

Fire Chief Frank Bakes revealed that the fire Friday afternoon that nearly destroyed the Edwin Marshall home at 1188 Lincoln Lake Road was believed to have been caused by children playing with matches and oil drums. The entire community felt the shock when four oil drums with fuel oil exploded, Flames covered the back of the house and the flaming oil had all the trees burning. Lowell firemen, assisted by the Alto unit, brought the fire under control in about 20 minutes, but damage to the house was severe. Only Mrs. Marshall in bed ill, was at home when the fire broke out. Mr. Marshall and their eight children, at home, were away. Baker and Police Chief Block told the Ledger that they are sure that children who built a fire under the oil tanks caused them to blow up Loss was set at \$7,000, which is partly covered by insurance. Moose Lodge members have secured a trailer for the family to use until the house can be rebuilt.


