Council Hears Discussion of Co. Wide Public Works Program at Meet Monday

At the council meeting on Monday evening the council was brought up to date on the Kent County Public Works program by David DesPres, engineer for the public works board. He told the council that the first program now under consideration was on a water supply for the metropolitan area.

This would bring Lake Michigan water to Grandville, Wyoming, Paris Twp. and perhaps as far as Cascade or Ada, Lowell, he said, was beyond the area which would benefit. He also told the council that the areas that benefit from

the public works program would bear the cost, and the balance of the county would not be involved.

It was revealed that only by organizing the entire metropolitan areas could economical services be provided, and would help the economy of the entire county.

Take Bids

The council also took bids on trees. Low bidder was Biehler and Sons of Ionia who bid \$390.00, some \$161.00 lower than the next highest bid. In the bids for a new fire siren, Fire and Police Equipment Company of Grand Rapids had the low bid for the siren and its tower and special equipment of \$825.90.

In bids for gasoline supply for the city all 3 local distributors made identical bids of 16 1/2 cents per gallon.

The city asked for bids on a police cruiser, both trading in the 1963 model and without a trade-in. There has discussion on having a second car for stand-by use and for special occasions. Low bidder on a straight deal with no trade-in was Jackson Motor Sales on a new Dodge at \$2185.31. McQueen Motors offered the best deal on a trade for a new Plymouth at \$1189.00.

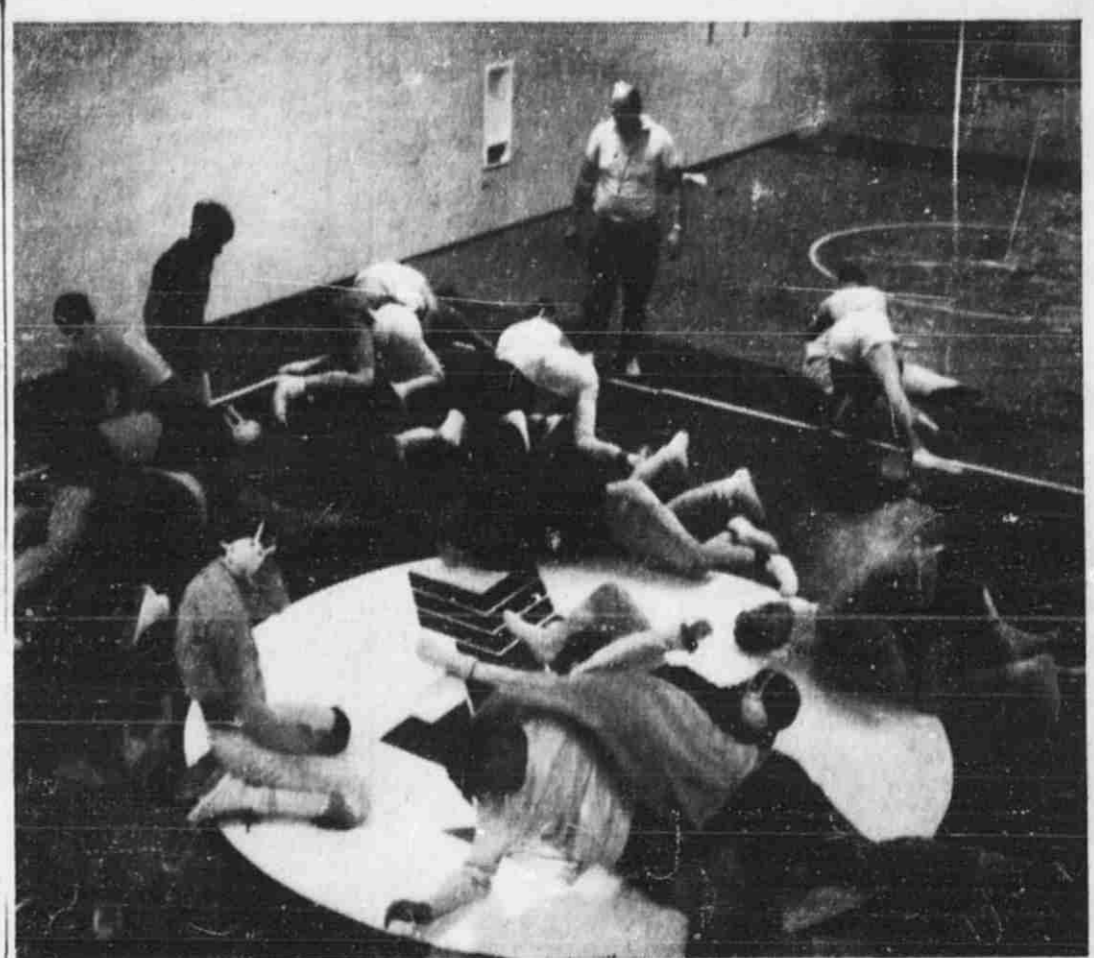
Alex is an active member of the Vergennes Methodist church and is presently president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship group.

