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Attack Caledonia 105-65 Arrow basketball season winds up Friday against Spring Lake here

Friday evening will wind up the regular season basketball schedule for the Lowell Red Arrows and than they will begin preparations for the state high school basketball tournaments which begin the first week in March.

Friday's opponent will be Spring Lake, a team that Lowell outran by an 107 to 95 score on their home floor on January 28.

The Spring Lake varsity team is coached by George DeVries, a 1956 graduate of Lowell High School. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond DeVries, live at 321 Grand Street, Lowell.

DeVries, who played excellent basketball for the Red Arrows during his high school years, was among the top scorers in the Grand Valley conference.

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Lowell wins third Tri-River wrestling championship

Demolishes car; escapes injury

A Lowell man escaped with minor injuries Monday morning when his car went off the roadway and over an embankment west of the M-21-Bellamy Road intersection.

Ionia State Police, who investigated the accident, said Wayne L. Hoag of 319 North Monroe Street, Lowell, was westbound at more than 60 miles an hour when he lost control of his car and veered off the highway.

The car lurched back and forth for over 500 feet before going into a sideways skid for 100 feet and striking six guard rails. The wagon then struck a tree, which came down on the rear of the car, and plunged down a steep embankment, the troopers said.

Hoag, who was slightly injured, was charged with driving under the influence of intoxicants and was lodged in the Ionia County Jail.

When he appeared before Arthur Fox, justice of the peace, late Monday morning, Hoag was sentenced to ten days in the Ionia County Jail beginning this Saturday.

All of the term will be served on week ends. He also paid \$50 fine and \$4.90 costs in preference to a 30 day jail sentence.

Letter to Editor School board President clarifies heating problems in junior high

Dear Mr. Jefferies: I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for the excellent coverage you have provided the Lowell Area Schools and its many activities. I believe no newspaper has offered its readers more up-to-date information on its school system than the Ledger. The athletic program has received a great deal of attention and the academic guidance program has greatly benefited by the Ledger articles, which have been written by our fine counselor, Hans Andrews.

As has been mentioned several times publicly by members of the Board of Education, it is hoped that our community will be informed about its educational program and plant. This the Ledger is doing. We have recently moved the meetings of the Board of Education to the library in the new High School building. We hope that citizens of the district will visit our meetings held the second Monday of each month.

I would like to call your attention to your article printed on page one of the February 20, 1964, issue. This article regarding rising school costs made reference to something I believe should be clarified. The statement I refer to was, "Investigation of the big jump in heating costs found some fuel wasting practices among the faculty and some faulty valves that were repaired."

The big problem in our heating plant exists in our Junior High building. This building is very old; and when we attempt to use a plant of its age to satisfy our needs for 1964, we are in trouble. Superintendent Nisbet recently prepared a notice to all faculty members explaining the problems which have in many instances been mechanical. I enclose a copy for your information. In fairness to the personnel of the Lowell Area Schools I believe we should remember that our teachers are hired to teach. They can't be expected to understand the mechanics of the heating plant. They expect our Board and Administration to provide the proper facility which of course means adequate heating with adequate controls. This winter has been most unusual and it is most difficult to heat these buildings. The Board of Education and Administration will do everything in their power to provide for controlled heat in its buildings. Constant attention has been given this problem by our Administration, and we hope that when all mechanical problems are taken care of we can report a reduction in operating costs.

Again, I want to thank you for the cooperation given the Lowell Area Schools and especially your interest by your attendance at all of its meetings. Yours truly, Tyrus R. Wessel
