New statute big aid to consumer

In the past, several non-food products bought every day by citizens did not show a declaration of net contents on the container because the law did not require it. But this will all be changed on August 28, when the new state weights and measures law goes into effect.

After that date net quantity content must be shown in terms of weight, measure, or numerical count. Furthermore, such information must be so it can be easily read. In the language of the statute, such data must be "definite plain legible, and conspicuous.

Formerly, some manufactures of paint, varnish, anti-freeze, oil, soaps, detergents, house hold cleaners, and a whole host of other products where not required to have a declaration quantity contents did not do Most manufacturers did, but some didn't. The theory was that the size of the container spoke for itself, but if the container was not well filled, no violation was involved because no quantity was stated.

The new law will do away with containers of any product being short of the quantity contents the buyer assumed was present just because the package looked like a quart, etc. Now the container must be labeled as to its contents. Enforcement of weights and measures laws is the responsibility of the Foods and Standards Division of the Michigan Department of Agriculture of which J. L. Littlefield is chief.

In the opinion of Agricultural Director G. S. McIntyre, adoption by the legislature of the new law is a vast step in consumer protection and will work to the advantage of the industry because the chiseler must meet requirements that the honest member has complied with on a voluntary basis for years.






