## Citizens protest water extension

At a hearing to obtain the feelings of citizens residing on East Main Street, beyond Jackson Street on extending the water main, the count was ten to 1 against the project.

The hearing brought out 11 citizens who are residents of the area. Only Clifford Kohlbeck, operator of A&W Drive-in, who requested the water extension, favored the project. He owns 700 feet, out of a total of the 3,000 feet of frontage to be served.

Several of the citizens present have already installed their own private water mains and are using city water. The council adjourned the hearing until a later date.

**Ask River Improvements**  
City Manager Bernard Olson reported on a meeting of cities

along Grand River which he attended last week in Lansing. The group are attempting to form a Grand River Improvement Authority to rehabilitate the river along its entire length.

Stopping the pollution of the river and beautifying the river banks for a recreation area are among the goals of the organization.

Also discussed at the council meeting was the many complaints, by citizens, of inoperable cars on private property. The council is considering drawing up an ordinance that will prohibit this.

Elmer G. Schaefer was reappointed at the meeting on Monday night to the Kent County Board of Supervisors. He has served as one of the city members on the board since 1960.

## Slippery highway cause two wrecks

Four vehicles were involved in accidents north of Lowell early Monday morning on Lincoln Lake Avenue. Two were slightly injured in the accidents which were caused by the slippery condition of the roads.

The first accident occurred at 6:30 a. m. when Diane S. Wilcox, 18, 10986 Five Mile Rd., Ada, going south on Lincoln Lake Avenue came over the top of a hill near the intersection of McPherson Street.

A car driven by Ernest Strouse, 62, of Route 3, Belding was stopped in the highway to pick up another passenger; they were on their way to work at Amway in Ada.

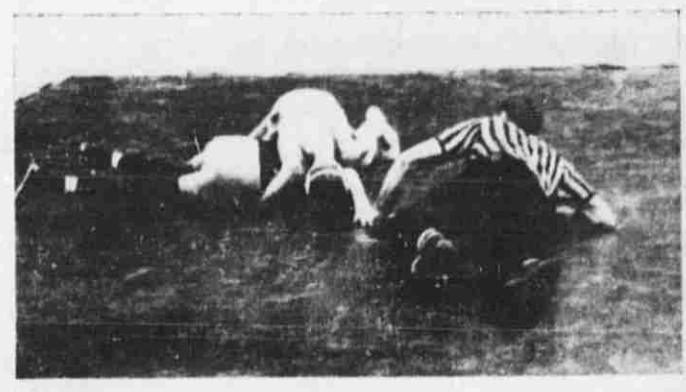
The Wilcox car coming over the hill was unable to stop before hitting the rear of the Strouse car. Deputy Larry Flynn and Deputy Larry Brownell, investigating officers reported.

The second accident occurred a half mile north of Bailey Dr. intersection of Lincoln Lake when the Kent County Police cruiser driven by Deputy Charles McArthur, 27, of Route 3, Belding, on his way to police the Wilcox-Strouse accident, hit the rear of a milk truck.

Deputy Robert Gane, who investigated the accident, reported that McArthur going north on Lincoln Lake came over the crest of a hill and hit the milk tank truck driven by Michael E. Serne, 19, of 110311 East Fulton Road, Ada.

Serne had parked the truck on the highway while assisting a motorist out of the ditch.

Mrs. Minnie Strouse, 55, a passenger in the first accident was taken to the hospital by ambulance where she was treated and released. McArthur suffered minor injuries.

Last Wednesday night at Belding coach Gary Rivers' grapplers won a real squeaker by a score of 26 to 24. This was one of the most exciting matches in the past 2 years. In the 95-lb. division (above) John Dawson, wrestling his first match, did a fine job by defeating R. Kuiper 9 to 2.

It reminded us of the Lowell, Cedar Springs meet of 2 years ago when Lowell pulled that one out by a score of 26 to 25.

At the end of 8 matches the score was tied 16 to 16. Then Tony Myers at 154-lbs. pinned Ross in 1:07 to give us a 21 to 16 lead. Then Steve Roth at 165-lbs. was leading McNally 4 to 1 when he was pinned at 2:23 making the score 21 to 21.

Denny Nugent at 180-lbs. pinned Fuller in 1:58 giving us the lead again 26 to 21.

In the final match of the meet, Chris VanDyke did a fine job with Jones who outweighed him by 65-lbs. Chris battled all the way and lost a decision by a 5 to 4 score, giving Belding 3 points and making the final score of the meet 26 to 24.

We believe that this is going to be typical of the wrestling meets this year with 2 other teams in the league being very strong.

