Showboat Tops

The 1964 Lowell Showboat, near collapse after last year's cold, rain threatened week, came back with renewed vigor Monday night with the stands half full, but with more paying customers than any recent year. It was an enthusiastic crowd, made up mainly of adults who enjoyed the sharp good humor of the endmen and the minor misques that always add zest to opening night. The chorus boomed out in their numbers and the endmen bounced through their songs with old time zip. The pre-show performance of the Aquanauts Ski Club and TV personality Buck Barry made a big hit with the kids. Buck's rope twirling, snake charming and trick shooting, followed the fast moving antics of the precision skiers. The Showboat queen, Carol Lynn Hillman and her princesses Gerre Briggs and Jean Tower were announced by John Roth and the 3rd annual show was in full swing. "South Rampart Street Parade" was vividly sung by endman Dick McNeal. Other endman presentations were William Reynolds "You'll Never Walk Alone; Ron Weeks, "Georgia on My Mind;" Loren Wohlford, "Cotton Fields Back Home;" Chuck Hoffman, "Saints Go Marching In;" and Ron Holst "It's Got to be Somebody Else, Not Me." The Fuller Brothers, a unique singing group, aging from 10 to 16-years-old delighted the audience with clever songs, both popular and funny. The request of encores by the audience brought the boys back on stage dressed like the Beatles. Wild screams filled the crowd as they appeared in wigs and performed with a professional air. Lavish garments were worn by the dogs in the Tibor Alexander Wonder Dog act. They delighted the audience with their clever tricks and dancing. Acrobatic stunts that made one hold his breath were attempted and made by the Fredonias. The group, three men and two girls, are fast moving and precise in their actions. The Lenore Sutton Dance line of six girls made two appearances in the show. Their first appearance was a routine of acrobatic maneuvers and the second was a dancing routine with the endmen. Yonely, a master of comedy, music and pantomime was a show stopper in the fact that he held the attention of the audience with his clever ability to play miniature instruments. Thursday night the Showboat will host visiting queens from Mich. State officials will be the guests on Friday night, and Congressman Gerald Ford will be the honored guest Saturday. The decorations committee headed by Harold Ball did a superb job this year in decorating the Robert E. Lee. The color scheme and design surpass any other year.

Jack Batey, 26 killed in crash

Dead in a 3:35 a. m. Sunday accident on M-21 at the intersection of White's Bridge Road, a mile east of the Ionia-Kent County line, was Jack Donald Batey, 26, of Route 3, Lowell, whose chest was crushed as he was thrown against the steering wheel of his car.

Funeral services for Batey were held at the Roth Funeral home on Tuesday at 2 p. m. with the Rev. Keith McIver officiating. Interment was made in Oakwood Cemetery.

The accident occurred as Batey was driving south on White's Bridge Road when he came upon M-21 where the gravel road came to an end. The car skidded an estimated 222 feet along the gravel and across the two-lane pavement before it squarely hit a huge tree on the south shoulder of M-21.

Milton Wilcox Sr., who lives at the northeast corner of the intersection told Ionia deputy that his family was awakened shortly before 4 a. m. by speeding cars along M-21. His son, Milton Jr., visiting here from Ft. Meyer, Florida, said two cars were racing along M-21 "sounding like a couple of jets." The awakened family said they heard the cars turn off M-21 later and speed northward. Deep skid marks in the gravel near the pavement indicated the cars turned the corner at high speeds. The second car, Deputy Newton said, was driven by a friend of Batey and contained Batey's brother and his wife. That car, Newton said, stopped a mile north of the intersection where the occupants were to have coffee.

Batey apparently turned around after the two cars drove north on the gravel road, and was returning south when the accident occurred. Milton Wilcox said the crash sounded like an explosion. He called officers after he found the wrecked car against the large tree trunk. Surviving are his wife, Doris; son, Jack; daughters, Linda and Norma, all at home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Batey of Lowell; brothers, Lloyd Jr., and Gordon, both of Lowell; sisters, Mrs. James Wheat and Mrs. Walter Loving, both of Lowell and Mrs. Edward Brimmer of Belding; and his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Sisson of Fennville.

The dictionary defines the word "sandbagger" as a person who puts sand in a bag, but to those involved in the racing world it means a person posing footy it during time trials and lead footing it while in competition.

With most tracks in this area enforcing the 1/4 or full second ruling (a car must qualify, and cannot be clocked running a 1/4 or full second over that time, or he is disqualified from the race) its pretty hard for a driver to get away with it.

Recently at the Grand Rapids Speedrome a 1960 Chevrolet has been turning in qualifying laps anywhere from 30.00 to 34.00, and manages to grab the win in the 1st or slow heat. Thursday night after qualifying, he was clocked during a race at 26.95, moving through traffic. This is a good example of sandbagging. Undoubtedly he can't win any other way.

