outstanding youngsters in the state of Michigan.

American Legion officials say the teenagers were selected on the basis of their leadership, good sportsmanship, personalities and mental alertness.

Under the guidance of American Legion instructors, the boys elect city, county and state officers; learn how to draft bills, enact them into laws, then enforce and administer the laws after they are passed. The youths also attend lectures and clinics taught by representatives of the state police, sheriff's office, Lansing mayor's office, Ingham County Bar Association, City, County and State officials.

In the past twenty five years, 23,788 boys have had the benefits of the training afforded them through this outstanding program. The objectives of the Boys' State Programs are to impress teenagers with the responsibilities and duties of good citizenship; it is one of the most important endeavors of the Youth Programs of The American Legion in Michigan.

## Speed Violations Highest In May

In the May report from the justice of the peace's office, Howard J. Rittenger reported that 40 city violations, 21 county violations and 6 warrants were issued to bring the fines and costs to a new high total of \$998.30.

The 67 tickets and warrants issued brought \$587.70 in fines for the city; and \$410.60 for the county.

Speeders were the biggest problem of the month, with 30 drivers getting violations for going over the speed limit. Eleven violations were given to people who were improperly parked, or who had overstayed their parking time.

Other violations listed by the justice were one driving left of center line; two non-stop for stop sign; two standing to obstruct; three disobeyed red traffic light; three defective equipment; one failed to have car under control, accident; and one unable to stop in assured clear distance, accident.

One reckless driving, accident; one violation of registration laws; one no operators license on person; two failed to stop for school bus; one improper turn in front of oncoming traffic, accident; and one improper overtaking and passing, accident.

Two warrants were issued to minors in possession of an alcoholic beverage; one did not pay fines and costs and was sent to the County Jail for 30 days. Another warrant was issued for a minor in possession of an alcoholic beverage in motor vehicle; did not pay costs and fine, and was committed to the County Jail for 60 days.

Operating a motor vehicle during suspension of license brought a warrant to a driver. The fine and costs were not paid and the recipient of the warrant was committed to the County Jail for 60 days. One warrant was given for being intoxicated and one warrant for reckless driving.

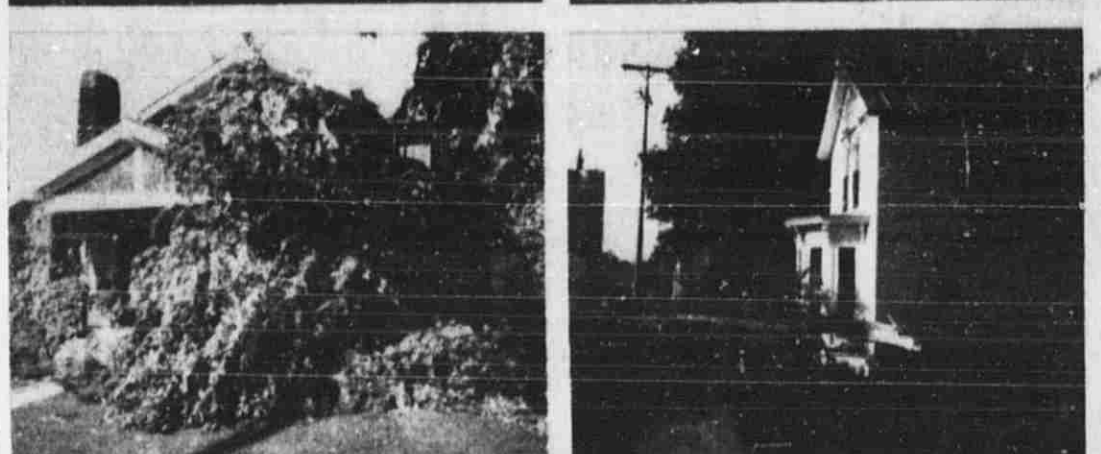
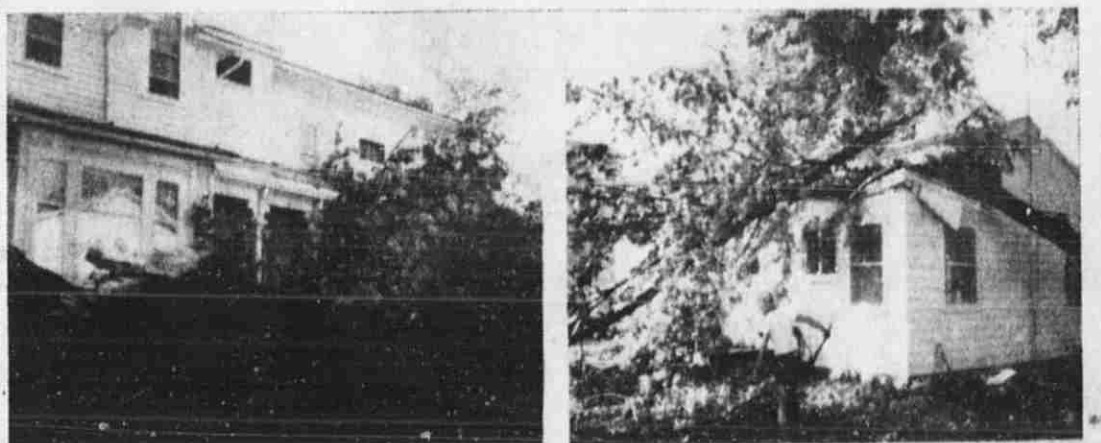

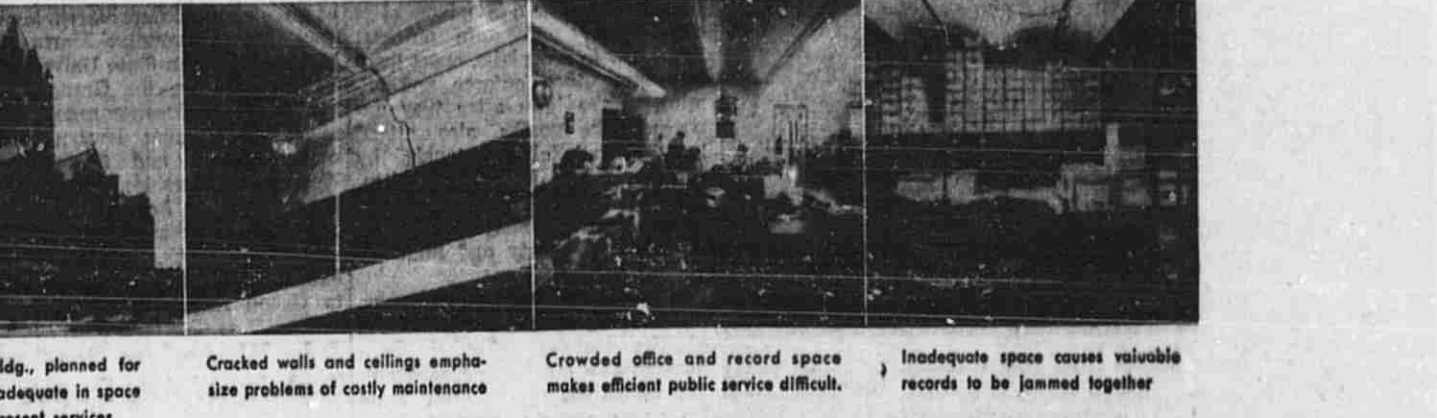
