Bishop Allen J. Babcock of the Catholic Diocese of Grand Rapids has urged the generous support of all parishioners for nineteenth annual American Catholic Bishops' Relief Appeal for the world's poor. The collection will be taken in all parishes of the diocese Sunday,

In a letter which was read by pastors to all congregations last Sunday, Bishop Babcock stated: "In this day of renewal of Christian fervor and commitment, it is significant that a day at the third session of the Vatican Council last Novemwas devoted to a discussion of world poverty. Indeed, I am well aware from my own experiences at the Council that more than one half of my fellow bishops assembled there worry daily about the fact that their people are in great need of food, clothing, and shelter.

"These bishops have often formally and informally expressed their appreciation to the Bishops of the United States for providing the leadership in conducting these yearly campaigns in behalf of the poverty-strick-en in the world.

He went on to say: "Love of neighbor has been the hall-mark of Christianty, Every Christian in the past and today has an individual respondemonstration of his love of neighbor, whether that neighbor is in our own country or in a distant land."

Monsignor Joseph C. Walen, diocesan director of Catholic Charities, and assigned by Bishop Babcock to direct the diocesan phase of the national campaign, has issued the plea to all Catholics to be as gen-erous as possible in helping their neighbors in other lands through the world-wide assistance programs made possible through the Bishops' Fund. He reminds all donors that every dollar giv-en is turned into \$40 worth of food, clothing and medicines to feed the hungry, to clothe the naked, to minister to the sick, and to shelter the homeless in 73 countries around the globe.

> Remember, some external medicines can be fatal if swallowed. Why not save yourself from any such trouble by getting rid of medicines that have outlived their usefulness? Remember, too, that small children are fascinated by a lot of oddshaped bottles, brightly colored pills, and curious little boxes. Once children start playing with this stuff, the next step is to taste a few, or mix them all up and try that. So clear out medicines, Keep all medicine away from little hands. And teach youngsters the hands-off rule where all medicines are concerned.

Beans and Ham, Mexico Way

meaty ham bone 1 fat clove garlic, slivered and mashed with 1 cup chopped onion 1 large bay leaf 1 and ½ to 2 tablespoons chili powder

1 teaspoon ground cumin 4 ripe tomatoes, skinned and chopped OR 2 cups canned solid pack tomatoes Rinse beans; place in heavy kettle or Dutch oven with 6 cups cold water

water. Cover and let stand for 1 hour. Or soak overnight in measured amounts of water and soda.

To cook, add ham end, garlic and salt, onion and hay leaf to undrained beans. Bring to holling point; reduce heat and cover tightly. Simmer for 2 to 2½ hours or until beans are tender.

Mix chili powder and cumin with a little of the bean liquid. Add to beans along with tourntoes. Cook over low heat, stirring occasionally, for about 45 minutes or longer. Or turn into a casserole with tight-fitting cover and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 45 to 60 minutes. Saltiness of the ham determines whether additional salt needs to be added. Strength and family likes decide the amount of chili powder to use.

This makes 2 quarts (8 cups) of cooked beans or 8 to 12 servings depending upon size of each.






