

With the completion of switch-over procedures next Sunday morning, Lowell will be the most recent Western Michigan city to join the extensive Wolverine Electric Cooperative system,

To bring the new power to Lowell, the Wolverine company built a new transmission line into town from its nearest sub-station, located 14 miles away near Lake Odessa, Estimated cost of the transmission line, borne entirely by the Cooperative, was \$10,000 a

Lowell's participation in the Coeperative will enable the community to operate its plant more efficiently. Instead of revving up the light company's diesel generators to meet great drains on the community's power supply, and then slowing them down again when the demand slacks off, engineers at the local plant will be able to operate the diesels at an even rate and allow the new automatic equipment at the Riverside Drive sub-station to handle any abrupt increases in the demand.

Like other cities participating in the Cooperative, Lowell will also be able to switch over entirely to Wolverine power in the event of mechanical breakdown at the local plant,






