A special meeting of the City Council on Friday afternoon authorized Williams and Works Engineering firm to proceed with the taking of bids for a sewage treatment plant, esti-

mated to cost \$310,000. The bond issue of \$217,000 was approved by the voters last August and the city has fulfilled all the requirements of eligibility for \$90,000 of federal grant

This federal money was not expected this year, but recent changes in demand for the funds in other cities, may give Lowell a chance at an earlier date.

In order to be ready to accept the federal grant, bids will have to be taken immediately to be able to have the project under contract by May Bids will be opened here on April 26, at the City Hall at 7 p. m. for the construction of sewage treatment plant.

The bids will be taken contingent on the granting of federal funds. If this does not become available to the city now, it is expected that with the sale of the bonds Lowell will be eligible next October, when new grants are set up.

The new members will take their seat on the council with Richard Schlernitzauer and Philip Schneider, whose terms have not expired. Dean Manigold, a member of the present council, is not seeking re-elec-

Filing for the three available positions are Arnold A Wittenbach, the present Mayor; Mrs. Harold Myers, R. G. Chrouch, Herbert Reynolds, Ray Engle, and Charles R. Doyle. Last year's election was very

close with Schneider and Wittenbach getting the same number of votes. Wittenbach secured the one year term by a cut of the cards.

Lowell city management has been steadily improving, but there are several areas for even greater improvement, if City Manager is relieved of a burden of clerical work to permit more time for his primary job, management. It simply isn't good economy to pay \$8,000 for management and load him with a \$1,500 clerical job as tax as-

All city employees should have time and a half for overtime. We can't expect any enthusiasm at 2 a, m, at straight time, and experienced help is cheaper at overtime than extra help.

Our Police Department is so badly underpaid that we are conducting a police training school, men leave for greener pastures at first opportunity. Our Fire Department should have much more recognition and support.

All this can be accomplished with little or no extra total expense with a better attention to details and a preventative maintenance program.

I am running for council because I believe that this sort of program is needed for my town and I have the time to devote to its accomplishment

My business contacts with many community governments around western Michigan have convinced me of these opinions, and I hope you will agree.
