## Engineers Present Council With Plans For Sewer Treatment Plant

Ken Anderson and Tom Newhof, representing Williams and Works, City sewer treatment plant engineers, presented plans to the council members on Monday night for a \$310,000 project.

The plans authorized after the State Health Department insisted that the City take steps to put its sewerage through an approved treatment plant.

Work on this project cannot be started until a revenue bond issue is approved by the voters.

Lowell has its application in for a federal grant of some \$90,000 to help the City with this project. Whether Lowell will be given this grant this year is very doubtful. Lowell has 9 points of credit towards approval—last year some 15 points were necessary to get approval.

The bond issue may have to be voted and the project held up until federal aid is forthcoming, the engineers suggested.

**Plant At Recreation Park**  
Plans as drawn, call for building the plant south of the Recrea-

tion Park area in the section near the junction of the Flat and Grand Rivers.

An area some 250 feet square, would have to be built up above the high water levels for the sewerage treatment facilities. Planned is a clarifier where all the sewerage is pumped by a lift station near the present west side septic tank.

East side sewerage would be brought across the river to this lift station.

A building 52 x 42 would house the digesters and chlorinating equipment and have the needed storage of supplies and laboratory space. The plant would have a capacity of over a million gallons a day.

After the sewerage is cooked in the digesters, it is drawn off on drying beds and the residue is hauled away.

The engineers estimated it would take about \$8 in chlorine a day, \$10 a day in electrical current for the pumps, natural gas in the digesters, and a full time man. The yearly cost of running the plant was set at about \$16,000.

Service were held Saturday afternoon at the Roth Funeral Home for Joseph P. Speerstra, age 67, of Lincoln Lake Avenue, Lowell, who died Wednesday evening, October 23, 1963, at Veterans' Hospital, Ann Arbor, after an illness of almost one year.

The services were conducted by the Rev. Alton Mills of Evert, and interment was made in Oakwood Cemetery.

The son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Peter Speerstra, Sr., he was born in Middleville, Michigan, on May 5, 1896, and in his youth lived in Ada and Saginaw with the family before making his home in Lowell, where he has resided most of his life.

Before his retirement two years ago, he was caretaker of Fallasburg Park, and was a life member of the Ada Masonic Lodge. When World War I broke out, he enlisted in the U. S. Army and served for the duration in Company K of the 32nd Division of the 126th Infantry.

Mr. Speerstra is survived by his wife, Treva, and daughter, Mary Alice of Lowell; three brothers, Dr. Herman of Alma, Alfred of Saginaw, and Peter of Lowell; one sister-in-law, Mrs. Ben Speerstra; two step-children, Mrs. Everett Carey and Clinton Christoff, all of Lowell; five grandchildren; one great-grandchild; and several nieces and nephews.

Lowell will wind up the football season on Friday night when they travel to Belding.

Belding has threatened to break loose in several of their games this season, but in most cases have been thwarted. They have won only one conference game, against Cedar Spring. Earlier in the season, they defeated Chesaning.

### Defeat Caledonia 40-6

Lowell took an easy win over Caledonia, in their first meeting of the 1963 season, last Friday, 40-6.

Lowell's strong defensive forward wall of Serne, Justifer, Bieri and Meyers stopped the Scotties cold. They made only two first downs in the entire first half, while this defensive group played.

The offensive squad of Lowell's

failed to score until the first quarter was 8 1/2 minutes old, McMahon carried the ball in from the one, and Kropf went over for the point.

Caledonia came back with its only threat of the night, and on a long pass from Benedict to Sinclair, for 45-yards, accounted for their only score.

Kropf scored from the 8 with 4 second left in the quarter, and Videon skirted end for the extra point.

Lowell scored twice in the second quarter—a pass from Elzinga to McMahon for 29-yards, Elzinga passed to Walter for the point; Elzinga passed to McIver for a 25-yard touchdown. Final score at halftime was 27-0.

The varsity played about half the 3rd period and scored twice more before Pierce substituted with his entire bench of 44 players, and they all got a chance to play.

McMahon got his third touchdown going in from the 12 yard line. Kropf kicked the extra point. The final marker was made on a pass from Elzinga to McIver for 18-yards.

A poor kick off the side of the foot, from inside the 10, resulted in a 15-yard punt with a runback for a touchdown. The extra point was good, making the score 13 to 0.

During the fourth quarter, behind some good blocking and running Pat Hoag went through the middle of the Ottawa line for 45 yards, and a touchdown. The extra point was missed, making the score 13 to 6.

Later in the fourth quarter, Ottawa Hills scored on a 35-yard pass and run for their last touchdown. The extra point was made, and the final score was 20 to 6. Lowell was not counted out, coming right back down field with a 45-yard pass good to the one-yard line. However, it was nullified on a penalty.
