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## Bodies of Three Found

The bodies of a father and two children were found at 9:30 Wednesday morning by State Police from the Ionia Post when a passing motorist saw a car parked at the dead end of Snow Avenue, south of the I-96 Freeway.

State Police at the Rockford Post said at noon on Wednesday that they had been tentatively identified as Lewis A. Darling, 30, of Route 3, Charlotte, and his two children Kimberly Jane, 4, and Lewis, 3.

The mother of the children, Sherry A. Darling of Lansing, who is divorced from her husband, Lewis, is, who had custody of the children, was expected in Lowell to identify the bodies which were taken to the Roth Funeral Home.

Darling had parked the car on the dead end road, and ran a hose from the exhaust pipe into the car.

A third child, Roger, 2, had not been located yet on Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Brail is a retired school administrator in Baldwin. He was elected a district governor for 1963-64 at Rotary's 54th annual convention in St. Louis, Missouri, last June. He is one of 272 district governors responsible for supervising the activities of more than 11,500 Rotary clubs with a total membership of 535,500 Rotarians in 129 countries around the globe.

"The visit of the governor," the president of the local club said, "is a time for examining the effectiveness of what we are doing to achieve Rotary goals in community improvement, in youth work, in raising the standards of our businesses and professions, and in doing what we can as a Rotary club and as individual Rotarians to help further international understanding."

As governor of this Rotary district, Mr. Brail supervises the organization of new clubs in his area. Last year, more than 300 new Rotary clubs were organized in 46 countries, with clubs being formed for the first time in the West African country of Sierra Leone.

Before assuming his duties as district governor, Mr. Brail attended an eight-day meeting at Lake Placid, N. Y., held to assist Rotary governors to meet the duties of their office.

Grandville Wins 20-19

At the homecoming game last Friday night, Grandville squeaked by a battling Lowell team 20-19. The final Grandville score came with only 19 seconds to play in the game; Lowell had scored just 25 seconds earlier.

Lowell kicked off to Grandville to open the game and the ball bounced off a Bulldog lineman, and Lowell took over on the Grandville 49. Three successive first downs on gains by McMahon and Kropf.

Grandville came right back and scored from the 5 after rumbling up the center 29 yds then slashing to the 5 yard stripe. They kicked the extra point to lead with 2:36 to play in the last quarter 14-13.

Lowell had 10 first downs to Grandville's 13; Lowell attempted 16 passes completed 6 for 105 yards; Grandville attempted 8, completed 5 for a total of 126 yards, McMahon gained 70 yds, in 18 carries and Kropf 52 yds, in 18 carries for a total of 122 yds, of the 139 that Lowell made rushing.

Lowell water that has been even more rusty than regularly for the past few weeks will begin a program of treatment this week to bring the rust problem under control, Bernard Olson, City Manager, told the council on Monday night.

With all the Foreman wells back in operation the sprinkling ban has been lifted and a regular program of flushing the mains will start this Friday, October 11. Polyphosphates will be added to the water at the Foreman wells to loosen the rust from the mains and put it in solution; this with regular flushing during the winter months is expected to make real improvement in the rusty water problem.

Olson told the council that in some communities this polyphosphate treatment with consistent flushing cleared up the rusty water.

Continued Study For New Wells

A meeting with city water engineer, Albert Roth, and geologist consultant for the Great Northern Wells Co., and the city manager was reported to the council Monday night. It was decided by the council to go along with further tests west of the general area of the Foreman wells for a new water source. The council authorized expenditures on tests and exploration up to a \$1,500 total. As soon as the results are studied at least one 24 inch test well will be drilled. A new water supply is expected to be ready by next summer.

Ask OK on Additional Plat

Douglas Dok, builder and developer in the Valley Vista plat on West Main Street appeared before the council and asked preliminary for a second plat to be ready for next spring. The new plat will improve two streets and provide an additional 35 lots to make a total of 67 lots available for building. Eight homes are now under construction in the plat, and Dok told the council that he expects to build several more this winter. The council authorized the manager to begin hearings on the proposed new plat.

New Tank Truck Ready

Lowell fireman have the tank and pump mounted on the new tank truck purchased by Lowell Townships and the Kent County Fire Dept. Work was authorized to enclose the tank with storage compartments to make the unit more complete.

## Witnesses Typhoon While Aboard Ship

Following are excerpts from a letter received by the Don MacNaughton family from Frank Van Dusen, who is a member of the crew of the S. S. Barbara Frietche, enroute to the Far East. The letter is dated September 20.

