Basketball season ends!

A wonderful basketball sea- and the lead changed on son ended on a sad note Saturday night when Lowell went down to a 73-65 defeat in the finals of the Class B Regional Tournament in East Grand Rapids. Lowell wound up the season with a 20-1 record for the year.

The bursting enthuiasm that had been worked up during the week when Lowell came from behind to beat Holland Christian 73-64, on Tuesday night and then beat Cedar Springs 109-79, on Thursday, left the town limp and dejected when its first licking of the season came.

It was a sad crowd of 1,500 Lowell fans who left East's gym. Some were near tears, others were trying to curb their disappointment by blaming officials, breaks, shooting and any-one else that had any connection with basketball.

Sunday and Monday the game was rehashed, and by Tuesday things were settled down and the community was congratulating itself and the team for lifting them above the worries of atomic bombs, Selma, Alabama, and Viet Nam for one week of the year.

No team in ten years had created nearly the town spirit and built up interest in high school sports like the one that has just passed.
