Lowell School Board studies needs for additional class room space

Heavy class loads in the 4th, 5th and 6th grades of Lowell Area Schools caused much concern among the members of the school board at their meeting on Monday night.

The 4th grade with 3 classes of 37, the 5th with classes of 35 and the 6th with classes of 37 are a heavy load, the board agreed. Superintendent Nisbet revealed his efforts to obtain additional teachers and the question of where to find room for an additional class.

The only solution was to move the half day class of kindergarten to the Methodist Church to obtain a room; but there is no qualified teacher available.

All this brought the subject of additional elementary class rooms needed in 1965 and where the best location would be. Discussion centered around keeping the elementary grades in its present area or establishing a new elementary school on the west side of the city.

Board President Ty Wessell appointed a study committee for future plans of Dave Coons and Dr. Donald Gerard with the

president and superintendent to bring a report to an early meeting of the board.

Gas and Oil Bids
Standard Oil Company was the low bidder for fuel oil and motor oil for the schools. They bid 11.2c per gal. for fuel oil in Lowell and in transport dump price in Alto 10.85c; motor oil was 62c gal. C. H. Runciman Co. was low bidder for bus gas with a price of 12.29c per gal.

Plans for Park
The school board discussed plans for making improvements in Recreation Park as soon as the title is transferred from the city to the school district. Money has already been appropriated for a chain-link fence between the track and football field and the baseball field.

Improvements are planned for the baseball diamond and resurfacing the tennis courts is under consideration.

Superintendent Nisbet reported that two old school buses were sold to high bidder George Hammel for \$235.00. The board authorized the disposal of an old carry-all not being used.

Charles Barber dies Thursday

Charles H. Barber, 40, a courageous young man who in spite of being afflicted with crippling arthritis, operated his own watch repair shop in Lowell, died of pneumonia in Butterworth Hospital on Thursday morning, September 17.

Barber was much respected by his fellowtownsmen. Many individuals would have given up trying to make a living and raise a family. Years of suffering had not changed his fine sense of humor and healthy outlook on life.

He is survived by his wife, Alice; two daughters, Mary Kay and Susan; one son, Gary, all at home; his father, Raymond Rexford of Lowell; one brother, Raymond, of Grand Rapids; and several nieces and nephews.

Services were held at Roth's Funeral Home on Saturday with the Rev. Norman Woon officiating. Interment was made in Oakwood Cemetery.

Rotary Club offers help to Showboat

In a unanimously adopted resolution last Wednesday, the Lowell Rotary Club offered its cooperation with any other group to insure the continuation of the Showboat in Lowell.

Norm Borgerson and Elmer Schaefer spark-plugged the club's action to do all it could to keep Showboat alive. Elmer Schaefer and the President of the Root-Lowell Corporation pledged full cooperation of their company to continue Showboat.

Schaefer told the club: "That the Chesaning Showboat grows bigger and more profitable every year, and is ample proof that the 'idea' is very much alive, but that Lowell must look to themselves for the answers."

He stated that Lowell as a City is thriving and that new organizations need to be brought into action to again make Lowell's Showboat grow and thrive. He named the Rotary Club, Lions Club, Junior Chamber of Commerce, Y. M. C. A. and Veterans of Foreign Wars, all of which started after the Showboat was organized.

Schaefer also stated that the single greatest handicap in the management of Showboat is its failure to operate on a budget with complete financial operation in the hands of a manager.

Borgerson told the club that Showboat is worth thousands of dollars to the community every year. He said, "Many towns spend money to put on annual special events, Lowell Showboat has earned money most years."

Rout Ionia 40-7

Arrows meet Belding

Lowell's Red Arrow Football team is full of confidence this week, after a 40-7 win over Ionia last Friday night to take over possession of the VFW trophy, which Ionia had won the past two years.

The Arrows will open their conference schedule on their home field Friday night against Belding at 7:30. Belding down for the past several years, appears to have a much improved team under their new coach. They tied a strong Stanton team last week, 7-7.

Coach Charles Pierce revealed this week that his team came out of the Ionia game with no injuries and, is getting a good work out all week on pass defense.

New members of the varsity under their aggressive play, pleased the coaching staff; Tony Myers, Gary Kropf and John Briggs showed up especially well. Linebacker Chris VanDyke played a tough "stop-them-in-their-tracks" type of defensive that reminded many of the tough play a few years ago of Frank McMahon.

Offensively McMahon and Kropf exceeded all pre-season hopes with shifty running and hard driving line gains. As many sports writers have expressed it: "McMahon shifts gears

when he gets around the end and really goes." Russ Videan proved to be the finest blocking halfback Lowell fans have seen in years. He cut down charging linemen to give the two backs the opening they needed for long gains.

