Convicts lead police on merry chase in Ada bushes Monday; one at large

Two escapees from the Ionia State Penitentiary ended the first leg of a wild bid for freedom Monday night by crashing the stolen Ionia County Road Commission truck in which they were fleeing into a utility pole at the junction of M-21 and Grand River Drive in Ada.

The end of the "freedom ride" came when State Police officers flattened the tires on the truck with bursts of fire from a .12-gauge shotgun, fired from a police cruiser traveling in hot pursuit of the truck.

One of the escapees—Philip Hobdy, 25—was captured as he lay hidden in nearby underbrush. The second—James Bryant, 20—was still at large at 8 a. m. Tuesday when State Police and Kent County Sheriff's officers abandoned their search of the area.

Describe Escapee
A spokesman at the State Police Post in Rockford said Tuesday morning that Bryant is 5 ft. 11 in. tall, weighs 170 lbs., and has brown hair and hazel eyes. He was serving a 3-15-year sentence in the Ionia prison for car theft in Genesee County.

Hobdy was serving a 7-15-year sentence for breaking and entering in Berrien County.

State police troopers stationed at the Ada bridge first spotted

the fleeing truck at 10:21 p. m. as it sped west on M-21.

Flashing red lights atop the police cruiser failed to halt the vehicle, and the police officers then attempted to overtake the truck and force it to the side of the highway. The convicts forestalled this maneuver, however, by swerving their truck back and forth in the path of the pursuing police car.

Shoot Tires
The officers then began shooting at the truck's rear tires, taking care, the spokesman said, not to fire in the vicinity of nearby homes or other automobile traffic.

The troopers reported that their first shots failed to halt the truck, even though it was obvious that the left rear tire of the vehicle had been hit.

The troopers then perforated the truck's right rear tire with another blast from the shotgun, and the truck swerved as the convicts fought to keep it under control.

"A couple of times it looked like the truck was going to roll over," one of the troopers later reported.

Smash Cement Curb
At the junction of M-21 and Grand River Drive, the convicts swerved the truck sharply to the right in an attempt to elude the pursuing police. The vehicle went out of control, shattered a newly-laid section of cement curbing, and plowed into a nearby utility pole.

Electrical wires supported by the pole fell to the ground, barring the path of the cruiser. The troopers, however, drove under the wires.

By this time the convicts, despite orders to halt, had fled on foot. The police officers gave chase, however, and found Hobdy hiding not far away in some bushes.

Other members of the Michigan State Police and the Kent County Sheriff's Department joined in the search for Bryant, using flashlights to light their way as they prowled through the underbrush near the Ada curve of the Grand Trunk railroad tracks.

City tax bills mailed Wednesday

Over 1,400 tax bills were placed in the mail to Lowell property owners this week. The "good news" is expected to arrive on Wednesday or Thursday.

The tax rate of 9.4 mills is approximately the same as the rate charged in the past several years. The levy will bring in a total tax of \$69,184.94.

Special assessments of \$2,478.06 were also included with the city taxes.

City taxes can be paid without penalty until July 31. The city treasurer has asked taxpayers to bring in their statements when paying taxes. This will speed up the collection procedure.

Temperatures lingered in the 90's early this week, bringing discomfort to all except the most cold-blooded of Lowell residents.

At the King Memorial Pool, 594 swimmers jumped in for a dip on Monday, topping last year's record tally of 592. And the records really fell on Tuesday when 652 swimmers crowded into the waters, seeking a little relief.

But, despite the heat, no kids that we knew were outdoors trying to fry eggs on the sidewalks. How come? What's the matter with this younger generation?

Main Street took a festive air this week when Showboat placards sprouted from lamp posts between Broadway and Washington streets. The placards, which picture the Robert E. Lee as well as old-fashioned Southern minstrels bear the dates of the 1964 version of the Showboat: July 29 through 25.

The Lowell Junior Chamber of Commerce—joined by the Lions Club, the Moose, the American Legion and the Chamber of Commerce—will again sponsor a gigantic fireworks display at the Recreation Park football field on the evening of July 4.

The Jaycees point out that there is no charge for this gala event.

The "face" of Main Street is slowly changing. Christian's Drug Store, for example, is in the throes of extensive remodeling this week—the opening between the two halves of the store is being widened, indirect lighting is being installed, and carpeting is to be laid in the cosmetics section.

At the Root-Lowell Manufacturing plant, second-floor offices at the west end of the building are being remodeled to provide office space for the company's president, sales manager and purchasing agent, who will soon move their operations to Lowell.

The most major bit of plastic surgery on Main Street, however, is the construction of four 60-foot silos for the storage of colored beans. The silos of slab construction, are being built by the C. H. Runciman Company by the Vestaburg Silo Company at a total cost of \$100,000. Completion date has been set for September 15.

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Fallsburg's July fourth plans will emphasize history of the area

July Fourth festivities in the Fallsburg area will have a doubly historical flavor this year.

The 188th anniversary of the nation's independence will be marked, of course, as well as the rich and varied history of the Fallsburg area.