Time To Worry About Winter Driving Hazards

Chief of Police Avery W. Block, who worries about next month's traffic safety record like the rest of us worry about next month's budget, today explained a unique characteristic of winter driving hazards.

"It's clear to most drivers," Chief Block began, "that winter driving involves many of the same danger factors that are with us the year around—such as, other drivers missing their signals, kids running into the street, jay-walking pedestrians, and the like.

"What we may forget is that winter weather can rob us of our best means of coping with such hazards."

The chief pointed out that a driver defends himself by keeping a sharp lookout and when dangers looms, depending upon his brakes for a sure, safe stop.

"Both of these vital defenses against accidents—looking and stopping—can be rendered ineffective by the twin winter hazards of sharply lowered visibility and reduced road traction," he explained.

"Lowered visibility results from darkness, falling snow, frost or snow that has not been carefully cleared from car windows. This makes it entirely possible that we won't see trouble as soon as we should. And then what happens? A fast stop may be out of the question—no matter how good our brakes are—if the roadway is glazed by ice or packed snow."

Even if a driver is moving at a speed below the normal, legal limit—say 20 miles an hour—it will take some 60 feet to bring his car to a stop on loosely packed snow and close to 200 feet on glare ice, the chief warned. "This fact has been clearly demonstrated in scientific tests by the Committee on National Safety Council and it has the endorsement of the International Association of Chiefs of Police," he said.

"These two terrible hazards—poor visibility and poor traction—are going to have a lot to say about our safety record in the months ahead," Chief Block predicted. "Drivers who have accidents may talk about 'bad luck'—

But accidents aren't caused by bad luck as often as they are by taking chances. The dangers of winter driving could be pretty well neutralized by guarding our two best defenses: our ability to see and our ability to stop."

The means by which winter safety capability can be maintained are neither new nor difficult, the chief observed.

Decline In Births Now In Sixth Year

Unless there is a sudden upturn in the number of births in Michigan during the last three months of the year, 1963 will be the sixth year in a row in which births have declined.

In the three-quarter mark, a total of 130,072 babies was reported to the Michigan Department of Health-2.93 less than the number reported through September a year ago, and more than 10,000 less than were reported at the same time in 1961.

In order to equal last year's total of 131,754 new babies, births will have to average around 14,800 a month in October, November, and December. So far this year, births have averaged around 14,800 a month, ranging from a low of 15,451 in January to a high of 15,611 in September.

The "population explosion" reached a peak of 228,688 in Michigan in 1957, but has been declining steadily since then.

If the number of births this year falls below the 180,000 mark, it will be the lowest number since 1952.

Cascade Looks Up! Airport Opens Saturday

The day Cascade residents have been waiting for, or afraid of, for the past five years will dawn Saturday when the new Kent County airport is in full operation.

Residents who have been optimistic and afraid of the noise will be looking up at circling planes and listening for the roaring motors at take-off. Ready or not... here they come!

Kent County Airport operations will be moved to the new multi-million dollar facility in Cascade Township at midnight this Saturday, November 23.

The new terminal building will be partially finished for the opening project was a sewage treatment plant; north-south runway, 3,400 feet; east-west runway, 6,000 feet; parallel taxiway and high-speed turnoffs; terminal building and landing concourse; fire station and maintenance building; water pumping station and reservoir; Northern Air Service maintenance hangar; and Northern Air's private and corporate plane hangars.

Plans started in 1954 when the proposed plan and site for the new airport were being discussed Leigh Fisher, head of a consulting firm, recommended that the new airport be located in the Cascade area.

The board of supervisors accepted his report, and sought state and federal approval for the site towards the possible construction of a new 2,035-acre county airport in the Cascade vicinity.

Organized opposition to a proposed new Kent County airport in Cascade Township gained strength when more than 100 township residents gathered at a mass meeting to raise funds to support a formal move aimed at halting the project.

Layout Presented On August 17, 1959, James C. Buckley, consultant, revealed his plans for the new airport, and presented a chart showing how revenue from the facility would increase gradually to pay back the county for its support.

Voters of Kent County went to the polls in June of 1960 and approved a bond issue of \$3,975,000 to build the airport. The proposition for airport bonds, which all voters voted on, was passed by a vote of 2,352 yeas to 2,931 noes.

Kent County leaders braved the falling rain in September of 1962 to attend groundbreaking ceremonies for the \$11 million dollar terminal building, which was scheduled for completion in October of 1963.

Annex 41-Areas Under heavy protest in February of 1963 the Grand Rapids City commission, the board of supervisors, and the Cascade Township board annexed the 41-acre terminal building area to the city of Grand Rapids.

April 1, 1963, was set as the effective date of the transfer which was requested by the Kent County board of supervisors. The transfer was to seeking a city liquor-by-the-glass license for a planned "quality" restaurant at the airport.

Residents of Cascade township in an earlier election turned their thumbs down on a liquor-by-the-glass license.

These above-mentioned incidents are only a few which lead from a dream to a reality in 6 years, and can be viewed by the residents of Kent County this Saturday and every Saturday thereafter.