McMahon and Kropf carried the ball on all the running plays in the first 3 quarters of the game except twice; McMahon, 15 times for 147 yards and Kropf 16 times for 49 yards. Total yards gained rushing by the Arrows was 295.

Passing was limited because of the rain. Elzinga passed 8 times with 3 completions; Baker passed twice for one completion.

Scoring in Game
Lowell kicked off to Ionia, who went down the field on a series of good ground gaining plays to the Lowell 25, where they had to give the ball up. Lowell started a 75-yd. march with gains by McMahon and Kropf to the Ionia 18. Elzinga passed to McViver for 8 and then into the endzone for the touchdown, pass for point failed.

Early in the 2nd quarter McMahon scored his first TD with an 11-yd. run; try for the point failed. McMahon scored his 2nd TD on a 45-yd. jaunt down the field with fine blocking; Kropf

drove over for the point. The final touchdown for this half came after McViver hit Ionia's quarterback, John Briggs and Lowell's tackle John Briggs picked the ball out of the air and ran 35 yards to score; Kropf plunged for the point. The score at half-time was Lowell 26, Ionia 0.

Opening the 2nd half Ionia stopped Lowell on a 4th down and short yardage on their own 49 and on their first play Ionia's Perry Gregory slipped through the Lowell defenses and went 49-yards to score; Mowatt tossed to Stedman for the extra point.

McMahon scored his 3rd TD of the game after Finkler recovered an Ionia fumble on their 43. McMahon took a 24-yd. left end pichout to go over; Elzinga passed to McViver for the point.

Both teams used their reserves extensively in the final quarter; Pat Hoag 128-lb. halfback, and Dan Finkler moved the ball well. Finkler scored the final tally of the game with a 55-yd. run, reversing his field; Baker passed to Malcolm for the extra point.

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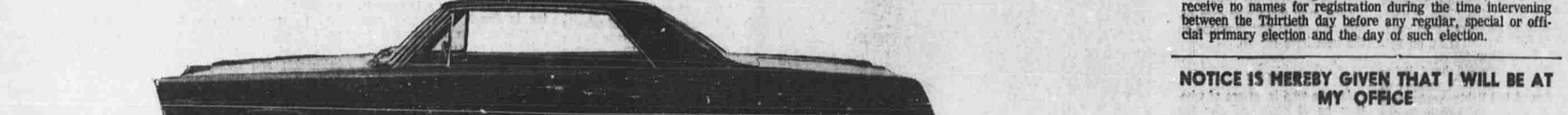

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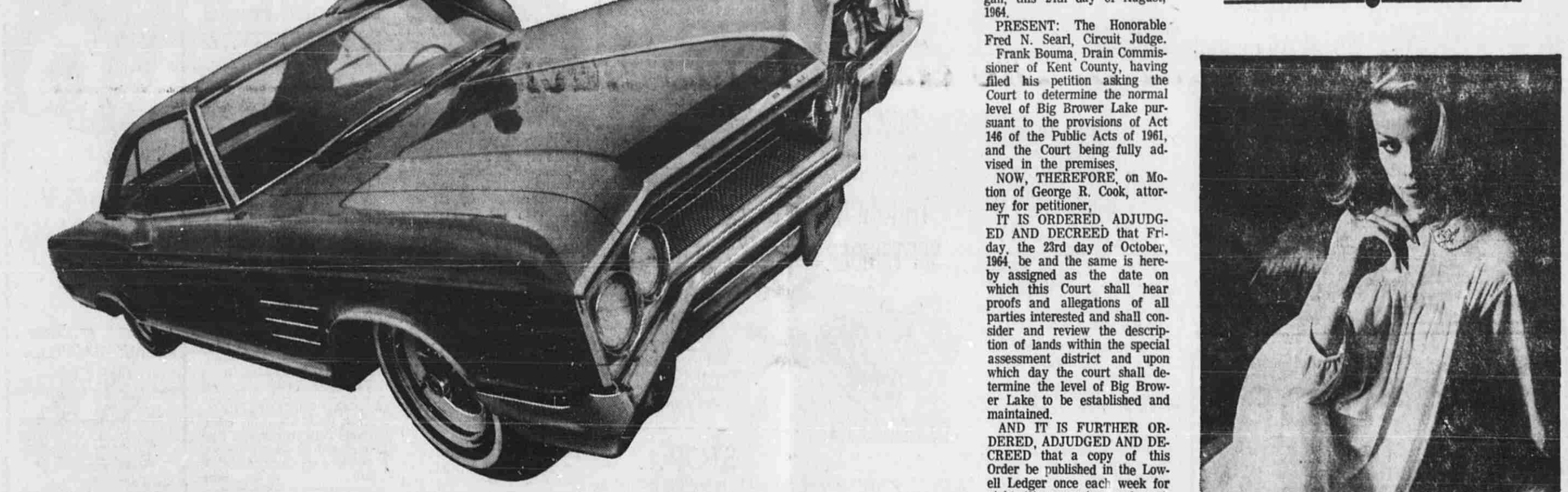