Besides Lowell and Belding, Cedar Springs and Rockford look to be the other 2 contenders for the league championship.

The individual match results of the rest of the Lowell-Belding meet are as follows:

At 95-lbs. John Dawson, wrestling his first match, did a fine job by defeating R. Kuiper 9 to 2. In the 103-lb. class, Monty Toussaint was pinned by Jeffery in 5:33. Mike Ortowski, at 112-lbs., pinned Pierson in 2:58.

Pat Hoag at 120-lbs. pinned Stearns in 31 seconds. This was the fastest pin of the night. At 127-lbs. Gary Kropf, after a year's layoff due to sickness, was defeated by Luscombe 8 to 5. This was one of the real good matches of the meet. Gary was behind 6 to 5 with 15 seconds remaining and in going for a desperation take down, slipped and gave away 2 points.

At 133-lbs. Bruce Odell looked real good in defeating Dever 7 to 1. In the 138-lb. class Paul Goodwin, wrestling with a pulled side muscle, was pinned by A. Kuiper in 3:34. Then at 145-lbs. Paul Nauta lost a real close decision to Bird by a score of 4 to 2. Bird is a 4-year man and one of Belding's finest wrestlers, and Phil did a fine job here.

Last night (Wednesday) Lowell traveled to Rockford, but it was too late to get the results in this week's paper.

This Saturday night, at 7 p. m. Lowell has its first home meet with Wyoming Park. This promises to be a good non-league meet.

Then on Monday night, the grapplers travel to Godwin, and on Wednesday night, December 16, Comstock Park is here in a league meet. All meets start at 7 p. m. with the junior varsity wrestling at 6 p. m.

Wages vary for students at U-M

Student employed by The University of Michigan in residence hall, libraries, offices and laboratories receive wages ranging from \$1 per hour to \$4 per hour.

Approximately 2000 students work for the University. Of this group, 35 per cent are paid in a range from \$1 per hour and \$1.25 per hour, approximately 25 per cent are paid in a range from \$1.25 to \$1.75 per hour,

and approximately 37 per cent receive \$1.75 or more per hour.

These facts have been disclosed by W. K. Pierpont, vice-president for business and finance, in a communication to the Student Government Council.

In the food service units of the University, student workers begin at the \$1 minimum hourly rate, Pierpont said, and are increased five cents per hour after 50 hours of work and another five cents per hour after 100 hours of work. In September of this year, approximately 800 student workers began at

service units, the libraries, and in office work.

Salaries and wages of all the groups and classifications of individuals, including students, are reviewed in most instances in the spring of the year and wage and salary schedules are adopted on July 1 to be effective in operating budgets for the fiscal year beginning on July 1. Appropriate changes in salary and wage schedules including student hourly rates will be reflected in the budgetary period beginning July 1, 1965.

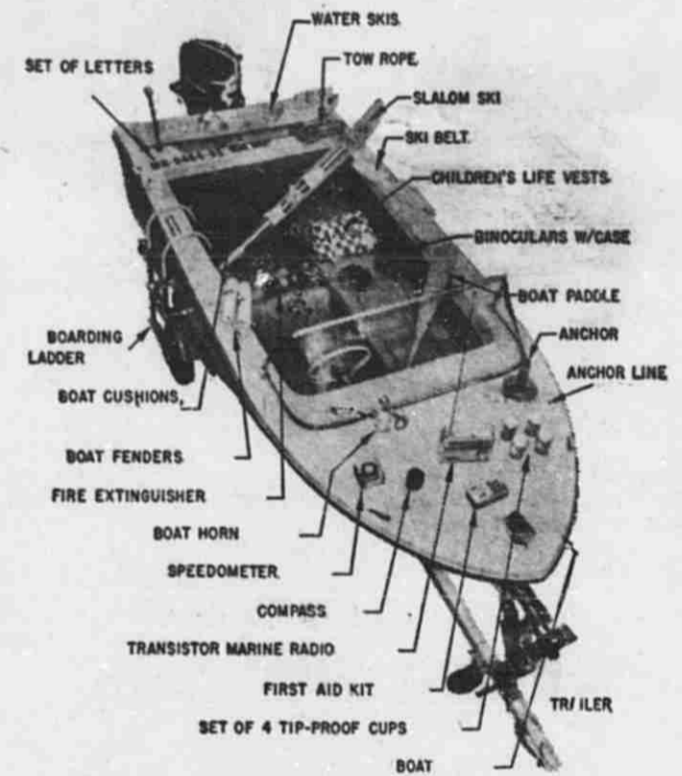
