

The third annual Lowell Moose Fishing Derby will be staged on July 18, LaVerne Baker, chairman of the event, announced this week.

Registration for the fishing contest, sponsored by the Lowell Moose Civic Affairs Committee, will take place next Saturday at Lewis Electric Co., 512 E. Main Street, between 9 a. m. and 3 p. m. No entry fee will be charged.

All children aged six through 12 are eligible to participate in the contest, but all contestants must be sure to register, Baker said.

Admission cards to the event will be given out at the time of registration. The admission cards must be signed by the children's parents and turned in on Derby Day.

Baker warned that no child will be permitted to board the Derby Bus without an admission card, nor will any unregistered child be permitted to enter the contest.

The buses bound for the event will leave the Moose Lodge shortly after 8:30 a, m, on July 18 and return to the Lewis Elec-

tric parking lot at approximately 2:30 p. m.

Baker said the Moose Civic Affairs Chuck Wagon will be on hand to provide a picnic lunch for each child. Contestants will only need to bring a fish pole, bait, and a bucket for the whop-

Letter to the editor 'No account' becomes \$45 on tax bill

Dear Sir: This is an open letter to the City Manager, the City Clerk, and fellow taxpayers of Lowell.

The following is my experience with the above officials:

Upon our retirement in 1963, my wife and I decided to move out of Detroit and locate in a smaller city. We eventually located a house for sale at 950 Riverside Drive through a real estate broker, and made a deposit on same. He had the abstract brought up to date, and, as an added precaution, we made a special trip from Detroit to Lowell to check with the City Clerk as to whether there were any unpaid city taxes or other obligations that might be a lien

why he had sent me a copy

of this letter. He informed me that I would be liable for this amount if it were not paid by the former owner.

> In view of this information and of the dates of invoice mentioned in the letter dated May l, 1964, it appears that both the City Clerk and the City Manager were well aware of the above obligation at the time of our inquiry in April 1963-at which time the obligation could have been paid to the city of Lowell out of the money to be paid for the property. 




