Jury trials find two guilty here

At a jury trial in Howard J. Rittenger's Justice Court last Wednesday afternoon Sam Harris, Bailey Drive, Ada, was found guilty of driving under the influence of liquor. The offense occurred on March 23, 1964. Harris was arrested by Lowell Police.

In the trial the City was represented by Donald Oosterhouse; the defense attorney was Clem Block. The jury consisted of Lylia Johnson, Maude Adriance, Phyllis Jones, Leonard Andrews, Norman Borgerson, and Robert

After a half hour deliberation, the jury brought in the verdict. Harris was sentenced on Tuesday by Justice Rittenger to a \$100 fine, \$24.30 costs and 10 days in jail. Block, Harris' attorney, revealed he will appeal the case to the Circuit Court.

Ban hitchhiking on freeways

The State Police have called attention to two new Michigan laws effective Friday, August 28, which specifically prohibit pedestrian traffic, including hitchhiking on all limited access highways and drag racing by

motor vehicles on any highway. The one involving pedestrians also bans bicycles and other nonmotorized traffic on the limited access highways. This is an extension or amendment of a previous law which affected freeways only in these respects. The freeways are the controlled access highways.

The pedestrian ban is designed to increase safety factors for travelers on the high speed roads. It is pointed out that the stopping of vehicles to pick up or let hitchhikers off creates a

hazard for other traffic. Hitchhiking on the freeways, a practice followed by some college students and other persons going to and from their homes particularly on weekends and vacation periods, has added to the enforcement problem of police patrols in having to remove pedestrians from these roads. Pedestrian trespassers can now be also arrested on the limited access roads as well

as the freeways, The drag racing ban specifically strengthens law enforcement's hand in dealing with drivers who have staged impromptu or planned racing contests on the streets and highways. These contests have endangered participants and, in some cases, resulted in death or injury to them as well as having caused accidents for other highway

Michigan leads in control of water pollution

Within six miles of where you are-anywhere in Michiganchances are you can find a lake or stream, clear and clean, which sparkles with the promise that it will shine forever.

And so it may, for Michigan leads the nation in the control of water Pollution. Many agencies and organizations are re-sponsible for this remarkable record, but among the more unsung and unseen heroes of the pollution ware are the State Department of Health and the Michigan Water Pollution Control Association.

These two-one a state agen-cy, the other an independent organization-h a v e spearheaded the quarter-century battle to require performance ratings and state certification for the operators of sewage treatment plants. It has been an uphill struggle, which really began in the 1930's, culminating in 1953 legislation setting forth training and educational requirements for wastewater treatment plant

"It was a logical step," said Donald M. Pierce sanitation engineer for the Department of Health and a member of the board of directors of the MW-PCA. "This is where pollution control begins. But it took us a few years to convince the peoof the state that, having spent billions of dollars on wastewater treatment equipment, they should not settle for less than the best in operating personnel to get the most out of these expensive facilities,

"There was resistance," he said, "Some local communities felt the state was poking its nose into things which did not concern it; others had favorite sons-local boys, of course-they wanted to hire, regardless of qualifications; still others were convinced that pollution was imaginary in the first place and if they didn't talk about it it would go away.

But the mandatory certification program now has been accepted by treatment plant operators and employers alike, and it has paid tremendous dividends

The Michigan law gives the Department of Health the authority to classify sewage treatment plants according to size, location, etc., and also according to the skill, knowledge and experience necessary to operate them. The Department also makes the rules regulating this classification, as well as the examinations given for certification.

"Thus," Mr. Pierce said, "we now have operators classified as A, B and C, and established educational requirements for each group. But if we are to set such standards of performance, we must develop an educational program easily available to anyone interested. Actually it developed in reverse. We were offering training programs back in 1934, long before certification was required by statute."

Instruction is provided by Department of Health experts at regional meetings throughout the year and by on-the-job instruction during regular or special visits to the treatment plants. Association to which most of the operators now belong, also sponsors technical meetings as part of its contribution to the scheme. The state Department of Public Instruction offers extension courses in such subjects as mathematics and chemistry, as they are applied to the busi-

The program lends itself well to the development of incentives and pride of profession on the part of the operator, and improved performance of treatment plants resulting from the program provides self-winding public relations.

"The real test has been the voluntary subscription of our program by private industry which does is not bound by the certification law," Mr. Pierce said. "These people recognize that conservation is no longer a distant concern of the rural areas, but a problem facing every person and every community in the state.

"Water pollution control is everybody's business, and is accepted as such by the people of Michigan," he said "Otherwise the state could not be the tops in the nation in water pollution control, regardless of how effective a program is offered."

With a high traffic volume expected in Michigan over the Labor Day weekend, the summer's last major holiday, the State Police will operate special patrols from noon Friday, September 4, to midnight Monday, September 7 in an effort hold down accidents, Commissioner Joseph A. Childs re-

During the 78-hour holiday in 1963 six multiple death accidents killed 18 persons, more than half the weekend's toll of 35 which was the highest for a Labor Day period since 1949, when 38 died

Childs emphasized that chances for multiple death accidents are greatly increased during holidays because motoring trips are generally family af-fairs and there are many more

cars on the roads. "However, high holiday tolls are not inevitable," Childs said. "Michigan records show there were only 12 deaths for the Labor Day period in 1958 and 13 the year before. Drivers can assure themselves a safer holiday trip by driving courteously reasonably at all times. Bring the family back alive." The State Police special pa-

trol schedule will be in effect from noon Friday to midnight Monday of the holiday period with maximum coverage scheduled from 3 to at least 9 p. m. each day. Pass days are cancelled

The State Police will be assisted by 113 members of the Michigan National Guard Friday, Saturday and Monday, serving as second men on two-man patrols or on point controls.






