Lowell Showboat's operation in 1965

Architect reports \$80,000 needed for Junior High

A school board meeting that their opinion that perhaps they did not adjourn until after mid- were too severe for first offendnight Monday brought a variety of matters to the attention of the board. Of vital interest to the community was the report by school architect, Donaling ly Palmer, who had completed a preliminary study of remodel-ing needed in the Junior High Buildin

The 50-year-old building which now houses 472 sixth through eighth graders plus some fifth graders needs many improvements to bring it up to standards set by the State Fore Marshall and the State Electrical Inspector

Palmer brought in estimates for upgrading the facilities to the state set standards and improving lights, floors, heating, ventilation and acoustics. These improvements include necessary changes required for the safety of the children, and are esti-

mated to cost about \$80,000. A final step to improve the educational facilities and modernize the building for today's teaching standards was roughly estimated to cost another \$100.-

This, Palmer said, would give the building an estimated life of 25 years. A new Junior High School building to house this same number of pupils is estimated to cost \$690,000 and would have a life of at least another 50 years.

Don Kelly, Athletic Director, revealed the financial condition of the athletic funds of the school and said that now that basketball was bringing in about the same gate as football, Kelly told the board that there

was a possible reorganization coming up of the Tri-River Conference. Comstock Park, he reported, was planning to drop out of the conference, A new spring sport was added to the school program by the

board when they approved golf. Several other schools in the conference have added this. Now that a golf course is close by in Vergennes Township and the school has been invited to make use of it, more youth of the community have an opportunity to compete. Estimated additional cost of this sport to the school is \$430.

Voorhees, who has booked the professional acts for the Showboat almost every year since the 1930's, and has helped with the direction of the show, is familiar with the operation. In his letter he offered to take over the show and pay Showboat Inc. 25 percent of the net with a guarantee of \$2,000 for the

use of the facilities Showboat Directors will be discussing the plans that Voorhees has for handling the show at an early meeting.

Michigan first in high schoo accreditation

The University of Michigan was the first institution of high er learning in the United States o accredit high schools, says Kent W. Leach, director of the U-M Bureau of School Servic-

"The Bureau has been responsible for the accrediting of both public and nonpublic high schools in the state since 1871." Leach points out.

"Society has evidenced a real concern about what high school programs are being offered to all boys and girls-those who plan to go on to college and those who desire to go immediately into the world and work." he says. "As a result, current accrediation standards relate to all phases of the high school such as curriculum, qualifications of staff, school plant, and guidance programs."

The University has assigned to its Bureau of School Services the supervision of the accredition program. The Bureau cooperates with an Accreditation Advisory Committee composed of three representatives of the University, and five members from the state principal' and superintendents' associations, officers of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. 