Members of the Vergennes Cooperative Club will stage a potluck picnic at Fallsburg Park and then cap it off with an elaborate pageant. The picnic will begin at 12 noon. The pageant is scheduled to begin at 2 p. m.

The pageant, which will feature local residents in costumes, is made up of five scenes: "Indian Times," "Coming of the First White Settlers," "A Com-

munity Is Born," "The Civil War and Late 19th Century," and "The Birth of the Vergennes Cooperative Club."

"Cousin" Ed Denkema will be master of ceremonies for the event. Mrs. Stella Bradshaw will act as narrator.

Following the pageant, George Mueller of the Kent County Park Commission will present the proposed plans for the reconstructed Fallsburg Village. The proposed Village will be centered around the old covered bridge and one-room school house located on the Park grounds.

Plans are being made to form a Citizens' Organization to assist in the project.

Mrs. Townsend dies at age 83

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon for Mrs. Jennie M. Townsend, 83, a lifelong resident of Lowell who died June 24 at the Lowell Rest Home.

The Rev. R. A. Wittenbach officiated at the services, and burial was made in Oakwood Cemetery.

Mrs. Townsend, who was born on Dec. 14, 1880, was well-known in this area as the proprietress, years ago, of a newsstand located in the Look and Hartman drug stores. She was also a member of the Order of the Eastern Star and of senior citizens' groups.

She is survived by one son, Robert and two grandsons, Robert and Thomas, all of Lansing; two sisters, Mrs. Chauncey Freeman and Mrs. Clare Andersen; two brothers, John I. Wright of Lowell and James Wright of Owosso; and several nieces and nephews.

Another son, Clare, died in 1960.

INTENSIVE PATROL of highways over July 4th

State Police highway patrol coverage, with National Guard assistance, will be intensified for the 78-hour July 4 week-end in special efforts to hold down traffic accidents which killed 38 persons in that holiday period last year in Michigan.

Commissioner Joseph A. Childs reports, "The toll in 1963, which tied 1950 for the high mark for this holiday in the 18 years since World War II, resulted from 30 fatal accidents. Two of these were multiple deaths, each killing five persons and accounting for more than a fourth of the holiday loss. Both tolls of 38 occurred in 102-hour periods."

"Continued increases in mileage traveled means the potential for bad fatality experience is present any weekend, but especially during a holiday period," said Childs. "With holiday motoring usually a family event, the danger of multiple death accidents becomes greater. Vigilant obedience to the rules and good judgment are essential for safety."

The special patrols begin at noon Friday, July 3, and maximum coverage will be in effect from 3 p. m. to at least 9 p. m. each day of the week-end.

Pass days for State Police officers will be cancelled Friday through Sunday and detectives where available will take over desk assignments to relieve uniform men for patrols. The 114 members of the National Guard will assist as second men on night patrols or on point control.

Michigan's high mark for a 78-hour July 4 period was 35 deaths in 1954 while the low was eight in 1949, also the low for any July 4 since the war.

Better water on the way!

Lowell Water Department hooked up the new well on Foreman St. just west of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad tracks this week, and pumping was scheduled to start at mid-week.

The new well will allow the city to stop using water from the old east well which has a noticeable salt content when pumped heavily.

The new well has a high quality water which should bring relief to Lowell water patrons who have complained about the chloride content of the city water supply.

The new well will pump about 350 to 375 gallons per minute which will more than make up for what has been used from the east well. It is hoped that the new supply will prevent the necessity of a sprinkling ban in Lowell this summer.

To flush out the old water and clean up the mains, the water mains will be flushed on Friday (conditions permitting). City Manager Bernard Olson announced Tuesday.

GAS FUMES FELL THREE AT AMWAY

"It was terrible," said Mrs. Delores Sielawa. "You just couldn't breathe. I just had to have air—I felt like I was just kind of drifting off."

Mrs. Sielawa, 35, of 312 Burton St., S. E., was one of three Amway Corporation employees who were hospitalized Tuesday night after an industrial accident at the Ada detergent-making plant filled the building with noxious fumes.

Fifty people were evacuated from the building when the accident occurred shortly after 8 p. m. Besides Mrs. Sielawa, Shirley Eickhoff, 26, of 9537 Vergennes Ave., and Delara Miller, 18, of Route 3, Lowell, were rushed to Blodgett Memorial Hospital in Grand Rapids by ambulance.

The three women were treated at the hospital and, after undergoing a series of tests, were later released.

According to a report by Ada Fire Department officials, "a tank of sodium hydroxide heated up" and spread the noxious fumes through the plant. Members of the Ada Fire Department was called to the scene and, with the aid of gas masks, were able to bring the fumes under control.

Kent County Sheriff's officers also investigated the accident. An Amway Corporation executive denied Wednesday morning that rumors of an "explosion" were true. He described the gas fumes as "just California smog."

The three overcome workers "got sick" and were "taken to the hospital at our behest," he added.

Mrs. Sielawa said Wednesday morning that she still felt "groggy," but she expected to report to work as usual that afternoon. The other victims could not be reached for comment.
