Open House Sunday At Lowell's New Million-Dollar High School

The new Lowell Senior High School building will be open for public inspection on Sunday, Aug. 25, from 2 to 4 p.m. The school is located on Foreman Street in the northwest part of the city.

The new building has a total area of 72,354 square feet. In its present form it has a capacity of 650 students, though with the addition of rooms in the future it could handle 900 students-the number of pupils which the 'core' area (library, auditorium, study hall, etc.) has been designed to handle.

Contracted cost of the building alone is \$787,740, which averages out to \$10.90 per square foot. The national average cost of school buildings being constructed today comes to a little over \$14.00 a square foot.

Points of special interest in the new school include the 300-seat auditorium; the physical education wing on the south side of the building; the new library, in which extensive use of glass walls has been made; the industrial arts shop, which has completely new equipment; and the attractive entrance lobby at the north end of the building.

Central feature of the main lobby of the building is a 10'x20' ceramic-tile mural which depicts various aspects of the school curriculum. Opposite this is a triangle-shaped trophy case.

For JV and varsity basketball practices, and for conducting two physical education classes at once, the gymnasium can be divided by a large canvas curtain into two standard-size courts. For conference basketball games, however, and for assembly programs, folding bleachers can be pulled out from the gym walls to seat spectators.


In the balcony area over the boys' locker room are additional folding bleachers. The area will also be used for wrestling practice and as a recreation area. Two shuffle-board courts have been inlaid into the balcony floor.

The architects have designed the building so that the gymnasium wing lies close to the parking lot facilities - a fact which will be found convenient by those attending basketball games. The large parking area, which has been completely black-topped, will also be used as a drivers training course.

A special feature in the mathematics-science (east) wing of the building is the installation of special drains made of Pyrex glass tubing. The new drains are quaranteed to resist the corrosive action of acids used in scientific experiments.

The building features aluminum entrances, window frames, and interior sash trim; Lucite chalkboards; terrazzo corridors and kitchen, toilet, and locker-area floors; acoustical tile in classroom and corridor ceilings, with builtin removable sections for ceiling access; built-in hardwood cabinetwork; and recessed corridor lockers topped by display shelves.

The exterior materials used in the construction of the building all have a permanent finish. Corridor, lobby and cafeteria walls are of brick, and the walls in the kitchen, toilets, locker area, etc., are of glazed tile.
