## Over 14,170 At Area Polio Clinics

The oral polio vaccine drive proved a success in the Lowell and Alto areas. Parents and children turned out in a surprising number to take the serum of three "sugar cubes." The Runciman Elementary and Alto Area Elementary schools were distribution points in these two communities.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce sponsored this drive in cooperation with the mothers in both areas. Much of the success of the drive goes to the cooperation, as well as that of the doctors, who donated their time to the program. James Barber and Mrs. Helen Noah, school nurse, Mrs. John Timpon, jr., and Mrs. Mable Seigle co-sponsored the programs in the Lowell and Alto areas.

In the Lowell program, the total drive reached 14,170 people, averaging 4,723 in each of the three sessions. Each clinic saw more people attending than the previous time. The Alto area reported that 1150 attended each of the three sessions.

The experience at both centers showed much interest in the program and a desire to take advantage of the full service.

### Three Minors in Possession Roll Car Over Friday

A 16-year-old Grand Rapids youth received a reckless driving summons and was cited for being a minor in possession of an alcoholic beverage following an accident on Friday night at the Kent and Ionia County line, east of Lowell, after 9 p. m.

Ionia state police reported that Robert Royce, 16, of 913 Arlington, N. E., was southbound on Montclair Avenue when he lost control of his car near the M-21 intersection, and rolled over. Police reported that excessive speed was responsible for the accident.

Royce received minor injuries, while his two passengers, Larry Harburda, 17, of 848 Aberdeen, Grand Rapids, and Richard McDonald, 18, of 924 Fountain, Grand Rapids, were not injured.

Troopers said the boys had an intoxicant in the car and all three were cited for being minors in possession.

Royce will appear in a Kent County probate court, and the other two youth will appear before Lowell Justice of the Peace, Howard Rittenger.

## Modern Teaching Methods Being Used In Elementary School, Board Told

Four elementary school teachers and the principal gave a presentation at the Board of Education meeting on Monday evening, bringing out what is new in the local school system and the progress being made. The report was one of a series requested by the board to bring them up to date.

Principal Dirk Venema presented the teachers to the board who each in turn spoke on their special work in the overall elementary school program. Mrs. Ann Borgerson displayed a Reading Achievement Kit which is being used in several grades, which gives every student a chance to progress in reading at their own speed. Students move from step to step in the kit of reading tests as rapidly as their ability develops.

Mrs. Borgerson pointed out that this has proven a valuable aid in improving reading ability.

Mrs. Delores Doyle presented the modern math program being tested in several classes. She admitted that it is not entirely successful, but is useful in pushing more advanced students into more difficult math work.

Parents are particularly puzzled when they look over this teaching method, but further testing will be continued here.

Mrs. Orion Thaler was introduced as the teacher in Lowell's first primary ungraded room, started this fall. Many schools are finding this a real help for many students, the board was told. Lowell is giving it a try on the first grade level this year. What is known as a continual progress, is produced in this room. There is no pressure on the children; the teacher observes the advancement of the members of the class, and advances them as they master reading and understanding what they read.

This class will be continued and it may be extended if results warrant, it was revealed.

### Children Start Too Young

Mrs. Ruth Thurell, kindergarten teacher, made several observations to the board about the allowing of children to begin kindergarten too young. She discussed the fact that many problems in kindergarten and first grade come from students who start school before their fifth birthday.

Many schools have moved the cut off date from the December 1st time set by the state to September 1st and some even earlier, Mrs. Thurell stated. It was noted that experts have set a six year and four-month-old date as about the time a child is ready to learn to read. The early start some children get, do not get them to this date until they are well into the first grade.

Some thought is being given by researchers on the need for a readiness examination for kindergarten, which would solve this problem.

### New Teachers Hired

Superintendent Nisbet announced to the board that Miss Barbara Transue has been employed to teach second grade. She will fill the vacancy caused by Mrs. Leona McArthur's resignation because of illness. Miss Transue just obtained her degree from Michigan State University, she taught for five years previously; the last three at Northview.

It was also announced that Mrs. Frances Mendez of Alto has been hired to teach physical education two days a week at the Alto Elementary School. She has a physical education minor from William Penn College and has seven years experience in recreation and youth work in Chicago.

Mr. Nisbet revealed that Mrs. Mary Ann Ayres has been employed to work in the high school office to replace Mrs. Mary Richards who will assist in the superintendent's office.

### Petition For Bible Study

Over 100 Lowell high school students presented a petition to the school board asking for a bible study meeting once a week in the high school auditorium during the lunch hour. Further investigation as to the legality of allowing this is being checked. The constitution bans religious training during the time when the authority of the school is applied, this includes the noon hour.

A letter from Mrs. C. J. Christoff was read to the board, the letter was highly complimentary of Principal Carl Hagen and the fine discipline and attitude presented by the students in the high school. She also commended many of the teachers on the staff.

### Calling Off School?

The basis for calling off school on bad weather days was discussed by the board, and it was agreed to continue to follow the same procedure as last year.

The decision will be made by Superintendent Nisbet in the morning by driving over the roads in the area. Principals and teachers will be notified, and the public through announcement on WOOD-TV and WOOD radio.

### Frances Burtle Learns In Classroom Experience

One of the most essential phases in preparing new teachers is now in progress for the fall semester at Western Michigan University, with 400 students from the School of Education being placed in Southwestern Michigan classrooms.

Under the guidance of experienced teachers, these newcomers to the field are spending one semester of their senior year teaching in their subject fields and learning just how schools run.

Frances Burtle of Route 1, Lowell, is student teaching in Home-making II, III, and IV classes at Paw Paw Junior High School, Paw Paw, Michigan. Frances is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Burtle, Route 1, Lowell.

Dr. A. L. Sebaly, director of student teaching, states that this experience is most helpful, and permits some students to find out if they really want to teach before they actually sign a contract. As they take college classes at the same time, students have an opportunity daily to evaluate their experiences and to apply educational theories to practical situations.

**Thin Ice Dangerous For Exploring Yokes**  
Winter's ice on lakes and streams is a long-awaited treat for many youngsters but it can also be a threat to their lives early in the season, the State Police point out.

In some areas early winter ice may look thick and safe enough to walk and slide on but actually may be too thin to hold up under a youngster's weight. Because of this danger, parents are urged to caution their children against venturing on lakes and streams without first determining if the ice is thick enough. Ice on top of deep bodies of water should be several inches thick, preferably about four, to assure safety. Even where lakes and streams are judged safe and are used for skating and sliding, there should be provision for rescue in event of a breakthrough which may be caused by surface pressure cracks or where ice may be made thin by water currents underneath. Long branches, poles, ropes or a ladder should be available to reach a person who has broken through. Caution in crossing ice is urged as well for hunters, fishermen or other outdoor fans who travel over frozen lakes or streams during their outings. At least 12 persons drowned during 1962 when they fell through ice in Michigan. The toll the year before was 13.

They can be found in Connecticut, Georgia, Indiana, Kentucky, Maryland, New Hampshire, and Pennsylvania. There are two "Noels"—in Virginia and Missouri.