"Believe it or not, but we haven't got to Singapore yet and we have been out 37 days. This really is the slow boat to China. Normally a Liberty is only a 10-knot ship, but 9 knots is about tops for us. After leaving Yokahama we started picking up the swells from two typhoons that were out there ahead of us. I don't recall the name of No. 13, but No. 14, Gloria, was the closest and the most dangerous, packing winds 350 miles from the center each way, forcing us to go 200 miles south to get around her. The weather was good, but terrific swells three to five feet high and 100 yards from crest to crest coming at us all the time and you could not make any speed at all. 5 knots most of the time. By losing so much time we used more oil, so now that we are in good seas we only are making 7 1/2-8 1/2 knots, so we don't run out and have to be towed in. Some of the men, or "kids" I should say, are making kites for a pastime and flying them. Others are dragging fishing lines over the stern (7 of them.) Between the drag of the lines and kites, I think we must lose 1/2 knot. Too bad the wind isn't blowing the other way and the kites could pull us. At least it's a lot better than chasing each other around with fire axes."

"In a postscript, Frank adds, 'After 9,000 miles of dragging, they finally hooked a fish—guess what, a barracuda!'"





## Students Should Understand Need For Counseling

If students are to receive counseling, they must desire or be led to see the value of counseling, says Edward C. Roeder, University of Michigan professor of education.

How can staff members help whet the appetite of students for counseling?

Says Roeder, "The climate in which counseling takes place is of the utmost importance. The counselor must accept the student as a person as well as respect his attitudes and ideas so that the student need not fear ridicule, punishment, or evaluation."

"The relationship must foster understanding of the student, and facilitate the student's self-understanding. Unfortunately, in some schools the staff feels that the counselor is always on the student's side. This makes it difficult for a counselor to maintain an effective helping relationship with all students."

A good counselor senses the significance of decision-making to a student's development, Roeder says. "He therefore encourages a student to explore the consequences of alternative choices and permits him to make his own decisions, whether 'good' or 'bad.'"

He also recognizes that "a student's attitudes, ideas, and concerns are personal." says the University educator. "Since counseling depends upon the student's willingness to share his personal thoughts with someone else, the counselor is obligated to respect a student's right to privacy—exceptions are situations that involve potential physical harm to self and others." Roeder's views are from an article, "Theory Into Practice," published by the Bureau of Educational Research at Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio.

## Lamb for Dinner

Between Mary's Little Lamb and counting sheep, we Americans seem to do a lot of talking about lamb, but we don't eat a lot. In fact, only about three per cent of the meat we eat is lamb.

Lamb is always tender, never tough, that is, if it's cooked properly. According to Michigan meat laws, lamb must be under one year of age. Mutton comes from older sheep.

Some people say they just "don't like lamb." However, they may not be able to tell roast lamb, from roast pork or veal if properly prepared.

Lamb does have a delicate, but distinctive, flavor. Some connoisseurs prefer the strong flavor of mutton to lamb.

Young lamb is easy to identify by its pink, fine, firm lean meat, its abundant fat and pinkish cut bones, and a smooth covering of clear, white brittle fat.

When selecting lamb, remember there's more to lamb than legs, loins and ribs. These are the most popular cuts, so they carry a premium price tag, and they make up only about 23 of a lamb carcass. The less-demanded cuts often sell for only about one-half of what the retailer must pay for lamb. To compensate for the losses on some cuts, the retailer must charge a higher price for the more demanded cuts.

Cuts from the neck, shoulder, breast flank, and foreshank, can provide a lot of thrifty and tasty meals for families. Lamb shoulder, roast, or shoulder chops, are generally very low in price. The meaty ribs on a breast of lamb are mouth-watering when barbecued. Tender lamb shanks make generous individual servings, and may be either roasted or braised. Don't forget to take advantage of ground lamb, it makes wonderful hamburgers.

The thin paper-like covering over the outside of lamb is the fell. It is not necessary to remove it unless you are making stew, or other meat mixtures. When roasting, leaving the fell on helps to hold the shape of the roast, cuts cooking time, and holds in the juices.

Serve lamb hot or cold, but never in-between. The delicate flavor of lamb is at its best when either hot or cold. Lamb is at its juiciest when cooked about medium-done. Your favorite cookbook will provide you with many new ideas for taking advantage of price bargains in lamb. Your family may just decide to become lamb lovers.


