What Dr. Szwejda would like to know is whether or not the combination of 'luoridated water and topical applications of fluoride will reduce the amount of tooth decay still furtherenough to justify topical fluoridated areas.

Do children who have been fluoride programs in areas served by fluoridated water, the Michigan Department of Health announced that it was curtailsuch programs in fluoridated areas in order to concentrate services in areas where

> "In these studies, using a sodium fluoride solution, it was found that the application of fluoride directly on children's teeth provided little additional protection," Dr. Szwejda said, "However, a recent study using a stannous fluoride solution shows some promise of offering protection against tooth decay in addition to that provided by fluoridated water.'

> He said that the Jackson program would run for four years, starting with an examination of each child's teeth. Some of the children would receive a single application of a fluoride solution, while the others would have their teeth cleaned and reing the second and third years, all children will have their teeth cleaned and receive one application. The fourth year will be devoted to examination

The program is a supplement to a project started last year in Flint, a nonfluoridated area, to determine which of several fluoride solutions and application techniques is most effective in reducing tooth decay.

## Susan Doyle arrives home

No words in any language could express my deep gratitude to the people of Lowell for making my trip to Sweden possible. I only wish that all of the wonderful people who helped us could have the same opportunity. That doesn't mean being an average tourist. That means living with a family; learning their customs, their habits, and trying to be a part of a group of people which, surprisingly enough, isn't so very different from your own great family.

When I got off the train at Sodertalje, the Possnerts (my family) were waiting to meet me. From the very beginning I knew that things were going to be alright. They were so warm and friendly that I felt as one of the family right away.

One of my most meaningful experiences made me feel even more like one of the family. We went to Sundbyholm to visit Grandfather Possnert, and he gave me the Possnert pin: a Viking ship with "Sundbyholm' printed on the bottom. It was little thing, but all the little things made me feel closer to the family and to the Swedish way of life.

Every Swede is entitled to at least four weeks vacation a year. We spent almost all of July on Oland, a small island off the Swedish coast. It was extremely crowded, and it was closed to tourists about the middle of July. We camped out on a farm, and we had most of the place to ourselves. Anette and I slept in a tent, because my parents couldn't stand it when I talked in my sleep.

The weather on Oland was different from the rest of Sweden. It hardly ever rained, and it was about 75 to 80 degrees every day. The Baltic Sea, contrary to popular belief, was quite warm and even though I can't swim. I was in the water quite often (mainly because, if I didn't get in the water, I couldn't take a bath). While we were on Oland, Anette (my sister) and I got our flight instructions. We were to leave Stockholm on the eleventh. This didn't give us very much time to nd our home was a madhouse after we returned from

Oland on the second. Even though we were almost crazy from rushing around, we found time to go to church just before we left. The established church in Sweden is the Lutheran Church. Because there is an established church, the people don't like to go to church, so we didn't go very often. The mass was quite similar to a Catholic mass, but I couldn't understand any of it, because it was all in Swedish. It was quite interesting though. The cathedral in Strangnas, my town was built around 1290, and had a fascinating history.

Our trip home was full of excitement. It was the first time we could talk about our trip to someone who really understood: another American exchange student. We left Stockholm by train, talked until late at night, and arrived in Copenhagen in the morning. We went to breakfast, and then to our hotel. Most of the Americans were sticking together, talking like mad. We then went to the zoo. and in the afternoon we had time to talk (we hadn't really stopped) and to do some shopping. I came into Copenhagen with nine ore (approximately two cents), so I watched the other girls spend money. In the evening we went to Tivoli Gardens, the largest amusement park in Northern Europe, It was very beautiful, and, needless to say, we had a wonderful time.

The next day we arrived at the airport at 1:30, but our plane didn't take off until 6:30 (naturally!). We were all tired but we didn't realize how much until we got to Shannon and had a seven hour delay. Most of us slept on the floor, but those crazy Swedes danced all around the airport singing Swedish folk songs. By the time we got to Gander everyone was dead but, has more people eager to learn as we flew on, the sight of Dehow to drive. It issued 499,783 troit revived us. We were home at last! We had all spent two of the most memorable months of our entire lives, and as we looked back on our experiences, we began to philosophize. We knew that this trip would remain in our hearts as long as rates anywhere. Peter Speerwe lived, but, in the meantime, it's always good to be home.

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



#### Hospital patients may be watched by electronic aide

Hospital patients of the fu-ture may have "round-the-clock," electronic nurses watching over them.

Dr. Ernest Reynolds, jr., of the University of Michigan Med-ical Center, predicts that continuous monitoring of a patient's temperature, blood pressure, heart beat and pulse rate is "a coming thing" in medicine.

Under the direction of Dr. Reynolds, U-M doctors have run continuous electrocardiograms and heart beat recordings of about 30 inpatients for periods as long as one week

Electrodes, which look like small adhesive bandages, are fastened to the patient's chest. They pick up the heart's electrical signal. It flows through thin wires to an intricate machine. resembling a large tape recorder, which is set up at the pa-tient's bedside. The machine electronically computes and records the heart action on paper for the doctor to study.

By studying recordings of the patient's condition over a long period of time, doctors hope to find significant clues which might not be evident in a brief test or examination, Dr. Rey-

The U-M has two electronic monitors currently in use. A third machine at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Ann Arbor has provided the physicians with continuous recordings from an additional 20 cardiac patients.

Continuous monitoring is particularly useful to the physician who is trying to make a diagnosis or determine the effectiveness of a particular drug or treatment plan, Dr. Reynolds

The freedom of the artist in our society has increased and this has complicated his responsibility, says Robert Iglehart, chairman of The University of Michigan department of

Two Herculean tasks face the secondary schools of America "During the Renaissance, artists complained about the today, says Norman C. Harris, whims of patronage but by the end of the last century they had no patrons to complain about," says Iglehart. "First, vocational education -realistic job-centered educa-tion-must be expanded all over

"The kings, popes and great families were in reduced circumstances and the clear traditions-political, social and religious-v:ere weakened. In western nations an almost universal literacy joined with the camera to remove the need for literary illustration."

But the artists didn't disappear. "One of the rather annoy ing and embarrassing facts abo artists is that they will continue to produce art whether anyone wants it or not," Iglehart points out.

"Without patrons, artists had to set their own problems and find their own personal symbolisms. They were free to achieve quality. They were also free to be hungry and dispossessed in whatever picturesque ways they chose.
"In the past, the artist's

patrons set the terms for him. In our time he has succeeded in enlisting the support of individuals and institutions who will buy his work on his own terms. "But although this support has become steady and generous, it does not fulfill the traditional

class patronage The artists will continue to set his own problems, determine his own traditions,


