Nearly sixty citizens were present at the meeting of the Planning Commission on Monday evening to hear a final report and a discussion of the highway in the central business ideas presented by city plan-ning consultant, Scott Bagby. The meeting marked the con-clusion of his planning study for

Orville Jackson, Chairman of the Planning Commission, wel-comed the large group of citi-zens and Dr. Orval McKay, a member of the commission, gave a brief explanation of the work and ideas of the planning study.

Mr. Bagby reviewed the ideas presented in the printed plan-ning study, which is available at the City Hall, He began by saying that the ideas presented in the study were only projections, which may be changed and varied as conditions warrant

Most important, Bagby revealed, is an overall picture of ideal conditions for the city growth and keep future planning and growth along those lines. Lowell, he stated, is projected to grow about 50 percent in the next 20 years.

#### New Ordinances

First in importance for planned growth is new subdivision building and land use ordinances. The present ordinances are not complete and fail to protect the residents of the city from the folly of unregulated growth, Bagby presented with his report outline, ordinances which will have to be studied and altered by the Planning Commission and the Council to fit the local conditions. This important task will be started immediately by the two government bodies.

Visions a Compact Community

A sprawling and spread out growth of the community should be kept in check, the planner stated. Lowell can only afford to offer sewer and water service to a concentrated area: beyond this insistence on larger lots will provide for residents

to furnish their own facilities. Cities who attempt to furnish facilities beyond their natural boundaries have to over-tax themselves and never complete all the necessary services to the central area.

A financing plan to complete the required capital expenditures to develop the necessary facilities was explained. In the next 20 years the city and school will need 11 mills combined to carry out the plans projected in the "Plan for Low-

#### Central Business District Most important, Bagby stated,

was keeping the central business district healthy and in the same general area that it now occupies. Growth outside this area will only take away value from the total community. Planned development in the central area will multiply the values instead of subtracting from

A great deal of discussion at the meeting centered around the proposed State Highway Depart-

ment's plans to move M-21 north of the city, two miles. In the plan Bagby proposed to hold M-21 in the city by dividing the

district into one-way streets. This, he explained, might induce the highway department to keep the highway in the city, if it is moved several miles north of town it will hurt the com-

The importance of I-96 as a route into Grand Rapids and to the east was emphasized, Lowell, the planner told his audience, needs an all-weather route to the freeway. This highway should be the main artery to carry traffic away from the ci-ty. With the abandoning of M-91 by the highway department it important to secure a direct route to the Nash Avenue inter-

#### Renovate River

change on I-96.

Property owners in the central business district, Bagby stated, should be prepared to pay up to 1 percent of their property values per year in special assessments to make the needed improvements to protect

their investment. Among the more detailed plans for the central business district was filling a portion of the Flat River for civic buildings, parking area and recreation area for the school, Estimates by the planner set the cost of the fill

This was coupled with another parking and shopping area in the present site of the King Milling Co. Forrest Mill and the feed mill in the rear. Beautification of the river and landscaping would attract both tourists and area citizens to this shopping center, Bagby reveal-

#### Reroute Traffic

The need to route traffic to and from the shopping area is of most importance for benefit to the business of the community. In the plan two new bridges over Flat River are projected and two main north and south strets. Hudson Street would carry all the through traffic on the west side of the town and Lafayette would be built through to Division St. to carry all the through traffic on the East side. Other streets would have street diverters to prevent through traffic disrupting a residential neighborhood. An industrial park is planned along the C & O Railroad right-of-way northwest of the high school. This would be a protected area for industry and be screened from the residential district by a park along

the boundary.
In conclusion, Bagby explained, the plan is only as good as the citizens of the community who work to develop it. From now on it's up to the taxpavers of the community to provide the funds to carry out the ideas

#### presented. Show Airport Film