Written reports will be presented to individual council members at the next regular meeting. Considerable discussion resulted in the consensus that the lease with C. H. Runeman Co. should be extended and that the manager initiate plans for construction of a new well on the newly acquired property (See MOTIONS).

Mayor Wittenbach stated that the purpose of the special meeting was to receive a report on aquifer tests by water consultant Edward M. Burt, and to act thereon. He then turned the meeting over to Mr. Burt for his report.

Rough drafts of the report were distributed and explained in detail. Mr. Burt pointed out that indications were generally favorable but the possibility of salt water contamination, though reduced, could not be eliminated. He added, however, that this would be true of any location in Lowell. It was further pointed out that even should such contamination occur it would not be evident for several years and could be coped with in various ways. The report recommended construction of two permanent type 350 gallon per minute wells on the recently acquired Gratz property.

After considerable discussion it was the consensus that construction should be staged whereby one well is to be constructed immediately and the other deferred.

IT WAS THEREUPON MOVED by Councilman Schneider, supported by Councilman Schlerntzauer, that the city manager be authorized to receive bids on the construction of a new 12" x 8" well and the furnishing and installation of a 350 gallon per minute pump together with all necessary appurtenances and alternate bids on construction of a pump house all pursuant to plans and specifications as prepared by Williams & Works Engineering and approved by the Michigan State Health Department, until 4 p. m. Monday, September 28, 1964, at which time said bids are to be publicly opened in the office of the city manager and tabulated for action by the City Council at a special meeting.

