Frosts which occurred before September 14 did not damage corn on the Homer Addis farm in Oakfield twp. where extra nitrogen fertilizer had been applied. Frost damage was severe on a nearby corn field at the same elevation where only 200 pounds of 5-20-50 fertilizer was used. Homer believes the more vigorous growth from the high nitrogen applied made the difference. There was more moisture in this corn and probably more heat given off by transpiration which may have affected the difference.

This loss called evapotranspiration is the net amount of rainfall, plus or minus changes in soil moisture, minus surface runoff and percolation. Water storage capacity varies with different soil types. Soils which have hard pans or compacted layer limit root penetration and less moisture can

Plow planting or minimum tillage, plow down of barnyard and green manure crops, adequate balanced fertilizers and drainage systems make for more available moisture. There is less runoff, better percolation and generally more water storage capacity.

District cooperators report June clover yields up to four bushels per acre. However, the drought conditions and high temperatures caused much of the crop to be undersized. Current prices are low. Bumble bees,

blackberry, birch and clover. Fall planting of pine and spruce seedlings are generally not as successful as early spring planting for our area.
