Go For Small Package

If the board limits itself to the vital, immediate needs and does not attempt to get voter approval for the ertire project one time, but chooses to go for each unit at a time, the result would be a more expensive repair and make-do program. This will require the voters of the district to approve a series of smaller bond issues, but it may be necessary to vote annually for the next four or five

In the discussions of the board the opinion has been voiced to to improve all the units as rapidly as possible, to bring the school system up-to-date. This would save the district money in the long run, by cutting down on repairs.

The board is forced to compromise the ideal with the possible and it is this decision that is very important to the taxpayers of the district.

How quickly can you spot the changes 11 years have brought to Michigan's automobile license plates? Most noticeable is the clarged slogan. The 1954 plate, above, held by Charmagne Kitzmann, Automobile Club of Michigan travel counselor, was the first to use "Water Wonderland." The legend on the 1965 plate reads "Water-Winter Wonderland." The new plate is shorter by 1½ inches—the present 6 by 12 size having been adopted in 1956 in a national move to make all state licenses miform. Did you get these other changes since 1954? letters and numerals have been reduced a half-inch; the dash-break between numerials is eliminated; Michigan is shortened to Mich., and the year to 65. The year's position also is moved toward the center. There is one similarity with 1954—the maize and blue colors. The 1954 plate is now a collector's item, but plenty of the 1965 variety are available. If you don't have yours yet, Auto Club suggests you act at once—the deadline is Feb. 8, but the last day of sale is Saturday, Feb. 27. A reminder -you don't need your title this year; just your registration.

With the completion of the organization of the Kent Reorganization Committee, that body is now ready to start the importtask of preparing a plan for school districts for the Kent Area, A county-wide vote on reorganization is scheduled for

This committee was elected and appointed according to the provisions of Public Act 289 of the 1964 Session of the Michigan Legislature.

Erwin J. Kleinert, Superintendent of the Kent Intermediate School District, is chairman; Victor Weller, President of the Kent School District Board, is vice-chairman; and Mrs. Fred Keeler, member of the Kent Board and also the Grand Rapids Board, is secretary. Other members of the committee are:

Buth asks points for juvenile drivers, too

State Representative Martin D. Buth, R-Comstock Park, has introduced a bill which would bring juvenile drivers under the system for traffic viola-

introducing the measure, Rep. Buth said, "Since 16 year olds are allowed to drive, they should be made subject to the same standards as adult driv-

"Presently, while adults may lose their licenses under the point system, juveniles convicted of the same violations may still be on the road," he pointed out, adding that "this situation is not conducive to traffic safety."

Technically the bill removes jurisdiction over misdemeanor motor vehicle offenses by persons under 17 years of age from the juvenile division of the probate court, thus making them

subject to the point system. Four similar bills were introduced last year, two in the House and two in the Senate. One measure passed the House, but died in the Senate Judiciary Committee Governor Romney recently urged such legislation in his special message on traffic safety.

The plan when completed must be approved by the State Com-mittee and following that approval will then be submitted to the voters of the Kent Intermediate District in an election.

Public Participation Needed "We want to hear from as many individuals and groups as possible," stated Kleinert. While we have all of the facts about the schools as they are today, we want to know what the people think about the fu-ture of their schools."

At the present time there are 37 school districts in Kent County of which 19 offer a full K-12 educational program and 18 primary or elementary districts. Forthcoming guidelines from the State Committee suggest that a district should have a minimum enrollment of 2000 in kindergarten through 12th grade, The a are six districts in that group with enrollments under the recommended minimum. 


