Bus transportation has be-come big business to the field of education. Last Tuesday, when the Lowell Area Schools started its new year of 1964-65, nineteen regular bus runs had been established and approximately twelve hundred boys and girls rode to school from the rural areas. Three new sixtyfour passenger buses have been added to the bus fleet and another bus is expected to be delivered during this month.

This will make a total bus fleet of twenty-three buses available for regular or special runs and stand-by use.

Safety becomes an important factor in the transportation system. During the summer months, Joe Green the full time bus mechanic, has been servicing the bus fleet.

Such work as brake and clutch repairs, grease and oil changing and tire realinement takes up the majority of his time. The local garages also are used where special repairs are nec-

Bus drivers too are important in the safety program. Before school each year a two day, eight hour school is held in Kent County for beginning bus drivers. Four of the local school drivers attended the school, held this year at North Oakview Elementary School in Grand Rap-

During the school year, four other class periods of three hours each are held and is a requirement for our bus drivers. On March 10, the area drivers will meet at the Lowell Senior High School, Also during the school year local meetings are held with Roger Buck bus supervisor, in charge. One such meeting was held before school started this fall.
