Breaks 1/2-mile speed record

The silence that hovered over the Grand Rapids Speedway Friday afternoon was shattered by the roar of a '301' Chevrolet screaming around the 1/2-mile asphalt oval.

The interruption was the testing of the new engine and suspension on the sprint car driven by Gordy Johnson of Hastings, Gorty, who raced speed modifications in this area, is piloting the sprint car owned by Fedder Aluminum out of Louisville, Kentucky. The rising young driver, listed in Who's Who in Racing, has piled up a remarkable record in the past several years.

Friday's test runs were in preparation for the big races at Winchester, Indiana, on Sunday. Making the new engine in and breaking the necessary adjustments, plus finding the right tire combination were problems which faced Johnson and his crew, headed by ace mechanic Duane Glasgow of Hastings.

At his garage in Hastings, Glasgow built the power plant in only four days, and the test runs set the spectators running for their ears at the 'Drome Friday.

But all the hard labor, worrying and butterflies in the stomach paid off Sunday afternoon when Johnson broke the world's speed record on a 1/2-mile asphalt oval at Winchester.

In his first lap of qualifying Johnson broke Johnny White's record of 17.00, by 17.54. In his second lap, he smashed his own record by qualifying at 17.51. White's record was set by a 484 Chevrolet.

In the feature event, in which Johnson finished second, he also broke the 8-lap record set in 1952. Gordy led the feature race but was forced to settle for second due to tire trouble, in the final laps.

Following the races, track officials were on the scene tearing down the engine in Johnson's car to make sure everything was legal and a new record could properly be credited to him. After hours of deliberation and consultation Gordy was acclaimed the new speed king, a title which he richly deserves.
