Not only was Maria Macaria (extreme right) there, plus the supervisor and her four helpers but numerous others who just dropped in to help. The Indian on the extreme left is me!

It was such a joy to work with the executive committe and with the women, All of them are intelligent people, sensitive, eager to learn and just as willing to offer suggestions on how best to run the program. And Rita and I realized that they had taught us just as much, if not more, than we had taught

A month ago, the men of the committee decided that they wanted to send a letter to my family, to assure them that I was well and happy (the Lord's truth). They asked me to take pictures and I did. Last week, my parents receiv-

ed the letter. Here in part, is what the men told them: "On behalf of the Association of Parents of the Family of the School No. 3, we greet you with the love of God. We want to tell you that the senorita Ana is here in the humble town of Patzun, working enthusiastically with us in the hot lunch program. . . since we don't know you personally, and you don't know us, we want to send you these fotos, so that you will know that she is happy among us, and hope that you are the same to know about her."
