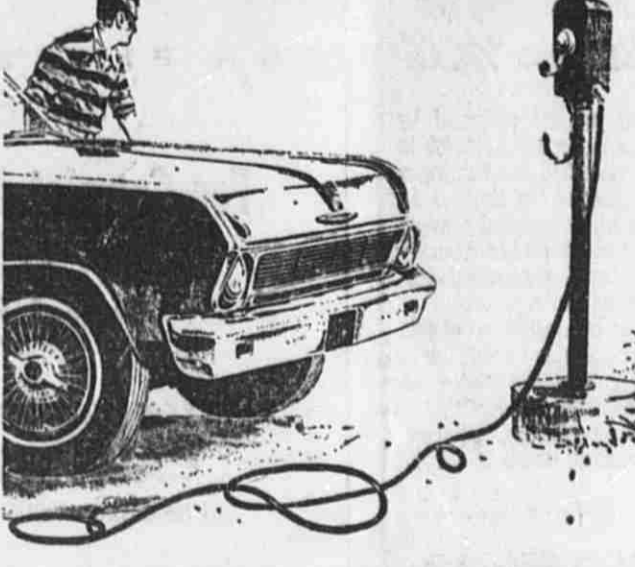

New license plates in '66

Michigan's more than 4½-million vehicles will be adorned by new license plates again in 1966. "It's clearly a mandate of the people," Secretary of State James M. Hare said, after being assured by appropriations committees of the Legislature that the added appropriations would be forthcoming.

"Judging from strong sentiment expressed in the many letters we have received in favor of annual license plates," Hare said, "the people of Michigan do not wish to return to tabs even though it does save the state some money."

"Pro-rated over the entire state, it's about a nickel per vehicle owner. I don't think this is too much to spend extra on each car-owning taxpayer in light of the tremendous amount of money spent in other areas. "We should reflect our good times economically," Hare said. "And Michigan presently is in the throes of a booming economy."