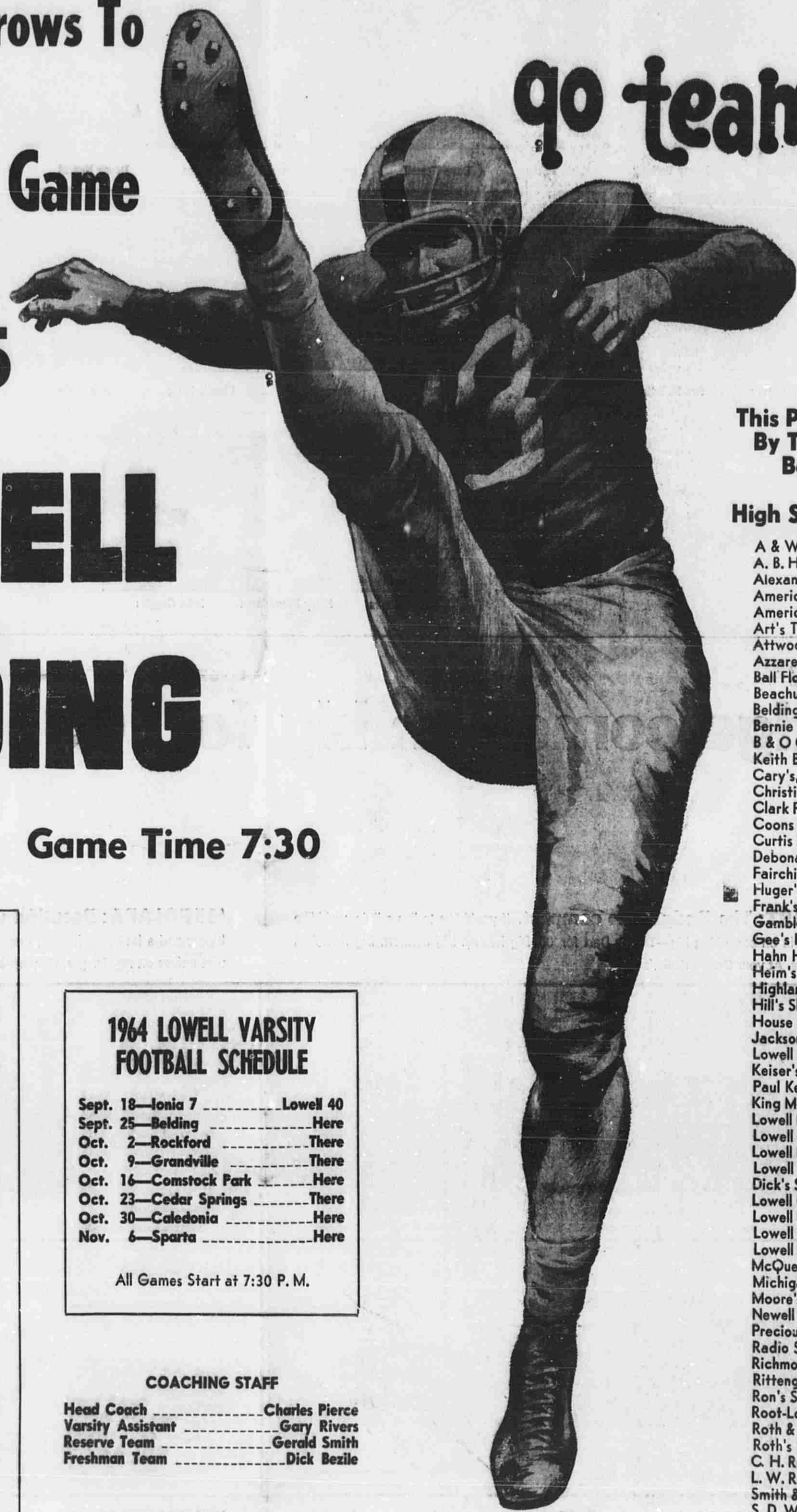

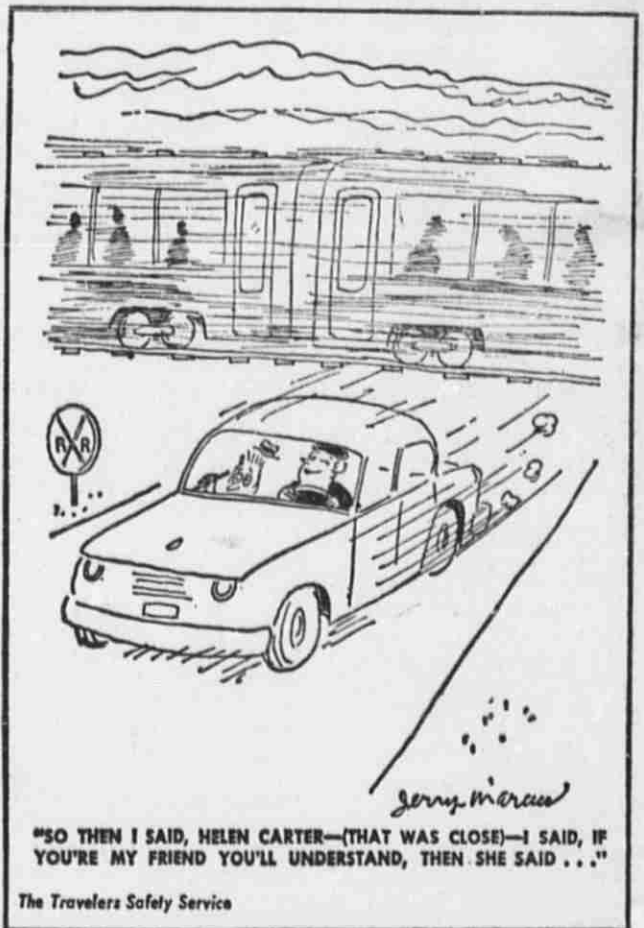

Interest in hunting and in other outdoor recreation has increased noticeably over last year. One gun outfitting company in this area told us their sales and services are double that of 1963. 4-H gun clubs have done much to emphasize gun safety. Jim Squires' Courtland group made a good showing this year.

Development has also increased in fish and wildlife ponds in the District.

More conservation plans have been made with landowners, who may have a few acres to 80 acres or more.

District Director Kenneth Anderson and township supervisor Richard Lynch have done much to encourage improved land use in Ada Township.

Keats Vining and others helped to start much of the reforested acres we now find in the township. These plantings now cover land that was cleared and farmed for a period of years. Erosion has been controlled, the landscape is more pleasing to the eye and property values have increased.

Your district directors have been informed that wildlife planting stock will be available next spring. We will inform you later when further information has been received.

Frosts which occurred before September 14 did not damage corn on the Homer Addis farm in Oakfield twp. where extra nitrogen fertilizer had been applied. Frost damage was severe on a nearby corn field at the same elevation where only 200 pounds of 5-20-50 fertilizer was used. Homer believes the more vigorous growth from the high nitrogen applied made the difference. There was more moisture in this corn and probably more heat given off by transpiration which may have affected the difference.
