## Boston And Lowell Townships Listed In Beetle Quarantine

With the placing of the cereal leaf beetle quarantine that became effective on July 1, Michigan's Agricultural Director G. S. McIntyre defined regulated areas within quarantined counties. His order also lists certain materials that cannot be moved out of regulated areas without an inspection certificate or fumigation.

The recent order includes 17 counties, including Lowell and Boston Twp. in Kent and Ionia counties, a figure that is increasing in the light of survey work that indicates presence of the insect. The survey work, as well as other parts of the program, is operated jointly by the Department's Plant Industry Division and the Plant Pest Control Division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The intent of the quarantine is to check spread of the cereal leaf beetle which now is reported in 21 Indiana counties and two Ohio counties. The tiny insect in Europe has all but destroyed some crops of growing grains certain years. It is a major destroyer of such growing cereal grains as oats, rye, barley, wheat and similar crops.

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## Named For Graduate Work At Columbia University

Cary P. Stiff Jr., a 1955 graduate of Lowell High School, has been accepted for admission as an unclassified student to the 1963-64 session of the Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism, it was announced this week by Dean Richard T. Baker.

Council was called to order by His Honor Mayor G. Ralph Townsend at 8:04 p. m. and the roll was called by the Clerk.

**COMMUNICATIONS AND PETITIONS**  
a) Mel Trotter Mission request to hold services on Lowell streets, as in previous years. Permission granted provided nuisances or hazards would not result from such use. (8:06 P. M. Councilman Manigold entered meeting)  
b) Quotation from Layne Northern Company of \$1548 to repair West Well No. 2, which is not now in operation, awaiting results of engineers' tests on water safety. City Manager Olson recommended that this expenditure not be made but rather that a new source of water be sought, affording possibly 800 gallons per minute.  
c) Scott Bagby and Associates' letter advising that the West entrance to Lowell should remain residential, but that an industrial area might be planned on the Bertram property North of Bows Road. A conflict of dates made it impossible for him to attend this meeting.  
Mr. George Dey, Planning Commission member, was called on to express his views. He was of the opinion that prospective home owners would not want to build on M-21 and that if developers are willing to spend money to build car dealerships or for other enterprises which will bring people and money to Lowell, it is important that Lowell proceed along such lines. His recommendation was that M-21 be developed commercially, as in other big cities, and the area back of it made residential, buffered from the commercial area by shrubbery or suitable screen. It had been suggested that the course of M-21 might be altered but Mr. Dey stated that as late as six months ago, the State Highway Department would admit of no such plans.  
Mr. Berman reviewed his request for the re-zoning of a 200 ft. strip on the South side of M-21 extending south to Bows Road for the erection of a garage for a Lowell car dealer. He deplored the absence of Mr. Bagby from the meeting of this date, as well as the slowness of the Council to act on his requests. He indicated that he will be represented at the meeting of the Planning Commission scheduled for June 24, 1963, at 8 p. m.  
City Manager Olson explained that the Council has had no opportunity to act yet on Mr. Berman's request of June 3, 1963 for rezoning the 200-ft strip heretofore mentioned, for the reason that the Zoning Board of Appeals must first consider the request and make a recommendation to the Council; and the Zoning Board wanted to wait for Consultant Bagby's reasons before they officially met to consider the request. Mr. Bagby always attends the meetings of the Planning Commission and presumably will attend the June 24, 1963 meeting, which the Zoning Board will be urged to attend.