It seems a shame that when cars and drivers have so much potential, they have to stoop so low to be in the winner's circle. They're not only cheating themselves out of the thrill of winning fair and square, but it causes squabbles between the drivers and is a bad influence upon themselves as far as the crowd is concerned.

Why should a driver put a lot of money in his car, build a powerful engine, and not use it to the fullest extent?

Like I've said many times before racing is a touchy subject, but unless it is run on a uniform basis, the rules enforced, the races conducted honestly and the drivers reimbursed fairly, the sport will diminish.

Wrestlers invade Showboat Stadium on August 1, in aqua battle royal

The Lowell Showboat Site on the Flat River will be the scene of a big time wrestling show on Saturday, August 1, it was announced this week by Ray Langin, veteran mat promoter.

The river site will make possible an aqua battle royal, the first time such a bout has been staged in the United States.

Eight wrestlers will enter the ring at once in the battle royal and battle it out until only one remains in the ring. To be eliminated, the wrestlers will have to be thrown out of the ring and into the river.

Permission for the bout was given by Athletic Board commissioner Frank Cavanaugh who gave his approval with the condition that skin divers stand by to assist any wrestlers who might have trouble and to prevent any fighting in the water.

In addition to the battle royal, five big preliminary bouts will be staged, including a girls match which will see Mary Jane Mull against Lucille Dupree. Both girls rank with the

best of the country's girl wrestlers. The Masked Student will lead the parade of stars who will be seen on the card. The Student will face The Great Mephisto, to renew a feud which started on a Grand Rapids television station a few weeks ago and will see the matter settled here on the river in a setting foreign to both wrestlers. Dick Garza, probably the most outstanding of all the television stars, will meet 365 pound "Man Mountain" Cannon in a match which could steal the spotlight from the entire card. In other bouts, Tim Hampton will go against Johnny Kace and Gary Hart will face Billy Goetz. Both Kace and Goetz have headlined bouts in Chicago's International Amphitheatre. All eight of the male stars on the card will return to the ring to take part in the Battle Royal.

Council asks for favorable vote on water, sewer bond issue, Aug. 4

At the council meeting Monday night the five members voted to ask the citizens for a favorable vote on the \$267,000 bond issue August 4.

The council has studied the question for sometime and feel that now is the time to take advantage of federal funds, to assist with the project.

Citizens will be called on to vote for or against the issues; the first will be for \$50,000 to finance improvements to the water system; some work has already been accomplished. The second ballot will be to borrow \$217,000 to construct a new sewer treatment plant near the junctions of the Flat and Grand Rivers.

While these will be general obligation bonds, the council has indicated that this will not be spread on the tax rolls but will come from the revenues of the water and sewer department.

Council Resolution
The Lowell City Council in urging the citizens of the city to vote "Yes" on both issues on Tuesday, August 4, offers the following five reasons:

1. Need to protect public health and water resources from contamination and/or pollution by providing adequate sewage treatment facilities.
2. Need to expand supply and improve quality of city water.
3. Loss of Federal grant of \$93,000 toward the cost of sewage treatment facilities if bond issue is not authorized NOW!
4. The Michigan State Health Department has indicated that legal recourse will be used to force construction of such sewage treatment facilities in any event. A "no" vote on this issue will merely postpone such construction for a short time. Meanwhile the State Health Department will not allow construction of additional sewers until treatment facilities are constructed. This could do much to deter prospective industry, or for that matter, any growth in the City of Lowell.
5. Authorization of a general obligation bond issue will result in a more favorable interest rate than will other financing alternatives. It is not proposed that bonds issued be redeemed by general taxation but by utility revenues just as they would be if financed by a revenue bond issue.

Lowell police chief Avery Block reported this week that police patrol activities were doubled last Friday night, and the results more than paid off in arrests for driving and drinking infractions of the law.

Two Saranac men, a Saranac girl and her companion from Whitmore Lake were picked up and ordered to pay fines in Justice Rittenger's court on Friday of \$350 and costs.

Vergil Loomsfoot, 23, driver of the car stopped on West Main Street at 1:25 a. m. on Saturday was sent to the Kent County jail for 30 days for driving with a revoked operators permit.

He was fined \$100 and costs for this offense. He was also fined \$50 and costs on counts of driving under the influence and contributing to the delinquency of minors.

Emer E. Batchelor, 23, was fined \$50 and costs for contributing and the two girls, Roberta J. Batchelor, 20, and Marie E. Warner, 20, were each fined \$50 and costs for minors in possession.

Loomsfoot will spend 60 additional days in jail if he fails to pay his fines.


