

Family dog could be a deer killer

A dog may be a man's best friend, but they can be a deer's worst enemy during the winter

The death toll of deer killed by dogs this last winter reached a new time high in this area-your dog could have been one of the culprits.

The deep snows, during the past few months, have hindered deer movements and migration. A dog could easily trap a deer by chasing him. A dog's ability to travel on top of the snow gives him a big advantage over the deer, who breaks through and sinks at every step.

The Kent County Conservation Department this week announced that several dogs caught killing deer, north of Lowell, were household pets, whose owners lived within the city

In one incident, a conservation official tracked a dog right to the owner's door step; but the owner refused to believe that his dog could have been on the go, when he was "home all the time." Licensed dogs from Lowell were found roaming over 7 miles north of town. Several dogs have been picked up and returned to their owners, while others have been

Deer are not the only ones who suffer because dogs are allowed to run loose. Farm animals and wild life are also vic-

Now that summer is approaching, the Conservation Department urges all Lowell area residents to keep their dogs tied or under a very watchful eye.

Governor reports on traffic safety

This is the fourth in a series

of articles discussing the various aspects and problems of traffic safety.

Michigan is and has been the leader among all states in high school driver education. Current problems, however, requiring attention include:

 Excessive disparity between state aid provided and the cost of a program that fully answers driver education needs.

2. The need for increased driver education teacher training and competence beyond the present minimum certification requirements

3. Availability of driver education to all new drivers regard-

I shall call for recommended improvements in our driver education activities including these

1. To provide schools an assured state reimbursement for actual costs up to a maximum of \$40 for each student trained and to raise driver license fees to finance these increase in state payments to the schools. 2. To make driver education mandatory for new drivers re-

gardless of age.
3. To provide the State Board of Education with funds necessary to increase the field and evaluation staff of the driver

education program. The long-range planning of an optimum highway system must be related to the complex manmachine combination which it is to serve. Immediate engineer-

ing needs include:
1. Correction of high-accident potential-accident trouble spots in our highway system with particular attention to ru-ral highways and roads, since seven out of ten traffic fatalities in Michigan occur on rural highways and 40 percent of these

are on the secondary system. 2. Assistance and encouragement to county, smaller city and village agencies to establish better engineering practices.
3. Expanded educational pro-

grams for traffic and transportation engineers.

4. Re-evaluation of present criteria for speed zoning, signs and parking control.

Many other recommendations need to be implemented, Helpful as those I have presented will be in strengthening our ac-cident prevention effort in Michigan, there is great need for thorough study of many addi-tional problems. The committees of the Special Commission repeatedly voiced the need for more factual information and the development of better means of accident prevention.

To conduct some of these needed studies I have asked that we increase the appropria-tion provided to the Michigan State University Highway Traf-fic Safety Center to \$300,000 lh 1965-66. With this increased appropriation, the Center can study the effectiveness of our high school driver education pro-

ination and other problems. Public understanding and support by Michigan voters and taxpayers is essential for the success of any effort to im-prove our traffic accident prevention activities. Without such support, recommended safety improvements such as vehicle inspection, more attention to riding highways of hazardous conditions, more effective law enforcement, to mention but a few will not be obtained.




